STATISTICS FROM THE U.S. CENSUS BUREAU'S 2017 AMERICAN COMMUNITY SURVEY

In this year's summary of recently released Census statistics, we highlight immigrant families who contribute to New York City's dynamic demographics.

More than 3 million NYC residents in 2017 were born outside of the United States (i.e., foreign-born), this includes around 130,000 children. Almost 1 million children (54%) had at least one foreign-born parent. The remaining 820,000 children (45%) lived in household where both parents were born in the United States (i.e., native born).


Within the foreign-born population, 1.7 million were U.S. citizens by naturalization, and 1.5 million were non-U.S. citizens, including lawful permanent residents, temporary migrants (i.e., foreign students), humanitarian migrants (i.e., refugees), and unauthorized migrants.

Native-born households had a median income (\$67,048) 15.2% higher than foreign-born naturalized households (\$58, 162), and 38.7% higher than non-U.S. citizens (\$48,328). However, foreign-born naturalized citizens were less likely to be in poverty compared to native-born residents, while foreign-born non-citizens were most likely to live in poverty. These differences are magnified for families with children.



In nine Community Districts (CDs) foreign-born residents are more than 50% of the population: Elmhurst/Corona (Q04); Jackson Heights, (Q03); Flushing (Q07); Bensonhurst (K11); Sunnyside/Woodside (Q02); Woodhaven (Q09); Coney Island (K13); East Flatbush (K17); and Sheepshead Bay (K15).

Overall, 7.2% of NYC residents did not have health insurance in 2017, but the uninsured rates for foreign-born residents (12.3%) was triple that of the native population (4.1%). The number of uninsured individuals varied by borough, with Queens and Brooklyn having the largest number of uninsured individuals.
