

AGRONOMY Justin Clark

As we head into June and the summer months, the agronomy department is in the swing of spraying season. We have experienced favorable weather conditions this spring for getting fertilizer, spraying, and planting completed in a timely manner. This has probably been the best spring we've had in a few years to get all of the work completed and it's a nice change of pace from the cold wet springs we've experienced the past several years. The staff is gearing up for in-season fertilizer application by conducting tissue sampling and prepping the side-dress applicators for the run. This is all part of our sustained approach to fertilizer man-

agement which includes tissue sampling to determine crop needs, utilizing NDVI imagery and crop modeling software to determine areas of fields that need the most attention, and layering our fertilizer to make sure it's there when the crop needs it the most. With the addition of our John Deere spreader this year we now have the ability make in-season applications of stabilized urea, along with side-dressing UAN. Visit with our staff about how a layered approach could work on your farm.

This year in crop insurance we set our spring prices at \$4.15 for corn and \$9.73 for soybeans. Those prices gave us revenue guarantees of \$650/ac on corn and \$420/ac on soybeans figuring an 85% revenue policy and using 185 APH for corn and 50 APH for soybeans. These guarantees are down from last year by around \$75/ac on corn and \$60/ac on beans. I continue to see more and more interest in the private products in this industry as we had some guys lock in over \$11.00 for their soybean spring price and \$4.30 for their corn. If we can happen to get a weather rally this summer or fall we will want to look at

locking in some prices for next year. We can lock in roughly 20 cents over the December futures for corn and 30 cents over the November futures for soybeans any day from now through next March, all while still getting the higher of between the price we selected and our February average that is the standard price used. Please call me if you have any questions regarding these products and I'd be glad to go over them with you to help manage your risk. With declining prices our bottom lines are in danger and we need to stay proactive in managing our risk. Private products along with combining your inputs, forward sales, and crop insurance into our matrix gives you snapshots of your risk and helps you to make decisions accordingly.
