Ask Al!

Our Question this month is from Dale H. of Roseville, regarding his '99 E430.

QUESTION: Which is better to use, Mobil Oil or Synthetic Oil before 20,000 miles? Should the oil be changed every 5,000 or 6,000 miles, or should the oil be changed when the Flexible Service System Light comes on, which could be every 13,000 miles?

ANSWER: In response to Dale H.'s questions regarding his '99 E430: I have heard, though have no personal knowledge, that using synthetic oil early in the "life" of your vehicle will maintain its parts better than using non-synthetic oil. The oil should be changed according to the FSS indicator (light) to maintain the Mercedes Warranty. The official Mercedes position according to their website, is that the indicator light will come on between 10,000 and 20,000 miles, depending upon the driving conditions and the owner's driving style. Mercedes says that on an average, the light will come on at about 12,000 miles, so your vehicle is certainly within the proper mileage range. After the warranty period, you can change the oil more often if you prefer, which should keep your vehicle in better condition, for a longer period of time.



TEQUILA ROSE XXXV March 16-18, 2001

The San Diego Section of the Mercedes-Benz Club of America would like to invite you to attend Tequila Rose XXXV, being held March 16-18, 2001 at the Historic Mission Inn in Riverside, California. Today the Mission Inn occupies an entire city block in the heart of downtown Riverside, but it began humbly as a two-story, 12 room adobe boarding house, built in 1876 by Christopher Columbus Miller. The inn is one of California's oldest and most celebrated hotels, dating back to 1902 when Frank Miller began his first expansion. It is truly an awesome facility, and will be the home for our weekend adventure.

Frank Miller spent more than 30 years building and collecting this treasure. The finished project incorporated design elements from throughout the United States and several Mediterranean countries with particular influence from the California missions.

It is filled with more than \$5 million of antiques and artifacts! Over the years, the Mission Inn has hosted numerous dignitaries including five United State Presidents while in office, the marriage of former President Richard Nixon to Pat Nixon, and the honeymoon of Ronald and Nancy Reagan.

Upon your arrival on Friday, a totally unique room awaits you (no two rooms at the Mission Inn are alike. Friday evening we then gather for no-host cocktails and hors d'oeuvres.

Saturday morning we meet again for a hearty breakfast in our private meeting room. At this point, your Rallyemaster will provide instructions for the day's driving events.

Is it too early to contemplate the outcome of the rallye and gymkhana? After changing into something 'weekendelegant', we reconvene for a scrumptious dinner and to find out who won!!

Sunday morning we meet again for an early breakfast, so that those with a great driving distance can get an early start home. Some of our attendees may opt to go on the tour of the Mission Inn which takes about 1 1/2 hours and is an additional cost (see the reservation slip).

Due to the popularity of the Mission Inn, our reservation deadline is necessarily early – February 15, 2001.

Aircraft Carrier Hornet Feb 24, 2001

As we used to say in the Army, "LISTEN UP!!" I guess the Navy would say, "NOW HEAR THIS". A few months ago I joined the San Francisco Section to see this ship. We all had such a good time that I feel the Sacramento Section should also go!

This is the ship you always saw on TV when they were picking up the astronauts. You can see the quarantine area they used. Walk where the first moonwalkers walked when the helicopter picked them up...

This paltry price of \$16.50 will give you a day on this ship. Plus lunch! Docents will take you places that you want to go. Well, most places. The brig is still off limits. But there's the flight deck, hanger, engine room, sickbay, bridge...

Did you know that the temperature in the engine room was 140 degrees? You will have to take the engine room tour to see what sailors had to do to clean the turbines. It wasn't pretty.

The ship is yours for a day – see as much or as little as you want. At your own pace. Docents will offer tours at various times that you can take. All free.

There's also a flight simulator you can use for a slight charge.

Around noon we will assemble in the Officer's Mess to have a nice boxed lunch.

I guarantee you can't have as much entertainment anywhere else for only \$16.50! Bring your camera. The flight deck offers an unbelievable view of San Francisco.

Fall in at 10:00 on 24 Feb 01 at the pier. Be there or be AWOL. As your CO, I don't want to have to send the Shore Patrol to find you! Since they want a firm count a week before the event, the deadline is *Feb 17th*. *No Exceptions*.

A word of caution – you use the same steps the crew used. Meaning they are steep and narrow.

Directions: From Sacramento and I80: Take 880 south and take the Broadway/ Alameda exit. At the end of the ramp turn right on 5th street. Merge into the left lane and follow signs to Alameda via the Webster Street Tube (tunnel). Upon exiting the tube, follow Webster St to Atlantic Ave and turn right. Follow Atlantic Ave though the gate into Alameda Point (formerly Alameda Naval Air Station). Turn left on Ferry Point and proceed along the water towards the cluster of large ships. Parking is available across the street from the USS Hornet.

Lunch: Includes Pasta Salad, Fresh Fruit Salad and a soft drink. Plus a soft French roll sandwich – in your choice of turkey, ham, or roast beef.








