2008 Wheat Harvest

Ken Jameson, V.P. Grain Division

The 2008 wheat crop is a real mixed bag across our trade territory this year. The Northern Division has a lot of areas that could equal last year's crop if Mother Nature leaves them alone. Other areas up there have suffered some hail loss and drought stress but all things considered, that division has the best potential at this point in time. The Central Division around Garden City shows more drought stress but depending on weather during the filling period could still produce a good crop. The Southern Division has suffered the most this growing season due to lack of moisture. Most of the predictions we are hearing look for a crop around 60-65% of last year.

As of this writing, the only change to our wheat discount schedule is on the allowance for dockage on foreign material. We will be shrinking dockage back to zero this year which is the industry standard. No one we sell wheat to has any tolerance for dockage, so this change will match us up with the rest of the industry. We hope you will continue to take pride in delivering as clean of wheat as possible and express that attitude to your custom cutter. Clean wheat is easier to handle, weighs more, and ultimately means a better price for you.

It is our goal on dockage, test weight, moisture and any other grain handling issue to be fair and competitive. We will monitor the market and if conditions change, we will do our very best to meet the change. In this issue, you will find a copy of the wheat discount schedule.

We will be handling white wheat at Hickok, Garden City B, Friend, Dighton, Utica, and Ransom again this year. Please contact the elevator when you are going to start delivering the white wheat. Discounts for mixed wheat are getting very severe in this new price environment.

Our harvest hours will be whatever you need to the best of our ability. Communication is the key here, especially when harvest is just starting. A call to the elevator letting them know you're going to try cutting, especially if it will be after our normal work hours, is appreciated.

After harvest, remember to bring your tickets with you when you come in to make your divisions with your landlords. Having your tickets will speed up the process and get the grain into your landlords' accounts as soon as possible. We hope you have a safe and trouble-free harvest and appreciate the opportunity to serve you.

New Milo Tax

The United States Department of Agriculture will begin collecting a new grain sorghum tax effective July 1, 2008. This assessment was authorized under the Sorghum Promotion, Research and Information Order and will be similar to the Soybean Checkoff Program. Grain sorghum producers will pay an assessment of six-tenths of one percent (.006) of the net value received by the producer. This amount will be deducted directly from the check when the milo is sold rather than the five-tenths of one percent (.005) per bushel currently being deducted.

County Fair Market Wheat Show

(Finney County Extension Connection by Dean A. Whitehill - Agriculture Agent)

We're all hoping for a great 2008 wheat crop, just need a couple of rains and no hail between now and harvest. With good prices and missing major freeze injury in April, maybe "lady luck" will be on our side.

Speaking of wheat, don't forget to stop by your local grain elevator or the Extension Office to pick up the bags and crop data cards for your county fair market wheat show entries. Once again, the Garden City Co-op and other great sponsors will be providing special awards for the top winners in the Crop Division at the County Fair. With great sponsorships and promotion, it should be a key showcase of the 2008 fair.

Deadline for turning in the samples of wheat will be July 11th. The following Monday, all entries will be taken to the Kansas Grain Inspection Service office in Dodge City for analysis and official testing. The samples and their testing results will be ranked and displayed at the County Fair in August. Contact the Extension Office for more information.

MARKET WHEAT SHOW – Rules as will be printed in the Fair Book Absolute entry deadline will be July 11, 2008 to the Finney County Extension Office or any Finney County Elevator.

- 1. Exhibits shall consist of 5 pounds of wheat.
- 2. All wheat exhibits must be produced during the current year.
- 3. The 5 lb. sample in any container must be submitted to the Finney County Extension Office or any Finney County Elevator no later than July 11, 2008.
- 4. All entries must be made by variety name or number.
- All entries must be combine run; hand picking and/or screening are not allowed.
- 6. A farm may have more than one entry, but only one entry per variety.
- 7. Top scoring entries will automatically be retained by the Finney County Fair and entered at the 2008 Kansas State Fair.


Phosphate Decisions

Phosphate fertilizer is an essential ingredient in any complete fertilizer program. With 10-34-0 prices now approaching \$1000 per ton the question growers need to ask is how likely is this field going to be to a response from applied phosphate? Over the years, Kansas State University has conducted numerous tests on phosphate response across all of the crops commonly grown in our area. Phosphate is immobile in the soil so through soil testing long term trends for fields can be established and the likelihood of a response well defined. The soil test numbers simply tell you which fields will be most likely to show a positive yield response in any give year. It is much like a bank account. You can skip making deposits some years but the account balance will continue to drop.

Bray 1 P test Under 10 ppm – Positive yield response should occur about 90% of the time Bray 1 P test 11 to 20 ppm - Positive yield response should occur about 50% of the time Bray 1 P test 21 to 30 ppm - Positive yield response should occur about 25% of the time Bray 1 P test 31 and higher – Positive yield response should occur about 10% of the time

Ulysses Ag Inputs

It's been a very busy spring for the Ag-Inputs division. The lack of rain in the Ulysses area has produced a shortage of grazing pastures and many producers are having to supplement their cattle with protein tubs and mineral. We offer 2 kinds of protein tubs. They are both 24% protein and 200 pounds. The only difference is one is a urea based protein and the other is an all natural protein. We also have several kinds of Purina Wind & Rain minerals to help keep your cattle in top condition. Purina's Wind and Rain minerals are made by a special trademarked process which makes them resistant to moisture and keeps them from blowing out of the mineral feeder like a normal mineral. We also have IGR (insect growth regulator) minerals that inhibit the growth of flies around your cattle herd. The IGR minerals are available in bags or lick tubs.

