## Go Deep

## Colossians 3:20-21

- "If every Christian home were a training school for his service, more spiritual growth would take place than could be accomplished through preaching" (Andrew Murray). Do you agree that the home should be a training school for God's service? What would it take for a family to become a training school? What would be required of the parents? What would be required of the children?
- 2. If we kept in mind that our children really belong to God and we are raising them for him, what difference would that make in the parent/child relationship?
- 3. *Read Colossians 3:20-21*. How do these verses match up with the American cultural view of family? What challenges might parents face if they do family God's way instead of the American way?
- 4. *Read 3:20*. How might a parent make it difficult for their children to obey this command? Why is it important for children to obey "in everything"? How strict out a parent to be in this regard?
- 5. Notice that the child's motive for obedience is "to please the Lord," not to please the parent. What difference should that make in the parent/child relationship?
- 6. *Read Colossians 3:21*. Do fathers and mothers share the same role in parenting? Why does he single out fathers here?
- 7. What things embitter children? What discourages them? How can a parent demand obedience but not embitter their child? Where does the gospel come in?
- 8. What role do grandparents play in the Christian family?
- 9. What do parents need from our church to succeed in raising their kids for God?
