### Contemplating Stewardship: Stewardship of self

June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2018 (Proper 4: Second Sunday after Pentecost, "The Ten Commandments" wk2) "*Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy.*" -*Exodus 20:8* 

What so many of us often forget is that stewardship is an act of worship. When we come to church and offer our time and treasures to God, we are worshipping God. But, stewardship is not only about God's church. We are also called to be good stewards of our emotional and physical selves. Are we willing to honor a true sabbath day in our lives? When we hear the call for sabbath, I hope we can find a place for rest and peace as well as worship.

### Contemplating Stewardship: It was never ours to begin with...

June 10<sup>th</sup>, 2018 (Proper 5: Third Sunday after Pentecost, "The Ten Commandments" wk3) "You shall not steal."-Exodus 20:15

The opposite of stealing could be described as giving something away with no expectation of return. Christ is poured out for us as a gift, and probably one of the most difficult realizations we can have as God's children is that everything we possess is a gift from God. As people who are called to stewardship, it is easier to give from our own bounty when we realize that it was never ours to begin with. In faith, we can realize how true this is, and we can become those who no longer live for ourselves. Then, the world becomes a much different place: rather than looking for how we might benefit, we look for who we might benefit.

June 17<sup>th</sup>, 2018 (Proper 6: Fourth Sunday after Pentecost, "The Ten Commandments" wk4) "You shall not covet..." -Exodus 20:17
