nother Wheat harvest has come and gone. Not the crop the last 2 have been, but 76% of the 5 year average. Fall crops are looking to be better than average at this point. Ample rains throughout most of the summer have us looking for a good fall crop production. Unfortunately the new leg at Winfield will not be in service prior to fall harvest as planned. One of the drag conveyors was not able to be built and shipped in time to complete the process before harvest would have started. This is a disappointment, but we will be ready for the crop just as we have been in the past. Both the New Salem and Winfield legs will be ready for Wheat harvest 2015.

Other exciting news is that the board of directors has voted to build a shop and equipment warehouse in Atlanta. This building will replace the small tire shop and storage we have today and give us much better working conditions for repairs of our own vehicles as well as better function for the tire shop. The warehouse will allow us to keep our equipment inside out of the elements at times they are not in use. This facility will serve the Atlanta area well for the next generation. Keeping your facilities and equipment in good condition is and always will be the management's goal and direction.

We offer a CFA loan program for our patrons. This is a finance program for seed, fertilizer and chemicals. Interest rates have stayed steady for the past 4 years that we have used the program. We will again be offering crop input financing of 3.5% interest on seed purchases and 5.5% on

fertilizer and chemical purchases. There is a \$125.00 application fee which is added to the loan at the beginning of the contract period. All loans are due and payable by December 15, 2015, and can be paid prior to that with no penalties. If you have interest in this program please contact myself, Kirk Kennedy or Rebecca Romero for details. A simple 2 page application form will need to be filled out to start the process. We usually have a response from CFA within 48 hours.

Contracting fuel for next year's use. Seems like it is a long way away at this point, but fuel can be contracted for about the same price for next summer as the price is today. The pig weed has also enjoyed the moisture. Now is the time to be considering a plan for pre-emerge chemical for those weeds. The pig weed has been out of control and is becoming resistant to glyphosate. A pre-emerge program will help prevent problems for the next year.

We are now offering two new products:

<u>Factor</u>—An inhibitor of UAN and Urea. Use where above ground nitrogen loss occurs: pre-plant, side-dress or surface applications. Volatility protection up to 14 days.

<u>P.Max</u>—A phosphate fertilizer additive that increases phosphate efficiency, micronutrient availability, and plant uptake.

FIELDNOTES

Good Day!! Hope this writing finds you with a great row crop to harvest and getting ready to sew wheat in the coming weeks. Corn and milo are looking great with soybeans needing a few more rains to finish strong.

Have seen a few later plantings of milo and beans that appear to lack some fertility. Consider a foliar N application of KQ XRN, a 72% slow release N that won't burn the plant. Also those beans that are on better soil and have higher yield may not have enough N to achieve their true potential. Hackney has this product in bulk, they can measure out what you need or we can fill a 265 gal tote and move to a location close to you. Works great on corn, wheat, milo and soybeans, ½ to 1 gal per acre and can be tank mixed with Glyphosate or Liberty on beans. Not sure if it's for you? Give me a call for a side by side challenge.

Something new for dry fertilizer is a phosphate additive called P-Max that reduces phosphate and micronutrient fixation in the soil allowing for maximum uptake of phosphorus by the plant. P-Max is used on DAP or 18-46-0, Factor is the Urea or 46-0-0 product that is a urease inhibitor to protect the Nitrogen that you put on. Nitrogen volatilization losses can be a significant factor when applying Urea or UAN (28%). Both of these products can be used on dry blends or by themselves. Get the full benefit of the fertilizer products you put down!! Liquid version for 10-34-0 and UAN 28% as well, give me a call for details.

Certified seed wheat is getting tighter by the day, some varieties are limited, many newer ones are sold out. Will have bulk Everest as supplies last, some W B Cedar as well at Atlanta. Any other varieties I can try to find something for you. Don't wait till October to order seed wheat, give me a call. We will again have the portable USC seed treater for seed wheat this fall. You can bring your truck to Atlanta if buying seed wheat from us, I can come to your farm with the treater or I can treat tote bags and ship to your location for pickup. Would appreciate a call if you are planning on pulling bulk certified wheat out of Atlanta's bin, just helps me make sure and have enough on hand.

In closing just a reminder as fall harvest begins, make sure if you have any new landlord / tenant splits to bring those into your location so it can be updated. It is much easier now before harvest starts to make corrections rather than telling your Landlord what his / her share is and realizing the splits aren't right. Have a great fall harvest!!

Cheesy Ground Beef Rice Casserole

1 lb ground beef (lowest fat possible)

2 onions diced

2 teaspoons garlic powder

salt, pepper, oregano

1 small can tomato sauce

1 cup chicken broth

1 cup frozen peas

1 cup cooked rice

2 cups shredded cheese-divided

1 cup sour cream (I use fat free)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray a skillet with cooking spray and turn on high heat. Roast the onions for a few minutes. Add ground beef and garlic powder. Brown the ground beef completely. Turn heat to medium. Spice with salt, pepper and oregano how you like it. Add rice, peas, tomato sauce, 1 cup cheese and broth. Let simmer for 3 minutes. Transfer everything into a casserole dish and bake for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, combine the rest of the cheese with the sour cream. Spread the cheese/sour cream mixture on top of casserole and bake for another 15 minutes.
