Grain Comments by Doug Biswell

Two very familiar words sum up why the grain markets are trading at their current levels Hot and Dry. Our area of has seen more the extremes in the weather this summer than a lot of other areas of the corn belt, but nonetheless it has not been and ideal summer for growing corn and soybeans. **There** were many records set in the month of July for the warmest daily average temperatures through all of the major corn growing area with the slight exception of Nebraska and the Dakotas. It was just last year that we saw the effects nighttime of warm temperatures national on corn yields. There are some private forecasters believe the national yield can be below 150 bushel per acre maybe even as low at the lower 140 bushel per acre range. What does this mean? We would need to ration a substantial amount of demand; this rationing gets most easily with done sustained high prices. The soybean supply situation is very tight also, but we have our friends to the south who grow more beans than we do. those South American beans do factor into the calculation of the bean value at only 1.9 times than that of corn. Wheat has ridden the coat tails of the corn rally. Lower quality Hard Red Winter

Wheat and Soft Red Winter Wheat has found their way into feed rations in certain areas of the country, especially the southeastern poultry market. Some wheat is also being used in some of the ethanol grind in the east. It is setting up to be a very wild year.

Feed Department - By Rod Bohn

Feed ingredient prices continue to go up. Based on August 29 prices, dry distillers grain can be contracted for winter use at \$260 per ton plus delivery from the Coop. Corn gluten pellets can be contracted for \$260 per ton plus delivery from the Coop. Crimped corn is \$275 per ton plus delivery, so you can see there are no bargains to feed available cattle. These prices may change at any time and I would need to before the suppliers locking any prices for you.

Alfalfa hay supplies are very short and the price may be \$175 to \$200 per ton if you can find any. Grass hay prices are over \$100 per ton. These prices probably won't go down for awhile.

For beef cows, one of the more economical feeds is Loomix liquid supplement with a price of \$500 per ton delivered. The lick tubs are provided for no additional cost. Intakes are 1½ to 2 lbs. per head per day and this provides protein plus all the minerals and vitamins. Free choice salt is needed.

Rangeland Tubs 30% are \$861 per ton if you buy 8 tubs or more. Intakes are 1 pound

per head per day with good mineral and vitamin content.

The current economics of feeding cattle have never been seen before with even more risk involved than ever. Most feeders plan to move ahead anyway since it's hard to jump out and jump back in later.

It's already time to start thinking about how we are going to winterize diesel tanks. The RFD program automatically starts delivering blended diesel towards the end of October or early November, basically, as soon

as the fuel refineries start making #1 diesel. If anyone does not want a blended product, please call in and let me know. Last year I had a couple patrons call in wanting to know why they had winter diesel in their tanks. You do not have to get winter diesel if you don't think you need it. The Manhattan and Alta Vista bulk plants will be blended by November 1st. Our local trucks will also be able to custom blend the fuel that is already in tanks. We will have #1 diesel available for delivery as soon as we can get it. Any concerns or questions are always welcome.
