Students taking an Advanced Placement (AP) course at Madeira understand the following statements:

1. **An AP course is the equivalent of a college-level course.** The curriculum for an AP course, as set by College Board, is designed to prepare students to take a national exam in May. Madeira students enrolled in an AP course are required to take the AP exam in that course and retain the score.
2. **Taking an AP course means having to complete assignments at a very fast pace.** The pace of an AP course is set by College Board. To develop the skills necessary and to learn the content required for the AP exam, the course must move at a steady (some say rapid) pace. The student in an AP course must feel comfortable if the class moves on to another skill or new content before she has mastered the previous skills and content.
3. **Taking an AP means doing more work.** You can expect to have longer reading assignments, more writing assignments, more work to be prepared outside of class, and more work to be completed over school vacations and the summer.
4. **The content and the skills in an AP course are more sophisticated than those in a previous course in the same subject area.** While students may have mastered the skills and content in non-AP courses, it does not guarantee they will master as quickly or as easily the skills and content of an AP course.
5. **Students moving into an AP course rarely see their grades go up.** In fact, students moving from a non-AP to an AP class often find that their grades drop at first. For example, if you had an A in Advanced Precalculus or French III, it is possible you will have a B in AP Calculus AB or AP French. Students should not expect their grades to go up. If you are a student for whom it is important to see your grades go up from one year to the next, then an AP class may not be right for you.
6. **Just because you are eligible to take an AP course does not mean you should take an AP course.** Students who have a deep interest and love for the course material, who are willing to work longer hours, who can work independently and think abstractly in the discipline, AND who can balance such a commitment with their other obligations and goals tend to have the most positive experiences in an AP course.
7. **The add/drop period for an AP course is the first two days of the course.** After that time, students may request to withdraw from the course and earn a withdraw/pass or withdraw/fail.
