ame lodge is not always synonymous with hunting lodge. Kenya is one country, in fact, which has over the years made efforts to preserve its abundant and diverse wildlife by creating game reserves and national parks. Animals, and vegetation, thus protected not only aid in maintaining an ecological balance in the region but can also be a source of revenue through tourism. An absolutely breath-taking natural landscape attracts leisure-privileged tourists, while others are by the spectacle of animals in their natural habitat, the game lodges provide the opportunity for indulging in

both pastimes — being the antithesis of

the urban zoo, among other things.


The two lodges presented here, although clearly falling within the category of hotels, are unobtrusive and sympathetic attempts to create reasonably comfortable shelters for recreation without marring the landscape. First built in the early 1970's in a period of general economic expansion, and having received extensions in the early 1980's, the Amboseli and Mara lodges sought a 'low-profile' image in terms of the natural setting, yet went a step further. At the risk of being criticised as quaint and picturesque in purely architectural terms at the time, the designers opted for a solution inspired by the local Masai tribal encampments. (Today, after the upsurge of traditionalist, populist, or even postmodernist trends, perhaps they seem more respectably contemporary.) Be that as it may, the one-storey, roughcoated concrete units for sleeping and for


recreation have been grouped in the form of a Masai *manyatta* slightly modified and following the slope of the terrain. The adjoining individual huts are thus afforded panoramic views onto nature and the wildlife of the reserve.

A respect for the site at both Amboseli and Mara, and the choice of an architectural language stemming from indigenous rural dwelling types (although of masonry construction here) have meant that the complexes are practically one with their surroundings after a relatively short length of time. They do not detract by being out of scale or ostentatious, from the principal purpose of a visit, namely to appreciate the extraordinary natural milieu.
