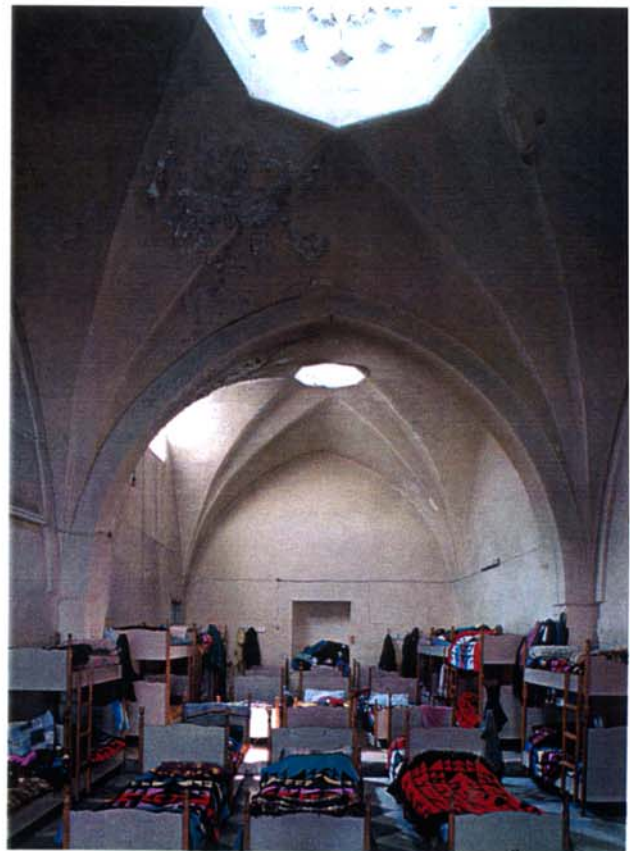




Above: The Dar al-Aytam complex is built in mostly stone, and dates back mainly to Turkish rule.



Right: Beds in the Dar al-Aytam complex which incorporates an orphanage, a training school and a secondary school.



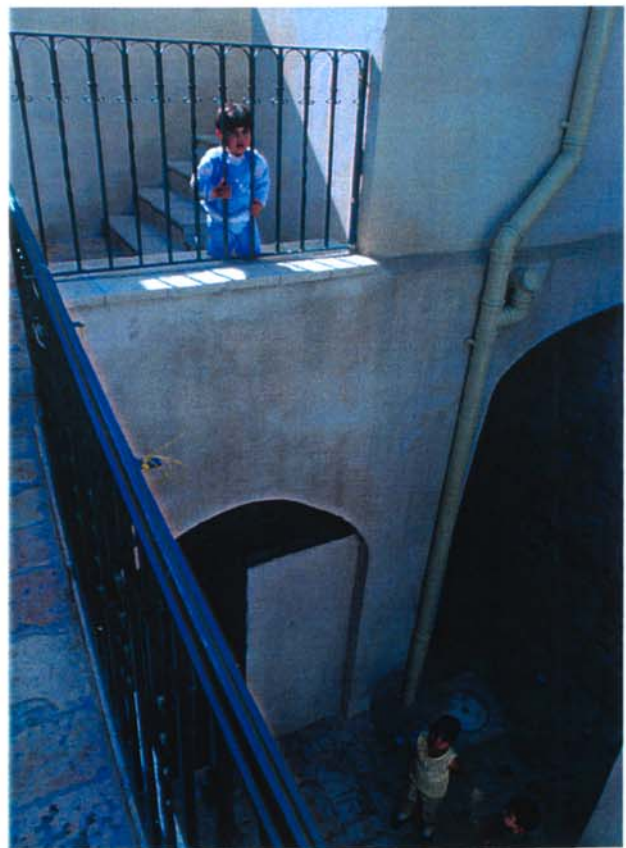
Above: At Hosh al-Gheith, as in most of the old town, main materials used in reconstruction are local stone and lime mortar.

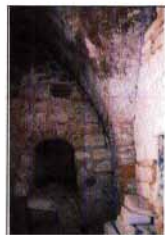

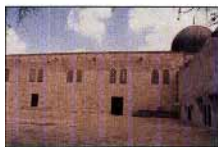
