That has been a very different Summer and Fall to this point. Much cooler and a whole lot wetter than usual. I have stopped using the word "normal" as I am not sure if there is a normal anymore. At any rate it has been different from years past. Not good or bad just different.

Many of you received a notice of allocation a few weeks ago. This was a Domestic Production Credit which the Cooperative could not use on it's tax returns as it was only made possible after our year end had come and gone. Fortunately we were able to pass it on to you our members as a credit for you to use on your tax returns. It amounted to a little over \$360,000 back to you. This was in addition to the approximately \$418,000 patronage already issued. If you have any questions about this deduction please call me and I will be happy to go into more detail about it.

Fall harvest has been one for the record books. Today is November 9th and we are not finished yet but receipts are record in Corn and Soybeans. Milo will not reach record potential but we are receiving good quantities and quality. We are approaching 1,000,000 bu of soybeans and 700,000 bu of corn. The weather has complicated both the harvest and wheat fall planting. Unfortunately we have no control in that arena, and I would not want it. I will leave that up to the weathermen. The employees have worked diligently to keep room at their locations to handle this great fall crop. If you get a chance tell them you appreciate their efforts. We appreciate your patronage of your business.

As we approach the holiday season Valley Coop would like to extend to all of our patrons and members a sincere Thank You for your patronage this past year. We wish each of you a joyous holiday season. We are here to help make your business as profitable as possible.

Valley Coop, Inc is in the process of updating it's web-site. There will be a new look and new information for our patrons. We expect this change to enhance some of our offerings to our patrons. With this change we will be offering the ability to send daily text messages to patrons about how the grain markets are doing through out the day. You will be able to customize to your own needs or we can put together a plan for you. More information on this program will be coming to you in the near future. As the year-end of 2009 approaches, prepaid contracts come in to the picture for your tax year planning. Please remember—All prepaid contracts are non-refundable as per IRS laws and regulations! You must use the product that you are prepaying- and it is to be used up in the next calendar year. Talk to your tax preparer to see if a prepaid product contract would be in your best interest for the tax year ending 2009. All product contracts must be purchased by noon on December 31, 2009 and can be done at all of our locations.

Substitute 1099's will be mailed out in January 2010—these 1099's will include Patronage and/or Investment Interest. Based on grain payments made to you for the 2008 crop and certain purchases made by you for our fiscal year ended March 31, 2009, this year's substitute 1099 may also include a Domestic Production Activities Deduction (DPAD). Please consult with your tax advisor for further information on the DPAD and how it applies to your farming operation. CoMark Grain Marketing (CGM) will mail the Deferred Grain Interest substitute 1099's. Amounts under \$10.00 will not be reported as per IRS guidelines. Please verify your social security number when you receive the 1099's and contact me at the Main Office – 221-4343 or 1-800-221 4346 if there are corrections to be made! For those patrons that received an Equity Retirement payment in September --- this payment will NOT be reported on a 1099 as a 1099 PAT was issued to each patron in the year that the equity was earned.

Investment interest checks will be mailed out the first week of December. The interest rates on November 1st—3 YR C of I is 4.0%, 1 YR C Of I is 3.0%, and Demand Certificates are 2.0%.

Kellogg Comments

We all knew that after waiting a month to resume harvest it would be a very busy time. At this point Kellogg has received a total of 700,000 bushels of milo, corn and soybeans. To say the least, bushels per acre in all crops have been great! The soybean test plot northwest of the Kellogg office averaged 66.2 bushels. With the top variety making 74.4 bushels per acre and the low being 61.7. Stop by sometime and look at the data. Thanks to everyone for bringing us your crops and being patient while we try to dump corn, milo and soybeans all the same day.

The new expansion on the feed mill has been put behind by the weather just like everything else. They are making good progress now. The cement has been poured and the bins are built. They now have to install everything. Hopefully it will be done by December 1st. When it is completed we will be expanding our bulk feed line. We will have a bulk horse pellet, a 12% cattle grow finish pellet and a 20% Range nugget. They will be 3/16 inch in size and you will be able to weigh in and pickup any amount without an appointment. The 20% Range nugget will be make out of 75% distillers dried grains and 25% grain. It will have no minerals but does have vitamins A& D and E. It will be an economical alternative to a 20% Range cube with the cost being \$15.00 to \$20.00 less than range cubes. Give me a call and I can tell you more about it.
