



BACKGROUND

Pamela Fuller, our church organist and pianist, has been around music her whole life. Pamela followed in her mother's footsteps, as she was also a professional musician, who plays the organ and piano.

Pamela said she loved playing the piano as a child most of the time, except when it came time for recitals, which she hated.

Thankfully for us, Pamela grew out of her dislike of performances and began to love everything about the expressiveness of the piano. She said it became "her voice" when she couldn't identify what was bothering her. She spent hours each night after dinner at the piano, which also got her out of doing the dishes!

She said, "Chopin became really good company."

For her senior recital in high school, her mother talked her into playing the organ for two pieces. The rest is history! She attended the University of Southern Mississippi, where she studied organ, harpsichord and piano. However, her first set of degrees are a BS in Psychology and a MS in Family and Consumer Science.

Pamela grew up with her parents and three siblings in Gulfport, where she was exposed to lots of boating and skiing. She also grew up close to her grandparents, with both sets living in Gulfport, as well. She credits both of her grandmothers for passing down their gifts of creativity, cooking and sewing to her.

MUSIC MINISTRY

Pamela has worked in church music since high school, when she took her first job at Trinity UMC in Gulfport. Since then, she has worked in church music in several different states, including Virginia where she studied the organ more extensively. There, she also was director of music in a large United Methodist Church where she led youth choir, children's choir, handbells, men's chorus, adult choir and more.

She moved back to Hattiesburg in 2000 and began serving several churches in the Hattiesburg area. She finished her Bachelor of Music degree in piano in 2012 and a Master of Music Education in 2013. She began teaching music and art at The 3D School in Petal and has been there ever since. She added Parkway Heights to her resume in 2020.

Pamela said that she loves the way the music at Parkway Heights is challenging and that there is always another project to work toward. The music is thematically connected to the scripture or the liturgical season, and she likes this structure.

When she's not partying with the choir, Pamela enjoys traveling and working with her hands through mosaics, pottery, crocheting, gardening, sewing or painting.


