Soil Fertility!! Donnie Roths brought this subject forward earlier this fall. He mentioned how multi years of above average yields could have our soils in a deficient state. After looking over soil tests for row crop and tissue samples of wheat I have to agree with Donnie's statement. Any surpluses our soils had, have certainly been reduced and some are now deficient.

So what are our choices to remedy this problem? It's much easier to fix a fertility problem before a crop is planted. What if it is a growing crop like wheat? A tissue test can reveal a picture of what the plant needs. By using a foliar product many areas that are low can be corrected. Remember foliar means it is absorbed by the leaves into the plant, not through the roots. The size of the leaf or stage of growth determines how much can be applied. This is true with row crop as well as cereals. Also I would never suggest using foliar as a full fertility program, rather follow a soil test before planting your crop and using foliar to fine tune any shortfalls. "NutriScription" is a complete nutritional prescription service which takes soil and/ or tissue analysis data and creates agronomically correct and field specific fertilizer recommendations. I can assist you with any testing, just call my cell 620 229 0312.

As time nears for seed treating, here are the products Valley will be using. Excalibre will be our primary SB inocuant and can be applied alone or with a fungicide/insecticide. We will be using Cruiser Maxx and Inovate to protect from diseases and insects. Those that missed our meeting on Jan  $20^{th}$  didn't get to see the presentation on Inovate, I am really looking forward to getting this product on SB seed this year. Give me a call to discuss the details or to schedule a treatment time. As warmer weather arrives I will start treating most likely late March/ early April. As always your business is appreciated.

# Kellogg Comments

Think Spring! Well, the winter started out fairly calm, but I think it is making up for it in the end. Thanks to all of our feed customers for your business. We are having a spring mineral booking. Save \$25.00 per ton on Valley 4 plain or Valley 4% medicated mineral. Book between now and May 1<sup>st</sup>. Mineral can be picked up at any Valley Coop location in one-ton lots; a two-ton minimum booking is required. This year we have extended the pickup deadline to September 1<sup>st</sup>. Give me a call for more information.

Spring planting will be right around the corner and a lot of you use 10-34-0 liquid fertilizer. For a starter it looks like it may be in short supply and a little pricey this year. One way you may be able to hold back expense is by blending your 10-34-0 with a product called Black Label Zn, complexed with organic acid.

Black Label Zn (6-20-0, 0.77% zinc) is patented nitrogen and phosphate formulation with zinc designed to protect phosphate tie-up in the soil and help reduce nitrogen loss. Rule of thumb is you can replace 3 gallons of 10-34-0 with 1 gallon of Black Label Zn. 10-34-0 is costing \$3.95 per gallon; Black Label Zn cost is \$9.00 per gallon. 3 gallons of 10-34-0 cost is \$11.85 and 1 gallon of Black Label Zn is \$9.00 thus making a savings of \$2.85 per acre, plus supplying zinc and reducing the total amount of product you have to haul to the planter. Example, if you normally put on 7 gallon per acre, 1000 gallons will cover 143 acres. If this sounds of interest to you let me know so I can make sure we have product on hand. We could do the blending of it as you pick up your 10-34-0.

We will have a good supply of seed for all of your planting needs.
