SPRING APPLICATIONS

You should have received your 2025 Spring Application in the mail. If you have not, please let your agent know and we will be sure to get one to you. Updates to your personal information, such as a change of address, marital status update, or you've changed your SSN to a business EIN, must be indicated on your renewal. Please make sure that all phone numbers listed are active. This is not only helpful to your agent and underwriter, but also to the claims adjusters, in the event that you have a claim, need a bin measurement or an appraisal on your crops. Please look over your renewal to ensure that all information is correct. If you are not making changes to your renewal, no further action is required, as your policy will automatically renew with the same information and coverage as the previous year. If you are making changes to your policy coverage or personal information, you must have your renewal returned no later than March 15, 2025. Please contact your agent if you'd like to discuss changes in coverage or if you'd like to review the coverage that you currently have on your policy.

"The Good, The Bad and The Ugly"

Over the last few articles, I've described what I believe to be a longer-term trend in commodity markets. Unfortunately (or fortunately) we are in the final phase of this trend, "The Ugly". The optimist in me says just hold on as better days are ahead. The realist in me says buckle up and brace for impact.

Last week the USDA announced updated US Supply and Demand data along with World Stocks and production. US Corn production was reduced by nearly 300 million bushels due to a drop in national yield from 183.1 to 179.3. The largest yield reductions came from NE (-6%), IN (-11%), MN (-9%) and KS (-9%). Stocks to use ratio also fell to an estimated 10.2% from 13.3% in October 2024. World S/D data is also slightly lower.

US Soybean data was also supportive as the USDA lowered national yield from 51.7 to 50.7 here at home. Again, large reductions came from KS, SD, IN, IL, IA and OH due to late season dryness. US exports and crush were unchanged. Chinese imports of beans were also unchanged. In South America, the USDA left Argentina production unchanged at 52 MMT and Brazil at 169 MMT. The soybean complex will remain focused on weather and managed money short covering.

Although these reports do provide general optimism for the market, I remain concerned about the days/weeks ahead. Politicians in DC have passed a measure to inject capital into the ag economy for row crop and specialty growers as well as livestock operators. This capital should be used wisely as the projected cost of production for this spring planting season seems to be stubbornly steady. Tarriff discussions from the incoming administration could also provide untimely headwinds along with immigration (farm labor) and SAF (sustainable aviation fuel). Details on all three of these geo-political fronts remain murky at best.

Without a weather-related issue somewhere (hopefully not yours!) and ending stocks that are still in a surplus situation I believe that farmers need to be taking advantage of upside opportunity with any number of hedging tools.

Wishing you all a safe and successful spring planting and let's hope there are better days ahead!

For some crops listed, you will see a 10 to 25-day late planting period. If you plant your crop during this period, your coverage will be reduced by 1% per day. All prevented planted acres must be reported within 72 hours after the late planting period. If you have no intention to plant due to poor planting conditions, please report prevented planting intentions immediately. Failure to report PP acre within the time allowed may cause the PP payments to be rejected. Plant dates vary per county, so please check with your agent if you are unsure of which plant date corresponds with your county.

Spartan Management Corner

Spartan Insurance is an independent LLC that offers crop and livestock insurance to producers through a reinsurance entity referred to as an Authorized Insurance Provider (AIP). These AIPs are a vital part of the industry.

The AIPs are state-chartered, property and casualty insurance companies authorized to sell and service federal crop and livestock insurance regulated by USDA.

AIPs must comply with the rules outlined in the Standard Reinsurance Agreement (SRA) and/or Livestock Price Reinsurance Agreement (LPRA) with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC). Currently, 12 AIPs offer coverage for more than 130 crops and livestock. Spartan currently works with 6 of these companies. The AIPs that Spartan Insurance works with are:

- AgriSompo
- Crop Risk Services which was recently purchased by Great American **Insurance Group**
- **Great American Insurance Group**
- NAU Country A QBE Insurance Company
- Rain and Hail A Chubb Company
- **RCIS**
- Hudson

The Multi-Peril Crop Insurance (MPCI) products from the AIPs are all the same because the price is regulated by the Federal government. However, private products and hail policies may vary. These products can provide unique coverage opportunities for the farmers, depending on their needs, which influences what AIP Spartan works with. Just as Spartan prides itself on customer service, it is also committed to collaborating with AIPs that share this focus. The ability to service and pay claims quickly and accurately to our producers is an important aspect of the AIPs that Spartan works with.

Spartan agents are dedicated to staying well informed about all the private products that are offered by the AIPs, so if you hear of a product that might work well for your operation, please ask your agent about it.

Spring Production

If you have not mailed in your Spring Production Report yet, please do so at your earliest convenience. The claims deadline for production losses and decline in price was December 10. All production reports are due no later than April 29th, however returning them earlier is suggested.
