Transition Team Update: CAT Results Presentation for Congregation on June 14

As most of you know, on Sunday, April 30 Immanuel's Transition Team received the interpretation of the results of the CAT – the **Congregational Assessment Tool** that members completed during March and April. Diane McClanahan from the Des Moines Pastoral Counseling Center presented the assessment results & interpretive reports to the Transition Team and some members of the Church Council, over approximately 4 hours. We received a whole lot of great information about Immanuel! Here are just a few highlights of the CAT results along with some info about future plans.

We learned that we are a Ministry-centered congregation – the things that we as members

focus on most here at Immanuel are our ministries and programs. The CAT calls these the "Drivers". Your answers on the CAT tell us that we focus on worship, we focus on education, we focus on the whole spirit of the congregation and our involvement as members.

We learned that Immanuel is a **"Hearth & Home" church** – we are theologically conservative and we are settled in our approach to the style of church. We love our traditions, we invite each other to our faith because we are a family, we know that being part of Immanuel gives us a sense of comfort like settling into your most comfortable chair by the fireplace at home. Based on these aspects of our congregational

'make-up' along with others, we have a tendency to be resistant to change.

But you have also told us through the CAT that we need to make changes – some of our overall priorities are to make the **necessary changes** to attract families with children and youth, to create strategies to reach new people and incorporate them into the life of Immanuel, to create more opportunities for all of us to form meaningful relationships through small groups.

Again, these are just a few of the highlights from dozens of pages of information that we received. Like all churches then, <u>we have some work to do</u>! The Transition Team is continuing to work with Diane McClanahan from the Des Moines Pastoral Counseling Center, and with the Church Council one of the first things we have committed to is an **Executive Summary-type presentation of all of the CAT results, that is open to all of you in the congregation to attend. The Transition Team has scheduled this presentation for Wednesday evening, June 14 @ 5:30 p.m. at the Church. We will have free pizza and beverages for all of you, along with child care set up so you can bring the whole family! And, by the way, it will not be a 4 hour meeting! We will have the presentation along with time for questions and answers, all in less than 2 hours!**

In the near future also, the Transition Team will be meeting with the Church Council Executive Board, to start to dissect the CAT results and all this info. Some of the info we received, some of the priorities that you told us about – we recommend starting to work on those right away, with some of that work going to the Church Council. The CAT is an important part of the Transition Team's charge: to listen to the congregation and the Holy Spirit to craft a picture of who we are as the people of Immanuel, what specific mission God has us on, and what it will take for us to accomplish that mission, including future staff configuration.

The Transition Team can't thank all of you enough for all your efforts you put into completing the CAT – we ended up with 229 responses. The Transition Team is really excited about the info we received from you, and asks for your patience and prayers as we continue this most important work!

Grounds for Change is a family owned and operated coffee roasting business located in the Pacific Northwest. We roast our 100% Fair Trade, Organic coffee in small batches to ensure that you receive the freshest coffee possible.

All of our coffee is **Fair Trade Certified** by IMO and our **Organic Certification** meets the stringent Organic Processor Standards enforced by the United States Federal Government and the Washington State Department of Agriculture. The vast majority of the coffee we sell is also **Shade Grown Coffee** which ensures healthy habitat for migratory birds.

A number of community-based programs in coffee-growing countries directly benefit from the purchase of our coffee. For example, farmers in Peru and Mexico receive a higher price per pound for their coffee (above and beyond the going rate for



certified coffee) to help support local domestic violence intervention programs and small business loans for women.

With the help of organic and fair trade premiums, much has been accomplished in the rural communities of coffee-producing countries, from improvement in the local economies, better diets, improved sanitation and new wet-processing mills for green coffee beans. However, the marginalization of women in these rural communities continues. In the urban areas of Peru, for example, the abuse rate is estimated at 40% and in the rural communities the rate is far greater.

With little money to count on, a coffee family generally prefers to invest available resources in educating the sons. The daughters stay home and devote themselves to chores around the house and watching over the farm. They usually marry between 12 and 16 years of age and until now, women have only been allowed to participate in the domestic work of the home. If they were allowed to join work groups, it was only in a passive role.

In 2003, the first conference of Women Coffee Producers was held in Northern Peru. The concept of separating these women producers' coffee from the rest of the fair-trade co-op's production was a new idea, developed by the fair-trade co-op, their organic coffee trading partners, and the women themselves, searching for ideas that would improve their living conditions. The women's conferences focus on building self-esteem, leadership, and sharing experiences. The women's response to these organizational activities has been amazing, as has the support offered by community leaders.

