



## **GREETINGS FROM YOUR REGIONAL DIRECTOR**

2022 has gone by quickly for me as a first-year Regional Director. Sara and I have spent time in November and December visiting some nearby sections for their end-of-year parties and award ceremonies. We really enjoyed all the events we could attend. Unfortunately, illness forced us to miss the St Louis Gateway Section's Christmas Party, and I was not able to personally present Rick Siefert, President of the Gateway Section, the Central Region's Officer of the Year Award. Rick has been a great help to me this past year and led his section through -- we hope -- the end of Covid and the untimely loss of two very important members of his section. Congratulations to Rick.

Sara and I were able to visit all eight of the Central Region's sections this year and enjoyed meeting so many members from all over the region. Several of the sections are still adjusting to the end of section rebates and having to find other sources for club revenues. I will continue working with them. One of the most important reasons rebates ended was the termination of MBUSA's \$100K+ rebate to MBCA. So the 84 sections of MBCA are not the only ones dealing with the end of rebates.

# "TECH TALK"

# W212 (and others) Lower Seat Cushion "Splits"



Fake "seam" failure

A well-known problem for 2010's E and C class cars with MB-TEX or leather interiors is the split seam in the middle of the lower seat cushion. It isn't really a seam but a sewed joining of the seat cover and the pockets for the seat heaters. The holes from sewing weaken the fabric, and eventually it splits. Mine did this at about 30K miles! And I am certainly not of a weight that would have put any strain on it...:)

Mercedes is aware of the problem - a TSB (Technical Service Bulletin) exists - but as to whether the dealer will fix it because the design is defective seems to be case-by-case without actual warranty coverage, by all reports. It can cost several hundred dol-

lars to replace depending on materials and other options. So, it is possible to DIY this and save some money if you are "handy'? Well, yes it is, although, if you have a deluxe interior, your options might be limited in the aftermarket. I have a "plain vanilla" black/charcoal MB-TEX interior, and many companies sell exactly these seat skins on eBay. I bought the US-made version for under \$200. BEWARE: The Chinese versions, although much cheaper (50-80\$), may or may not have pockets for the seat heaters. Virtually all US E's and possibly C's have seat heaters, so using these seat skins may be a problem (see later in article).

Replacing the seat skin is made much easier by first watching the video at the link below:

Compared to replacing the seat skins on my 1980's SL's, this is very simple and almost tool-free, requiring no removal of the entire seat. Note that the technician in the video is doing this on a European car, and it doesn't have the "cubby" that a US E class seat would have. Removing that piece at the front of the cushion is simple. The material match was excellent in grain, color, and feel.

I followed those directions and had no problem replacing the cover, except with the removal of the connector for the seat heater. I got so frustrated that I cut the two wires and soldered them back together when I was reinstalling! The aesthetic results/fit/finish were very good; I could see that the "seam" was sewn in a different (and hopefully stronger) way by the US supplier. The material match was excellent in grain, color, and feel.

Because this problem will eventually also happen to the passenger seat, I'm replacing that proactively in the spring. I purchased an inexpensive Chinese replacement (now en route), and it remains to be seen if this can be used/modified for installation of US seat heaters, or even if they did a better job with the seam. I will report on this next year (hopefully!).

### **PUMPKIN ROLL**

From: Ann Mudge Prep Time: 45 min Serves: 15 Cook Time: 20 min

# Instructions for Cake

- 1. Beat eggs, sugar, nutmeg, soda, lemon juice, cinnamon and salt.
- 2. Fold in pumpkin and flour last.
- 3: Spread batter in a greased/floured jelly roll pan.
- 4: Sprinkle top with chopped pecans.
- 5: Bake 20 minutes at 375degrees.
- 6. Turn out cake on a tea towel that has been sifted with powdered sugar. Roll up in the towel and cool.
- 7. Beat all filling ingredients.
- 8. After cake is cooled, unroll and spread with filling.
- 9. Reroll and sprinkle with powdered sugar.
- 10. Cover with aluminum foil and place in refrigerator or freezer.

### NOTES:


The roll slices easier while still chilled, I like mine warmed when eating. I pop a slice in the microwave for about 20 seconds. YUM!

# **Ingredients**

3 Eggs
1 Cup Sugar
3/4 Cup Flour
1/2 Tsp. Nutmeg
1 Tsp. Soda
1 Tbsp. Lemon Juice
2/3 Cup Canned Pumpkin
1/2 Tsp. Cinnamon
1/4 Tsp. Salt
1/2 Cup Chopped Pecans

### Filling:

1 Cup Powdered Sugar 1/2 Stick Melted Butter 8 Oz. Philadelphia Crème Cheese 1 Tsp. Vanilla
