From Pastor Samuel On March 16th, the Valley Ridge District hosted a seminar with Dr. Elane Heath, a prominent theologian and minister, to discuss the future of church outreach, or perhaps the Biblical past we have forgotten. Based on her book,

God Unbound, she reminded us that our current way of, "doing church," is very modern in the history of Christianity. Reading from Luke 10, we find the way of how Jesus sent out His disciples, two-by-two, and being invited into the community as guests, rather than being hosts awaiting guests. Of course, as the world has changed drastically in the past 200 years, let alone 2,000, we have become comfortable with being the central point of a community, and allowing the sick, hungry, and heavy-laden to reach up to our doors, rather than the more Biblical opposite.

The concept of reaching out into our communities is part of our Wesleyan heritage, as that is one reason that John Wesley began being ostracized from the Anglican clergy: he committed the vile act of open-air preaching! The purpose of this was because John had seen the overworked, underpaid, and heartbroken workers of England destroying themselves and communities while the church turned a blind eye. As we enter this post-pandemic world, we have to ask ourselves the same questions that John did: who are we choosing not to see?

As we prepare to enter into Eastertide (Alleluia!), if we truly believe that Jesus Christ rose from the grave, and promised us that same power, how are we living into that call? Do our neighbors know The Way, Truth, and Life? Do we even know our neighbors? Let this next church season return us to practical ways of sharing the Gospel, to return into our community in genuine, empowering love. As has been quoted by many people: we may be the only scripture that our friends, family, and world hear about.

The first simple rule, "Do No Harm," we are seeking direction in our life, we often think about what we should do. It is interesting that John Wesley began the Simple Rules instead with what we refrain from doing. Our first call is to avoid doing harm to others.

#### Scripture references:

E

"Do not repay anyone evil for evil but take thought of what is noble in the sight of all." If all of us can keep that thought in our minds at alt times, we might be better at tempering our desire to 'get even' or strike back. This a lot harder to do than it ought to be. So how do we do that?" Romans 12: 17, CEB

#### Key questions:

What comes to mind when you think about the first of the Three Simple Rules, Do No Harm? Bishop Rueben Job said this in his writing, "to do no harm means that I will be on guard so that all of my actions and even my silence will not add injury to another of God's children or to any part of God's creation." How do we go about doing that?

Three words, do no harm, that are not so simple. It is also not about others but about each of us, taking this seriously-and asking with the questions about our words and actions, what impact might this have on our lives and the lives of others? How would our faith change, or how would our faith journey change if we really focused on doing no harm? Next month, we will look at the second of the "Three Simple Rules"-"Do Good".

speaker, Jessica Meyer. Jessica presented a very enlightening program about her call to become a Christian Missionary

with International Christian Center for the Deaf (ICCD), a non-profit Christian organization with the purpose of sharing the gospel with the Deaf in Third World countries. In addition to the United States, they partner with seven countries (Mexico, Cuba, The Bahamas, Uganda, Boliva, Brazil and India). The Deaf in other countries are often rejected, neglected, and abused in their homes and villages. Many are uneducated and made to feel invisible. Many cannot read and have no language beyond invented gestures. Often they are raised by parents who believe they are incapable of becoming anything of value. Every year, thousands rely on ICCD for physical, emotional, and educational support. Jessica shared ways we can help: **PRAYER** for their efforts; **DONATIONS** to help fund missionaries and provide for the needs of the Deaf and **JOIN** the ICCD who are always in need of caring people.


2. Community Connection: The Reading Program is not meant to be a solitary endeavor. You can enhance the experience by:




#### WE GO ON: FINDING PUR-POSE IN ALL OF LIFE'S SOR-**ROWS AND JOYS**


# NOBODY CRIES WHEN WE DIE -

## **SLEEP IN HEAVENLY PEACE**

Interested in helping children in need to sleep better? So many great charities provide clothing, meals, and toys to families in need. But as wonderful as this aid is, few organizations offer suitable beds and bedding to the kids in these families. The United Women of Faith will be collecting funds to help Mt. Pleasant UMC of Roanoke with a projected build project of 20 bunk beds May 3-4. The project is organized by SHP (Sleep in Heavenly Peace) which is a national non-profit organization. Volunteers believe a bed is a basic need for the proper physical, emotional, and mental support that a child needs. Their motto is NO KID SLEEPS ON THE FLOOR IN OUR TOWN!®. SHP was established in 2012 by Luke Michelson, who was having a faith crisis and felt called to do a service project in his neighborhood. His family built a bed and volunteers stepped up and the project was full speed ahead from that point on. The goal was to have a SHP chapter in every state and now there are over 270 all over the US and in Canada. Volunteers are dedicated to building, assembling, and delivering top-notch bunk beds to children and families in need. Each bed comes with a mattress, sheets, pillow, and comforter. SLP started from the voices of people willing to open their mouths and spread the word. It takes all of us to find, organize and supply these children with beds to sleep in. You will be amazed at the response you receive when you share with others your involvement with this group. The more volunteers, the more beds can be built, and more children can be helped. Spreading the word may be the most important way for people to volunteer. We will be collecting monetary donations of any amount until April 22. You may drop your check into the offering plate, payable to St. Mark's UWF with the designation of SHP in the reference line or contact Ramona Tolley.
