From the Ask the Pastor bucket:

Why do we say "debts" in the Lord's Prayer and others say "trespasses"?

The words that give us the Lord's Prayer appear in Matthew 6:9-13 and Luke 11:1-4. And remember, the evangelists wrote the Gospels in Greek. And to complicate things a bit more, some churches use the word "sins" instead of either trespasses or debts.

TLDR: It's tradition.

First off, this difference between trespasses and debts is present only in English speaking churches. Mathew uses the word "ophelelima." The rest of the world has translated that Greek word to their language's word that matches our word for debts. Luke, however, uses the word, "hamartia" which we usually translate as "sins."

Ophelelima means "that which is owed," or debt. In the Latin, the original common language of the Roman Catholic Church (which now uses "trespasses"), that word is translated as *debité*. So, in the Latin version of the prayer, Catholics used "debt" for centuries. English became the problem.

In his 1526 English translation of the Bible, William Tyndale translated *ophelelima* into "trespasses." Then, in 1549, the Anglican Church published the "Book of Common Prayer" making trespasses the most familiar version of the prayer for much of the English speaking world.

In the King James Version, published in 1611, the translators went back to using "debts." And while the KJV was intended to unite the British nation and colonies with an officially approved translation, it did little to change the now common use of "trespasses" in the Lord's Prayer.

Within the prayer, the words are generally considered to be interchangeable and simply a matter of tradition and what a particular church or denomination finds most comfortable. Debts, or *ophelelima*, means "that which is owed." Trespasses generally refers to breaking a boundary, in this case, breaking the boundaries set by God's laws. It does not mean trespassing on someone else's property, although that could be a specific example. It generally means going out of bounds, which is a good Jewish understanding of sin as missing the mark. In Christian terms, it can mean veering off the path of following Jesus. Early Christians were called "people of the Way" because they followed in the way of Christ. Trespassing, then, is leaving that path. When someone "trespasses against us," their leaving the path following Jesus has somehow harmed us or caused a breakdown in the community.

We have to remember, however, that trespasses was a choice of Tyndale in his translation that simply caught on in the Anglican, English speaking Catholic and Lutheran churches and the Methodist church, an offshoot of Anglicanism.

Sin, *hamartia* as used by Luke, usually denotes a personal transgression, breaking of the law of Moses, breaking a cultural law or somehow harming another person through action or inaction. When sin is used in the Lord's Prayer, it is usually in a church out of the Reformed or Anabaptist tradition that puts more emphasis on personal chastity, a personal relationship with God and personal holiness or sanctification. It is, however, an accurate translation from Luke.

Now, why do we use debts instead of trespasses? Because of tradition and the German Evangelical and Reformed concern about accuracy in translation drawn from the belief that the Bible was the "Word of God" and, thus, had to be as accurately translated as possible.

Another interesting question: "Lead us not into temptation." Why would God lead us into temptation? Is a better translation, "Save us from the time of trial"? That is a discussion for another time. Keep asking questions—they are the path to deeper faith. And as you think of these things, may you find even deeper meaning in the Lord's Prayer. Have a great October!

St. Vincent - Emergency Assistance



SVDP The Outreach Program the only is emergency response service that our community has. All the money raised for SVDP is used to help people in need right here in our

community and in Lincoln County.

In the last 11 months, SVDP has given out over \$120,000 in assistance for those in our local community and surrounding area. Of that money approximations are \$40,000 was for rent assistance, \$32,000 in utilities assistance, \$16,000 in lodging assistance for the homeless who aren't able to get into MAC Home or don't qualify, and \$32,000 in other assistance such as gas money for transportation, childcare supplies and much more!

SVDP relies on the community for most of its funding. They do not receive federal or state aid but do receive some funds from the Merrill United Way. Proceeds from the SVDP Thrift Store also benefit the Emergency Assistance program.

Summer Lunch Program

This past summer, we had a busy Summer Lunch Program. Our Taco Tuesday served 2,521 lunch bags this year, with an average of 194 children participating each week. We distributed 381 more taco bags than last year and served an average of 29 more kids per week. Overall, the program served 2,019 more lunch bags this year compared to last year, which represents a 19% increase in the number of lunch bags served compared to 2024!

By the time you read this we will have enjoyed our "Nature Church" first experience. While worshiping together in a natural setting, a cathedral making, of God's practiced а spiritual

It is interesting how ancient spiritual disciplines are being adapted as modern clinical approaches. With both St. Benedict and the American Psychological Association recommending it, you might try this at home.