I recently attended a LOL/Purina Mills training in Lubbock, Texas, where the official launch of the Honor Show Chow brands announced. I was also certified to sell a new line of LOL/Purina Mills horse feeds called Wellsolve. Garden City Co-op is the only LOL/Purina Mills dealer in Southwestern Kansas certified to sell this product. This new line of horse feed can only be recommended by a veterinarian due to the strict feeding guidelines and the diagnosing of horses with special needs. The Wellsolve line currently consists of 2 kinds of horse feed with more coming in the future. First, Wellsolve L/S is a low starch and sugar diet for horses with special needs. These special needs are Insulin Resistance and /or Equine Metabolic Syndrome, Laminitis, and Cushing's Syndrome. Secondly, Wellsolve W/C(Weight control) helps eliminate obesity in horses with special needs. These special needs are Equine Metabolic Syndrome and /or Insulin Resistance, Laminitis, Cushing's Syndrome or Pituitary Pars Intermedia Dysfunction(PPID) and Horse on stall rest. You may have heard of other brands coming out with similar products that claim the same results, but the Purina Wellsolve line is the only one that has been veterinarian researched, field tested, and also researched at the LongView Animal Nutrition Center in Gray Summit, MO. LOL/Purina Mills is the only feed company with their own research LOL/Purina Mills also uses several universities for research specific to different regions in the country. Ethanol Q & A

Q: What is E-10?

A: E-10 Unleaded is gasoline with 10 percent ethanol. It can be used in any gas-powered car.

Q: Does E-10 make egines run hotter?

A: No. The ethanol in E-10 Unleaded actually helps keep your engine cooler, since the ethanol in the fuel combusts at a lower temperature. In fact, many high-powered racing engines use pure alcohol for that very reason.

Q: Is E-10 bad for fuel injectors?

A: No. Ethanol and E-10 Unleaded have never contributed to burning or fouling of port fuel injectors. Some components in gasoline, such as olefins, have been identified as causing deposits that can foul injectors. Because ethanol burns 100% and leaves no resideue, it can't contribute to the formation of deposits. The ethanol in E-10 actually keeps fuel injectors cleaner-helping improve engine performance. It does not increase corrosion, nor will it harm any seals or valves.

Q: Does E-10 cause vapor lock?

A: No. Vapor pressure specifications of gasoline continue to be lowered by state and federal statute, virtually eliminating the vapor lock problems that were reported in the past. The vapor pressur of gasoline is set by state law, and is lower in the spring and summer than in the fall and winter. Vapor lock usually occurs when a winter grade of gasoline formulated for cold weather starts is used under summer-like conditions. (Remember: 90% of E-10 Unleaded is gasoline, so the formulation of the base gasoline has a dramatic effect on performance.) Also, all major auto manufacturers now have in-tank fuel pumps which are not subject to vapor lock like the older in-line fuel pumps.

Q: Does E-10 plug fuel lines?

A: No. Today occurrences of plugged fuel filters are virtually non-existent. The cleansing nature of E-10 can actually keep your fuel system cleaner and lead to improved performance. In the case of dirty fuel systems, contaminants and residues that have been deposited by previous gasoline fills can be loosened. That residue can get caught in the fuel filter. In older cars, especially those made prior to 1975, replacing the filter solves the problem, and once your fuel system is clean, your car's performance should improve as well.

Q: Does 10% ethanol reduce gas mileage?

A: No. Many variables affect fuel economy, including seasons, the weather, the state of your car, road grade, tire pressure, and the use of air conditioners. Most drivers using E-10 see an increase or no difference in fuel economy.

Q: Why do some auto mechanics tell people not to use E-10?

A: A mechanic who says not to use E-10 simply does not have correct information-particularly since every major automaker in the world approves the use of 10 percent ethanol fuel.

Who would have ever dreamed that farm diesel could be over \$4.00 a gallon. 6 years ago when diesel got over \$1.00 a gallon we were wondering why it was so high and it's just gotten worse. The days of paying only \$1.00 a gallon are long gone and now are only part of history. The fuel market is the most volatile that it has ever been. In one day closing on markets, we can see prices move up or down in increments that used to take a week or more for the same change. The only advice one can really consider is that if you need fuel and can hold it, then get it. It happens only too often when we think we can wait just a few more days before we order and wind up paying an extra 10 or 15 cents a gallon.

Since our last newsletter, the sale of Country Corner Truck Stop and the other AFS locations in Garden City has been finalized. It will now be operated by U Pump It Kansas, a name we're all familiar with in this area. U Pump It has an excellent history with the operation of convenience stores and we at Garden City Co-op, Inc. feel that they will do a fantastic job. The staff at Country Corner will remain the same and you shouldn't notice any major changes in the way it will affect your business. Your Garden City Co-op, Inc. charge cards are still active at all Garden City locations along with Pierceville, Dighton, Ransom, Arnold and Brownell. Q: Can E-10 be used in older cars?

