Dinner @ 5 has experienced an increase in attendance, especially among families, on Monday evenings. We were previously averaging around 80 participants, but now we are serving nearly 100 community members each week.

Our volunteer base for Dinner @ 5 has been steady for quite some time; however, some volunteers are starting to feel burnt out from having to come every week, mainly because we do not have enough volunteers. There have even been instances where we had to cancel a Monday dinner due to a lack of volunteers.

We are hoping that members of our congregation will be willing to volunteer for this meaningful community ministry. If we had 20 congregation members who could commit to helping at least one Monday a month, that would provide us with enough volunteers to sustain this program. Each commitment requires only about 2 to 2.5 hours, from approximately 4:00 PM to 6:30 PM, and you will also have the opportunity to enjoy the meal.

Families are encouraged to volunteer together to help teach our younger members the importance of supporting our community!

In "It's a Wonderful Life," George Bailey (Jimmy Stewart) gets to see what the world would be like if he had never been born. Not just his little corner of the world, Bedford Falls, but truly the world. He had saved his brother from drowning and so his brother was not there to pilot a plane during WWII and save the lives of his crew.

As the year winds down, we can look forward to watching the movie again, along with all the other holiday movies we love. (Christmas Story, anyone?)

This month is also the time of year when we traditionally reach out with a pledge drive. More important than the actual pledge, however, is the process that gets us to the decision to make the church a priority.

This year, I invite you to think about the question, "What would Merrill be like if there wasn't a St. Stephens UCC?"

Well, first, there would be one less church that cared for people and families who don't usually attend a church but want a pastor to officiate at a loved one's funeral.

The community food pantry would be different—it started in St. Stephens UCC's basement.

There would not be a HAVEN for women and children who have suffered domestic violence. We helped start it and one of our members was the first director.

The radio station might have signed up others at some point, but St. Stephens UCC was the first to broadcast our Sunday morning services on the radio.

The Merrill economy would be short about \$45,000 a year because there was no one to loan out medical equipment for free or a donation.

About 260 children would go hungry every weekend and show up Monday sleepy, anxious and hungry, taking about 2 days to recover from their hunger over the weekend. Food 4 Kids would have ended when the church that started it couldn't find anyone to take over that ministry.

About 90 people a week would not have a free dinner and a place to gather and fellowship for a while on Monday nights.

This year alone, 27 families would not have had the care and welcoming love when they needed a pastor or a church to help them through their grief with non-judgmental, life affirming care.

There would not be a church in Merrill making the public statement that those with mental health issues and their families are welcomed with understanding, caring and no judgment into the full life of the church.

There would not be a voice in Merrill saying, "Jesus didn't turn people away, neither do we;" or "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here."

Please think about all these things along with our Sunday School, Confirmation program, church camp scholarships, special services like Blue Christmas and Nature Church, our Polka Sunday and our monthly Messy Church and others as you consider your support of the church this year.

Yes, please make a pledge. It helps turn your thoughts and prayers into visible action.

And, full disclosure, this year we will be asking for special gifts as some major projects become impossible to ignore. The sanctuary repairs and updates, upgrading lighting for better efficiency, tuck pointing the exterior of the sanctuary and possibly Memorial Hall and other projects needed in a 100+ year old building.

Without the steady support of the members for all our vital ministries with each other and this community, St. Stephens would simply not exist. And keeping the building in working order is simply wise stewardship. The building should serve our ministry, not the ministry serve the building.

The greatest support you can give the church, however, is your presence. Attend worship. Fellowship and serve with your fellow church members. Let us sing together! It is here you will find opportunities to deepen your faith, make lifelong friends and serve our loving and mighty God.

St. Stephens UCC is here, alive and well! Don't make us imagine what it would be without you!

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

Giving-A Spiritual Practice by Rev Andrew Warner

In just the last few years, I started running. Last month I ran my second half marathon. Each race teaches me something about myself. Early on in this race, a guy with my build and about my age tore past me, at a pace I couldn't imagine keeping. It felt st demoralizing to have him truck past me. I tried to pick up my pace a bit. Then, a couple of minutes later, the same guy came running past me again. "How slow am I going", I thought. This kept happening, for the first half of the race, the same guy passed me ten times.

Finally on the tenth time he passed me, I realized that I must have passed him too. But I didn't notice when I ran past him. I was so focused on other people beating me that I didn't notice when I passed someone And it's easy to fall into this pattern- focusing on what other people have, on their instagramable life, #blessed, judging myself by the yardstick of someone else's moment. Sometimes people in my work call this a mindset of scarcity, a narrowness of vision that focuses on short comings, on what we lack, on a fear that we might fall behind and lose out. Do we have a mindset of scarcity in our lives? About our church?

Another runner showed me a different way to be. At mile 8, the course became a long, slow uphill grade to the finish line. It was also about as far as I'd run in my training. At this point of tiredness, another runner struck up- a conversation. Chan and I talked the remaining 5 miles; well, mostly he talked. The halfmarathon was a training run for Chan as he prepared for a full marathon. He could have easily passed me, bur he hung back nd encouraged me- mostly with distracting banter, but also, along the way with a few tips. Including, at the end, when he reminded me that there would be a photographer as I crossed the line- "no matter what" he said, "look up and smile".

Chan noticed the people running around him. He looked for someone who needed encouragement. Instead of seeing who beat him, he noticed who needed him. He brought a mindset of generosity to his running.

In my life, I want to move from a mindset of scarcity to a mindset of generosity. From a narrow, competitive field of vision to a broad, abundant view of life. This is what makes giving a spiritual practice. All the ways we can givefinancially, but also time, encouragement, support- nurture in us a spirit of generosity.


Language and Words Matter By Paula McIntyre

Do you remember the saying, "Stick and stones may break my bones, but words or names can never hurt me."? I do. Unfortunately, words matter and can cause hurt and stigma. We have a history of using descriptors or adjectives to describe people which in turn stigmatizes them and the condition they have. It is important that we practice and commit to using person-first language to decrease stigmatization and stereotyping of certain conditions. For example, we tend to say someone is schizophrenic, bipolar, depressed, diabetic, obese, or "they committed suicide or killed themselves." Instead, we can say:

"He is living with schizophrenia." "She is living with bipolar disorder." "They died by suicide." "A person with diabetes." "I am living with depression."

Using person-first language means that we recognize a person's experience with mental health or physical health is only part of who they are as a person and a child of God. Although Jesus did not use person-first language because it is a modern concept that did not exist during his lifetime, his interactions and behavior with people who lived with oppression or marginalization aligned with the spirit of it. Pastor spoke of this in a recent sermon. In Mark 1:40-42, Jesus touches a man with leprosy, acknowledging him as a whole person. Throughout the gospels, Jesus speaks directly to those he healed. He also includes those considered as outcasts in his ministry, like tax collectors and Samaritans.

Take time to listen to the language you use. If you notice it is not person-first, make a commitment to yourself and others to speak differently. 