The coffee buyer for PROASSA (an organic trading company in Peru), who travels to the producing regions and works with the growers on a regular basis, is a woman named Isabel Latorre and the first agronomist sent by PROASSA to educate the farmers in organic agriculture was also a woman, Maria Chubas. They are both setting examples for these communities and their leadership has helped to pave the way for other talented women within the co-op.

There are currently well over 1000 women coffee farmers involved with the Cafe Femenino Coffee Project in Peru. The women farmers participate in all farm activities: preparing the terrain, nurseries, and the compost to fertilize the soil; preparing bio-fertilizers; as well as harvesting, de-pulping, fermenting, and drying the coffee. It is very rare for women to participate in selling coffee or in deciding how the money from coffee sales will be used - all of which they do with Cafe Femenino.

Once the coffee leaves the co-op, all sales contracts for Cafe Femenino must be signed and committed to by a woman, and a woman must participate in the sales and marketing of this coffee. An extra two cents per pound above the fair-trade price for green coffee is paid by the US importer of Cafe Femenino, and these funds provide income that goes directly to the women producers - the use of this money is for them alone to decide.

Grounds for Change donates an additional 10 cents for each pound of Cafe Femenino sold directly back to this women's coffee growing project to fund annual grants requested by the members. This year, thanks to the continuing support of our customers, we funded the completion of an important culvert in Nueva York, Peru (one of the communities that produces our Cafe Femenino Peru coffee).



We hope you take this concept to heart, share the story and the coffee, and be a part of something that can change the lives and futures of many women. Cafe Femenino started in Peru and is now also available from a women's co-op in Chiapas, Mexico.

Let's make our morning coffee more than a habit, let make it grounds for change! Church Library Notes

Read. Study. Learn.

Throughout the school year, parents are encouraged to develop the habit of having their children read every day to strengthen their skills, expand their horizons and instill a lifelong love of learning. With the kids out of school for the summer, this daily reading ritual is even more important. Not only does it provide a pleasurable experience, but skills acquired in the past are maintained or even strengthened. Please consider the church library as a valuable resource for your child's summer reading. Here are some of our latest additions for children:

<u>Bob Lends a Helping Hand</u> by Mike Nawrocki and Cindy Kenney. A new VeggieTales board book finds Larry and Joe learning what it really means to be helpful when their friend Bob needs a hand.

<u>Noah's Ark</u> by Barbary Shook Hazen and Diane Muldrow, illustrated by Mircea Catusanu. This Little Golden Book version of the story of Noah is one your child will surely enjoy and learn from.

<u>Do You Know My Friend?</u> By V. Gilbert Beers, illustrated by Jan M. Jones. This is Primer 2 of the Learning to Read From the Bible series. Here are ten well written Bible stories with a controlled vocabulary just right for beginning readers. Each story is followed by a "Something to Know", "Something to Ask", and "Something to Do" section. <u>The Ten Commandments for Children by</u> Lois Rock, illustrated by Liz Pichon. A great explanation of the Ten Commandments in simple words that children can understand.

<u>Our Powerful God</u>, and <u>Tell Me the Story</u> of Jesus, both by Carol Reinsma, illustrated by Phyllis Pollema-Cahill. These are from the Kid Seeker Series put out by the International Bible Society. Bible stories are based on the New International Readers Version of the Bible. These stories are a great way to end the day and lead into bedtime prayers.

<u>The Knight and the Firefly, a Boy, a Bug</u> <u>and a Lesson in Bravery</u>, by Tara McClary Reeves and Amanda Jenkins, illustrated by Daniel Fernandez. Based on Psalm 91, little Oliver is a brave knight by day but needs Phineas Firefly's wisdom to conquer his night time fears.

<u>Win or Lose I Love You</u>, a "Lulu Wears a Tutu" book by Lysa Terkeurst, illustrated by Jana Christy. Lulu and Max hold a field day competition for their forest friends and everyone learns some valuable lessons about winning and losing.

Robert Brault said, "A vacation trip is one-third pleasure, fondly remembered, and twothirds aggravation, entirely forgotten." Much of the hassle involved with "getting away" comes from packing. What do we need? How can we save space? Where are the items we haven't used since the last vacation? Inevitably, we forget something, like socks, sunscreen, or an umbrella.

Vacationers miss these items almost immediately and quickly replace them. Do we also often "forget" the Bible at home? Do we leave our prayer and worship routines behind?