Crop Production Update

With spring planting season coming to a close and wheat harvest not that far away, it's time to step back and take a breather. Even though we have had a lot of high winds and hail, most crops are in good shape. Our planting season has been more spread out this year compared to last year and we seem to have been able to keep up with all of our customers' needs. Fertilizer and chemical prices are still on a continual increase with no end in sight. In the U.S., we import approximately 60% of our fertilizer needs every year and as long as China and India's fertilizer needs increase at the levels they have, we will see shortages in this country and in turn higher prices will be the rule.

The Kansas Wheat Harvest Program includes a toll-free number — (877) 251-4328 — farmers can call to be matched with custom cutters. The number will be staffed from 6 to 9 a.m. and 6 to 9 p.m., seven days a week, and have 24-hour voicemail service. In addition, staff can be reached at WheatHarvest@KansasCommerce.com.

The program also includes written and audio harvest reports, which will be available daily at KansasCommerce .com and KSWheat.com.

"We know how important the wheat harvest is to our state," said Kansas Department of Commerce Secretary David Kerr. "We're excited to partner with Kansas Wheat on this year's Kansas Wheat Harvest Program, and I'm optimistic these services will help Kansas farmers find the cutters they need for a successful harvest."

Kansas Wheat is the cooperative agreement between the Kansas Wheat Commission and the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers.

industry sources they quickly collected market and logistical information. The Garden City Co-op management and board worked with WindRiver to quickly purchase and erect the cover-all storage system that holds 2 million bushels. Unfortunately, it was not completed until later in fall harvest but it was still a heroic effort that only began when we knew we had a problem in July. Had we not had the relationship with WindRiver to quickly get the project under way, fall harvest would have had an even more difficult ending. The good news is that it is there ready to go for this fall. The construction of 2 million more bushels of capacity is equal to the expansion of new concrete storage that the Garden City Co-op undertook in 1998 and 1999. The coverall stood up under extreme wind and hail (although I hear the hailstones ricocheting off the canvas was spectacular). The location by the end user makes the most sense for us, WindRiver and the ethanol plant. That all adds up to the best location to efficiently serve you.

WindRiver has been there to help us fulfill our mission of serving grain farmers in Western Kansas. The close relationship has helped all involved to be successful. It just goes to show that the best deal may not be the one you ruthlessly negotiate; it may be the one you share in by working together. No one understands that better than WindRiver. Happy Birthday WindRiver Grain

They have just completed their tenth year. WindRiver Grain is the kind of sweetheart investment we all dream about. They have just completed their audit and the return on our investment for this year is 45%. We have received 2.85 times our original investment back in total earnings and 85% of that has been in cash. That equates to a 28.5% average annual return over the 10 years. Who wouldn't love some of that action!

It would be easy to look at those returns and assume someone is getting taken. You would think that either they are not paying enough for your grain that gets shipped through them or they were charging their customers too much. The truth is that the markets would not allow that behavior on a single transaction let alone maintain an unfair advantage over 10 years. So how do they do it?

I can only explain part of their success through a financial evaluation and that would miss the main point. I believe WindRiver is mostly successful because of the people that work there and their ability to develop long term open relationships with customers that for 10 years have been truly "win-win". Lots of good things for the business come from those relationships like huge volume, good logistical planning and efficient operations.

WindRiver shipped 73 trains of grain in the last year. That is an average of a train every 5 days. A train is equal to approximately 400,000 bushels. To keep that in perspective that would be like loading and unloading the Wolf elevator every 10 days all year long. That does not take into account the roughly 20 million bushels of grain that was shipped by truck and not rail. You can see why the crew at WindRiver is seldom looking for something to do.

Bob Tempel and the people at WindRiver have kept serving western Kansas farmers at the center of their thoughts. The Garden City Co-op and the Scott Co-op provide over 90% of the grain volume that WindRiver handles. In return, they provide us access to the best markets allowing for our grain division's successes in finding the best prices and timely service. The people of WindRiver have provided that service while maintaining great relationships with the BNSF, the WindRiver ownership group, and area feedlot customers. Of course, the new ethanol plant in Garden City is located right next to WindRiver and they buy all of their grain from WindRiver. That relationship has grown into sales not only for the Garden City plant but also the new ethanol plant in Liberal. Ethanol has been a huge boost for grain producers across the nation and we

are excited that they are having such a positive impact locally. WindRiver is right in the middle of it.

Anytime you handle that much volume and have that many different relationships all having competing needs, difficult circumstances can emerge. A perfect example would be last year's fall harvest. We had a well thought out plan for moving the wheat out through unit trains to the gulf. We lost the California flour mill market because our wheat was so low in protein. Then a series of unlikely transportation events across the US began to unfold, eventually resulting in the port at Houston being embargoed. That left us no trains to ship wheat and nowhere to go with the wheat if we could have got the trains.

Because of WindRiver's good relationship with the BNSF and
