F1 Update

The start of this year's Formula 1 season had everyone step up their game. Even though Mercedes-AMG was coming off two season championships back to back, rivals Red Bull and Ferrari were only getting stronger and even teams like Mclaren were finally hitting some stride to get back on pace. Newcomer Haas had a veteran team of drivers and immediately showed pace and the revamped Manor Marussia squad had an all new lineup including last year's DTM champion Pascal Wehrlein much to the disappointment of the lone US driver Alexander Rossi (the eventual winner of this years 100th running of the Indianapolis 500). The qualifying sessions were to be replaced with a NASCAR style elimination set up and no one could predict the sparks that would fly at Australia's Gran Prix this year.

While Australia could be called a great success for Mercedes-AMG with a front row lockout led by Lewis Hamilton and Nico Rosberg and a total victory taken by Rosberg, it was the vicious accident that Mclaren driver Fernando Alonso was involved in that was the biggest headline of the weekend. He would ultimately have to miss the next race due to injuries but would return to the car for the majority of the season.

Bahrain would see a repeat of the last race, both in qualifying and in victor with Nico Rosberg taking the victory. Hamilton however, would fall from his pole position and find himself back in third. The most pressing voice of the weekend was the teams dissenting against the new qualifying system and it was loud and clear. This would be the last time we would see the elimination setup with the return of the traditional three stage qualifying from before.

China and Russia came up next and Rosberg continued his success by winning both of these races as well and his seventh in a row counting last season. This included a Grand Slam at Russia by leading every lap after taking pole. Hamilton again saw his fortunes not match his teammate and qualifying and mechanical troubles had him finishing seventh in China and second in Russia after a brilliant drive from a tenth starting position.

Spain however, would show the world the troubles brewing in F1's fastest team. A first lap collision between the two Mercedes-AMG drivers would prove their undoing and the newly promoted Max Verstappen from Red Bull gained his first victory in short fashion becoming the youngest F1 winner in history.

F1 Update Continued

Monaco was next, and Red Bull's Riccardo continued where his teammate finished taking pole. If not for an unusual error from the Red Bull team completely forgetting their tires on a stop, Hamilton may not of found himself in a position for his first win of the season.

Momentum was in Hamilton's favor going into Canada. His pole position was given up quickly but thanks to an aggressive strategy the British driver once again claimed victory up north.

A return to the European Grand Prix saw a bobble in Hamilton's fortunes as electrical grimlins returned and relegated him to beyond the podium. Championship leader Rosberg was there to pick up the race win for Mercedes-AMG, but as the points grew between the teammates so did tensions.

The Austria would be the place for the next Mercedes-AMG team confrontation. While Hamilton took the pole, Rosberg had a grid penalty that forced him to start from sixth. The difference in start caused both drivers to use different strategies and on the final lap a leading but slower Rosberg decided to defend his position aggressively and the two drivers collided. Hamilton would win the day and Rosberg would take an additional penalty for avoidable contact.

The British Grand Prix had very mixed rainy conditions all weekend, a perfect fit for the home town Hamilton. The difficult conditions proved troublesome for teammate Rosberg. His pace was never able to equal Hamilton and a late race gearbox failure was the catalyst for a call for help back to the team. The team complied with instructions and the stewards felt the corresponding response fell under a new set of rules restricting driver aid. A ten second penalty was assessed and the German fell to third place in the race results.

24 Hours of Nurburgring

With Indy celebrating it's 100th running and Le Mans getting all the coverage for it's wild finish, one of the largest racing events seemingly failed to reach US shores over the last few months. The Nurburgring 24 Hours proved to be as wild a finish as any major racing event this year. Bentley, Audi, Porsche, and BMW along with dozens of other competitors all showed up for the grueling race. With fierce competition and even a hail storm in store for the day no one could have predicted the final results. In the closing minutes of the race, with a single 25 km lap remaining the brand new AMG GT3 of the #29 HTP team had a near 6 second lead over the second place #4 Black Falcon AMG GT3. At any normal track this would be an insurmountable lead without a catastrophic failure. But as the time ticked down, eventually the lead was brought to nothing and a rather brave pass gave the Black Falcon Mercedes-AMG the overall victory. Adding to the day was that the sister #9 Black Falcon AMG GT3 took the final place on the podium with the #88 Haribo Racing AMG GT3 and #75 Zakspeed AMG GT3 coming in 4th and 6th respectively. 1

Mercedes Going Away From Old Robots

A bit of a stir was caused recently upon a headline making it's way through different news outlets. "Mercedes-Benz swapping robots for people on assembly lines" was the word getting passed around. And while this sounded like a return to old, it signifies something entirely different. In truth robots in the Mercedes-Benz factory are here to stay. The speed, consistency, and accuracy that a machine can craft a part is far beyond what any team of people can do. But, the robots of old who were programmed once without flexibility are what's on their way out.

This new generation of robots will be able to work with the craftsmen in the factory to allow newer cars much more freedom to have that extra level of care that has been lost for decades. Before, the difficulty to add a slight variant made the package system very dominant in the factory. If you wanted a sport package you couldn't have a maple wood and certain color combinations were right out. To pick and choose parts was hard to justify for one car in a day of thousands going out the door. And if a part was physically different in appearance thanks to a redesign the whole line would need retooling.

There's no promise of all options open at all times, but this new freedom should make way for improvements in all the ways that Mercedes-Benz cars were known for once again. Instead of just faceless machines making the same car over and over again we have an opening for people using the best tools in the industry to make what could be the best cars in the world. 2,3

Smallest Convertible Loses It's Biggest Engine

While the loss of a manual option was a sad but easily foreseen future, it comes as a surprise that the future of the naturally aspirated V8 that was the heart of the SLK55 is going to soon be no more with the SLC lineup. Instead of a free breathing eight cylinder, the biturbo V6 mentioned in the last newsletter takes up the helm under the guise of the SLC 43. This will bring the cost down slightly along with a small drop in power and a single tenth of a second change in time to 60.

This marks the first time since the original SLK that a V6 will be the top engine choice for the current smallest Mercedes-Benz convertible. And while the sibling C class has a V8 offering, the vehicles have not always shared their top performance specs. It was actually the SLK that started the Black Series AMG's which is now the top line in AMG skunk works. At a price that eclipsed both the SL600 and SL55 at the same year, the SLK55 Black was a short production, 400 horsepower monster that was the start of something great.

Will the V8 be gone forever from these cars? It's hard to say. With the AMG GT in the lineup and the C class cabriolet soon arriving, the Mercedes-Benz sporty coupes and cabriolets are becoming more plentiful and more powerful. However, there will always be fans of the biggest engine smallest car combination. 4,5
