#### **SERMON SUMMARY**

Feel free to read this message summary to the group before your discussion to refresh their memory on its central themes.

In this week's message, Pastor Devan explored how Joseph's carefully built dreams and cultural expectations were shattered when Mary was found to be pregnant. Living in a strict honor-shame culture, Joseph faced the collapse of his reputation, his plans, and his sense of security. Yet through a divine dream, God invited Joseph into a **better dream**—one that required extraordinary surrender. Joseph had to release **expectations** shaped by culture, **fears** about what obedience would cost him, and **hurts** caused by misunderstanding, rejection, and grief. The sermon reminded us that God often invites us into His greater dream for our lives not by adding comfort, but by asking for deeper trust. Like Joseph, we are called to lay down our own dreams, surrender control, and follow God with resilience, courage, and open hands—even when His path is costly. Out of surrender, God brings redemption, purpose, and unexpected new beginnings.

#### LIFE GROUP QUESTIONS

1. Looking at Joseph's story, what stood out to you most about how he responded when his dream was shattered?

What part of his situation (honor-shame culture, betrayal, confusion, fear) felt most relatable or most challenging to you? Why?

2. Joseph laid down a "good dream" in order to receive God's better dream. Where in your own life have you recognized that God's dream for you might be different from the dream you originally imagined?

How easy or difficult is it for you to discern the difference between the American Dream and the Kingdom Dream?

### **SURRENDERING OUR EXPECTATIONS**

3. What expectations—about your life, family, faith, or future—might you need to surrender so they don't hold you hostage?

Discuss one expectation that may be keeping you from experiencing God's unfolding dream for your life.

## SURRENDERING OUR FEARS

4. What fear currently freezes you or causes you to hesitate when God is asking you to step forward?

Where do you sense Him inviting you to trust Him like Joseph did, despite not knowing the outcome?

## **SURRENDERING OUR HURTS**

5. What hurt—whether rejection, grief, disappointment, or misunderstanding—do you sense God asking you to place in His hands?

How might surrendering this hurt open up space for healing, purpose, or renewed trust in God?
