Annual Meeting Report

Dear Members,

Thank you to everyone that came out for the Annual Meeting! A great meal was served by the Edgewood Locker along with lots of information, door prizes, and of course patronage checks. For those of you who were unable to attend, here is a brief recap of the 2014 Annual Meeting.

Patronage of \$568,246.00 was declared on sales of \$37,842,699.00. Patronage rates were as follows: Grain at 2.3127 cents per bushel, Merchandise and Services at 2.6703% of dollars spent and Petroleum products at 4.9148 cents per gallon.

61 new memberships were approved during the fiscal year, bringing current membership to 1,043.

During the fiscal year the Board of Directors approved expenditures of \$531,470.00 for additions to fixed assets, with agronomy equipment accounting for most of the new purchases. Already this year we have 2 new skidloaders, 2 new pickups and 2 new Case IH sprayers between the Edgewood and Strawberry locations.

Three directors' terms were up for election, Doug Baumgartner, Charlie Robinson and Tim Rathe. Doug Baumgartner chose not to seek reelection. Tim and Charlie were reelected along with new director Ryan Reichers to serve on the Board of Directors.

Once again your Co-op had a successful year, thank you for your support. Everyone at SilverEdge would like to wish you a very safe and happy Holiday Season.



The 2014 test plot results are generated from the Jaeger Plot, which is located west of Edgewood on highway 3. The corn was planted at a population of 36,000 and the soybeans were planted at a population of 140,000. Both were planted on May $10^{\rm th}$ and Harvested on October $7^{\rm th}$.

Winter Supplementation

Once again winter has come and our pastures are covered with snow. What does this mean for our forages? Our forages vary in quality and quantity during the different seasons. When winter comes it is even more important to have quality forages available for our beef cattle, but with so much nutritional variability within our forages it is hard to decipher what our cattle's intake really is. Therefore, we use protein supplementation. Supplementing protein will increase forage utilization, by increasing the cattle's forage intake which occurs by the increase in digestibly, rate of digestion and increased passage rates. Our goal during the winter months is to optimize the use of forages and feedstuffs available through strategic protein supplementation.

Your next question may be; when should I start supplementing and what should I supplement? Supplementation should begin before any weight loss occurs, we recommend in late summer, August or September, because of the decrease in forage quality. Through the month of August to December we want to utilize a medium protein supplement (25% CP), anything less will give no benefit. Then through December to March we want to utilize a high protein supplement (38% CP), but a moderate protein supplement will work well too.

At SilverEdge we have multiple supplementation options available for your beef cattle needs. Choosing the correct option will depend on what works best for you and your operation. Below you will find a list of protein supplement options:

-Wind & Rain Minerals

- Loose Mineral
- Tub Mineral
- -Accuration Range Supplement
- -Rangeland Tubs
- -QLF Liquids