- 3 deep breaths and then take 3 breaths between each of these:
- Take note of 5 things you can see 3x
- Take note of 4 things you can hear 3x
- Take note of 3 things you can smell 3x
- Take note of 2 things you can feel 3x
- Take note of 1 thing you can taste 3x

(Sometimes you can taste something you smell and sometimes something you see brings the very real memory of a taste)

Choose 2 of the things you can see and 2 you can hear and contemplate how you are connected to them.

How do these things enhance your life? How do your needs impact these objects, living things, or their environment?

How has the Holy Spirit been present in this practice—guiding you to focus on the things you noticed, opening your senses to see, hear, feel, taste, smell things you have not noticed in the rush of life?

Say a prayer asking the Holy Spirit to guide you to stay connected to the world, the community and the people around you.

Sing a song and find joy as you go on

your way.

Required Minimum Distributions Source: Thrivent Financial & Funds

With so many financial demands on your plate, it can be hard to find the extra funds to give to the causes you care about most. And for many people, one core cause is their church. From supporting day-to-day operations to chipping in on ministries, renovations, or outreach programs—it can be rewarding to see the good your dollars can bring. If you own an individual retirement account (IRA), there's a tax-efficient way you can give required back: Donating your minimum distribution (RMD) through a qualified charitable distribution (QCD).

What is a required minimum distribution (RMD)?

A required minimum distribution, or RMD, is the minimum amount of money you must withdraw from a tax-deferred retirement plan (in this case, an IRA) after you reach a certain age. With your retirement accounts, you will want to make sure you understand the required amount to withdraw from your account as well as the date your withdrawal must be completed by every year to avoid a 25% penalty from the IRS.

In the year of your first Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) (the year you turn 73 or 75, if born in 1960 or later), you have until April 1 of the following year to withdraw it. After the first year you reach age 73 or 75, and for every year after, you must take your RMD by December 31.

The IRS has online resources that can help. IRS Publication 590-B covers IRA distributions including the RMD. Visit IRS.gov.

What is a qualified charitable distribution (QCD)?

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA to your church. Because your IRA custodian sends these funds directly to your church your contribution is not taxed.

What are the benefits of giving your RMD to your church?

Giving your RMD through a QCD can provide you with a means to give to your church that you may not have otherwise. Doing so also can:

- 1. Satisfy your RMD. A QCD counts toward your annual RMD if it comes directly out of your IRA. You can give up to the full amount of your RMD (as long as it's under \$105,000), or donate part and withdraw the remainder.
- 2. Provide tax relief. Because you never directly touch those funds in a QCD, you can reduce or avoid the taxes you'd incur by taking your RMD otherwise. Additionally, QCDs lower your adjusted gross income (AGI) and therefore potentially reduce taxes on Social Security and avoid increased Medicare premiums.
- 3. Support your church's mission and ministries. Like other charitable contributions, a QCD is a way for you to practice generosity while also furthering your church's operations. Those can include everything from funding volunteer programs and outreach efforts, to purchasing equipment and maintaining the church building.

The process for completing a QCD to support your church is relatively straightforward. Here's what you need to do.

Request a distribution form from the institution that administers your IRA. In the QCD section, fill out your church's info. Keep in mind, *this transaction must be completed by December 31*. The IRA custodian will mail the check directly to your church. At tax time, report the charitable distribution on the line for IRA distributions. If the full amount was given as a QCD, write "0" on the taxable amount line. Enter "QCD" on the line next to it. And there you have it. You've blessed your church with a generous gift—one you can make part of your yearly giving if you so choose.

Leave the Leaves!

Falling leaves are the first signal of the arrival of the autumn season. Many see this as an additional chore, as they would tend to rake leaves and throw piles of them away. Instead, consider leaving leaves on your lawn. Dead leaves are an important part of the natural cycles of plants and soil. Plants emerge from the soil, die, decay, and return to the soil, providing carbon that contributes to the soil ecology and encourages healthy microbial activity. The removal of dead leaves from this cycle can actually diminish the soil's health.

Then, what are you supposed to do instead? Because large heaps of leaves can cause dead grass patches in your lawn, it would be ideal to mulch them and spread them evenly across your yard. Mulched leaves can also be piled around the bases of trees or on top of flower beds and gardens. This will help insulate the soil over the winter, protecting the soil's microbial life.

If you don't want to repurpose your leaves from your lawn and are really considering removing the leaves, think of composting them instead of throwing them away. If your city does not offer a composting facility, then consider starting a compost at home.

Faith is a journey. We often have questions along the way... Is my faith fully formed? Am I on the journey? Where have I come from? Where am I going? How do I get there?






August Revenue and Expenses


Revenue \$24,974.67 Expenses \$35,694.73 Net Loss: \$10,720.06
