# 2007 Fall Harvest

The 2007 Fall Harvest is fast approaching as Mother Nature's furnace pushes it along. As usual, the summer rain patterns will dictate the size of the crop but over our entire trade territory, it looks like this fall's harvest could be larger than last year's.

Making space for this fall's crops has been the most challenging we have ever seen. Between rail embargos at the gulf and a shortage of trucks, we are behind in getting the wheat shipped out. Now with the heat pushing harvest up on us, we have no doubts that we will still be shipping wheat during harvest. We have a plan in place to get the wheat out but it is very frustrating that the pace of movement is so slow. Our goal is to handle everything you want to deliver to us this fall but it will be a challenge to get everything under cover.

Our shrink and drying schedules for all grains remain unchanged from last year. A copy is included in this Western Farmer and it can also be found on our website.

Our grain handling locations will remain unchanged from last year's for fall crops. Elevators receiving corn will be Garden City, Deerfield, Wolf, Lowe, Gano, Pierceville, Charleston, Amy, Dighton, Shields, Utica, Arnold, Ransom, Hickok, Ulysses, Milepost, and Lakin. Maximum moisture received is on an elevator by elevator basis depending on their situation, so check with the elevator before delivering. All elevators will receive milo, and again, moisture maximums will depend on each elevator's situation. Elevators receiving soybeans will be Garden City, Deerfield, Pierceville, Wolf, Tennis, Charleston, Dighton, Hickok, Ulysses, and Lakin, with the maximum moisture 13%. If one elevator cannot handle a particular load, check with us because we probably can at one of the other locations. It just takes a little communication on both our parts.

We will be receiving Nu-Sun sunflowers only at Friend, Dighton, and Ulysses. Each load will stand on its own except for the oil premium or discount where we will use a three load composite sample. Our discount-premium schedule will be the same as the Northern Sun's plant in Goodland, Kansas. Maximum moisture we will receive will be 10%, no exceptions, so do not cut a truck load sample. We will require all sunflowers to be sold by March 31, 2007 because we will need the space for wheat harvest.

Harvest is always a pressure filled time for everyone involved but we want to remind you to take the time to do whatever the job is safely. No crop is worth a life or limb and we see you as friend, not just a customer, and we want to see you walk thru our office doors for years to come. We appreciate your business and know it is something we have to earn everyday.

### 2007 Growing Season

The 2007 growing season has been like two completely different years. After encountering lowa like weather for most of the season, we returned to reality with the heat, drought and violent storms of August.

By early July, Gray Leaf Spot infestations had started and with cool / wet conditions, this disease made rapid advancement. Most fields were sprayed with a fungicide and the disease was controlled for most of the month of July and early August. The heat hit about the time residual control from fungicide applications on this disease started to lapse.

By early August, the heat took over and continued to suppress further disease development. Unfortunately, this same heat encouraged development of Spider Mites. We encountered very rapid buildup of mite populations through the first 3 weeks of August and decisions on treatment were very difficult due to the maturity of the crop. Does it pay to treat for Spider Mites in Hard Dough to early dent corn? I wish there were a definitive answer to this question. Established economic thresholds for treatment of Spider Mites do not take into account the growth stage of the crop but common sense would say that the later in the season this problem occurs, the less impact it will have on yields. The goal in using miteacides is to maintain plant health through maturity. If spider mites get to the point where they are shutting corn plants down early, yield loss most certainly occurs. It doesn't really matter if it's disease, mites or moisture stress that causes this premature death. What follows is shriveled grain, inconsistent grain moisture, stalk rot and crop lodging.

The violent storms returned toward the end of August. In some cases this was just not hail but wind damage as well. Like the foliar disease and insect problems mentioned above, hail damage at later growth stages in a corn crop will have less impact on the final yields but yield loss occurs to some extent right up to harvest. Following is a late season hail defoliation chart. Numbers under each defoliation percentage estimate expected yield loss and different growth stages.

# K-State's Grain Specialist Lists Top 10 Grain Storage Tips

(Finney County Extension Connection - Summer 2007)

Insects and molds can be a concern for elevator managers and producers with on-farm storage each year. After all, managers are responsible for approximately \$3 billion worth of grain during bumper crop years, when their storage facilities are at maximum capacity, according to Joe Harner, Extension Engineer for Grain and Livestock Systems at Kansas State University. "Whoever is responsible for managing stored grain should take their investment management job as seriously as a banker", Harner said.

He estimated that insects and mold create a loss of 10 cents per bushel across the country. In Kansas where storage capacity exceeds one billion bushels, that is an annual loss of \$100 million, or about \$40 per Kansan.

There are ways, however, to prevent this type of loss in on-farm and commercial grain storage. Harner provides the following to be what he considers as his top 10 Grain Storage Management Tips:

- 1. Make sure facilities are cleaned inside and outside. Any place an insect can live must be cleaned. Places where physical cleaning is not possible must be cleaned using chemicals.
- Cool grain as quickly as possible. The recommended temperature of cooled grain is 70 degrees F. in warmer months and 35 to 40F in cooler months.
- 3. Be aware of incoming moisture and remember that aeration fans are not intended to dry grain, but to cool it. High moisture grain entering storage can create problems.
- 4. Adjust harvesting and handling equipment to decrease the amount of broken kernels and unwanted material. The more broken kernels, the more surface area exposed for insects to nibble. Equipment, excessive handling, or dry grain are the three leading causes of broken kernels.
- Clean grain is important. Weedy material usually has a higher moisture content than grain and may accumulate in isolated pockets which can interfere with aeration, making areas more difficult to cool.
- 6. Monitor the temperature, moisture and odor of stored grain with scheduled inspection times. Inspection should be every two weeks once grain and outdoor air temperatures are above 45 F.
- 7. Pay attention and be observant because most problems can be fixed early. While odor is a good indicator of grain spoilage, moisture may be another good indicator. Slimy grain and drip spots on the underside of a roof are indications of too much moisture.
- 8. Safety first. Safety should be first and foremost on the minds of everyone working near grain storage facilities. Use caution and follow all guidelines when using chemicals and entering storage facilities. Always follow the buddy system and have a life-line firmly attached. For safety reasons, have at least two people present when sampling grain bins.
- Have a marketing plan and use it to help develop a management strategy to maintain stored grain quality. During warmer weather months, it may be necessary to re-warm the grain to prevent moisture migration due to temperature differences within a grain bin.
- 10. Be prepared to make quick decisions about grain storage problems once they are detected. To prevent further damage of stored grain, that is heating, it should be cooled, turned or marketed as soon as possible.
