A Message from Keith

I heard a scientist explain how time is relative. If you want to argue, I get it; it doesn't seem logical to think that time can be different for different people. But as the scientist explained, one year of life to a 7-year-old boy is 14% of his existence, while one year to an 80-year-old man is just 1.25% of his. What does that mean? It simply means that time feels like it

speeds up as we get older because each year occupies a smaller percentage of our life. I won't argue with that; the older I get, the more time seems to slip by unnoticed.

It's February, and I'm still writing 2024 on my checks. Where did January go? Time gets lost so easily, and that's a problem in the life of the church. When we fail to grasp the urgency of every moment, we miss opportunities to engage in life-giving activities.

As we move through 2025 (I'm using the right year now!), my prayer is that we'll make a conscious effort to utilize every moment. What might God be calling you to accomplish in 2025? Maybe your goal is personal, like strengthening your spiritual disciplines — prayer, scripture reading or connecting with a small group. Or perhaps it's communal, such as starting a new mission project or ministry.

One thing I know for sure: if we don't plan to use our time, it will pass anyway. The choice is ours — it can either be productive or wasted. Let's choose to use it to the fullest. As a revival preacher once said, "You never know when your final moment will be." So, how are you going to spend your time? It only speeds up from here. Make a plan to grow closer to God and contribute to God's work in this fast-moving year.

Read what Bettie Ross, one of our Stephen Ministers, has to say about this meaningful ministry:

"How are you?" is a familiar greeting.

Do you ever reply, "I'm doing just fine," when you're not? I know that I have. Most Sundays at Parkway Heights as I am walking across the Atrium or going up or down in the elevator, someone will greet me and ask, "How are you?" In the process of going from one place to another, I usually pause and quickly respond, "I'm good." To those whom I know well, I may more accurately reply, "I'm trying to be good." Longtime friends who are more familiar with my distractions and activities may hear me say, "I'm either good or haven't been caught." I appreciate the greeting and interest, but I have a gut feeling the question is not an invitation for a comprehensive inventory of my current status.

If my life is any measure of reality, we all experience ups and downs. There are times when we are dealing with a challenge that is more than we feel equipped to manage. Stephen Ministry is a service for those times when you are not doing "just fine." I can recall times when I might have requested a Stephen Minister, if such a service had been available.

Parkway Heights now has Stephen Ministers available. These individuals have received extensive training to serve people who are experiencing challenging situations. Stephen Ministers are available to support, encourage, listen, comfort and care with confidentiality and with the help of God. Stephen Ministers will be individually assigned by our supervising minister, Julie Collins.

Bereavement Team members will greet guests in the parking lot (if needed) and at Atrium doors, provide direction inside the Atrium, assist with bulletins and clean up in the Sanctuary or Founders Hall following a funeral. Six teams of five-seven people will serve for two months out of the year. The months will change year to year, so no team has Thanksgiving or Christmas every year. When a death occurs, team leaders will be contacted. Team leaders will then contact their team to secure enough people to assist with the visitation and funeral.


