CORN MOISTURE DISCOUNT

All corn received at SilverEdge Coop that is over 15% moisture will be discounted as follows:

15.1 % and above Discount: CALL FOR CURRENT DISCOUNTS

SHRINK FACTORS Corn: 1.45% Soybeans: 1.50%

Corn purchased, contracted or on Price Later will be shrunk to 15%.

Corn for storage or grain bank will be will shrunk to 14.0%.

BEAN MOISTURE DISCOUNT

All soybeans received at SilverEdge that test over 13% moisture will be discounted as follows:

13.1% and above CALL FOR CURRECT DISCOUNTS

STORAGE CHARGES Regular Corn Storage: 14.0 cents/bushel for the first 90 days, 3.0 cents/bushel per month for the next 9

months. 3.5 cents/bushel per month after 1 year.

Regular Bean Storage: 15.0 cents/bushel for the first 90 days, 3.0 cents/bushel per month for the next 9

months, 4.0 cents/ bushel per month after 1 year.

Grain Bank: 5.0 cents/bushel for the first 90 days, 2.0 cents/ bushel per month for the next 9 months, 3.0

cents/ bushel per month after 1 year.

TEST WEIGHT

CORN: All corn received at SilverEdge Coop that is under 54.0 lbs test weight will be discounted as follows:

 53.9 - 52.0
 Discount: 1.0 cent/ point

 51.9 - 50.0
 Discount: 2.0 cents/ point

 49.9 - 45.0
 Discount: 3.0 cents/ point

 44.9 - below
 Discount: 4.0 cents/ point

BEANS: All beans received at SilverEdge Coop that is under 54.0 lbs test weight will be discounted as follows:

53.9 and below Discount: 1.0 cent/ pound

DAMAGE

CORN: All corn received at SilverEdge Coop that is over 5.0% damage will be discounted as follows:

5.1 and above Discount: 1.0 cent/ point

Corn that is over 15% Damage is Subject to Rejections or Such Discounts Agreed Upon by Buyer and Seller.

BEANS: All beans received at SilverEdge Coop that is over 2.0% damage will be discounted as follows:

2.1 and above Discount: 3.0 cents

HEAT DAMAGE

CORN: All corn received at SilverEdge Coop that is over .02% heat damage will be discounted as follows:

.03 - .05 Discount: 2.0 cents

.06 and above Discount: 1.0 cent per additional 10th

BEANS: All beans received at SilverEdge Coop that is over .02% heat damage will be discounted as follows:

.03 - .05 Discount: 2.0 cents

.6 and above Discount: 4.0 cents for each half % over 0.5

FOREIGN MATERIAL

CORN: All corn received at SilverEdge Coop that is above 3.0% F.M will be discounted as follows:

3.1 – 4.0 Discount: 2.0 cents/ point 4.1 – 10.0 Discount: 3.0 cents/ point

BEANS: All beans received at SilverEdge Coop that is over 1.0% F.M will be deducted from weight.



Importance of Yield Data

arvest is soon approaching and the grain carts and combines will be running full force. But before we get to that, let's stop, and take a look at a very important part of harvest: yield data. Now, this is one thing in particular that can be easily looked over, because well, it is still a fairly new concept to a lot of growers. Throughout this article I am going to help you understand why yield data is important and why it is something you don't want to look over anymore.

Most growers these days have yield monitors already equipped in their combines, and are ready to start recording data. But, the big question is, once the data is recorded and you are done with harvest, what do you do with it? That's where the agronomy and technology team at SilverEdge come in.

Here at SilverEdge, we can take your data that you collected and process it using programs designed to take raw data. We then can turn it into readable and useful information that you can base your agronomy and economic decisions on. With that data, you are able to layer it with any data you have accumulated over the year whether it be planting prescriptions, tile maps, or inseason imagery from the R7 tool by Winfield. By layering data you then can see how the farm faired out as a whole.

Here are a few check off items to complete before getting into full harvest mode:

- Make sure your monitor card is clean from prior years data so you can start fresh
- Calibrate your yield monitor
- Make sure the GPS receiver and monitor are talking
 - o Without GPS you are unable to record any valuable data

When your harvest season ends, bring your monitor card into SilverEdge and we will process your raw data, which will turn it into readable data for you. One thing you must do is let us know how you would like your data presented to you. We can display your data in numerous different ways. Maybe you just want a simple report of all fields and farms or maybe you would like a more in-depth analysis on a per field basis. Whatever you are looking for, we will do our best to get you what you need.

So, while you are greasing up the combine and double checking the equipment, take a little time to go over your yield monitor and get it ready so you can see what your final crop grade is.

We would like to remind growers to let us know as soon as possible if you will be needing our soil sampling services this fall.


