Expectations

What you can expect from us: Your JP staff wants to help make this a great mission trip experience for you and your students and adults. The staff will do their very best to keep you informed on all issues, provide support on the work sites, be available as much as possible, be encouragers, laugh and play together, and be Christian examples in word and deed. The Staff consists of the Camp Director, Assistant Camp Director, Program Director, Worship Leader, Tool Site Coordinator, a Media Lead, a Recreation Lead, 2-3 J. Staffers, and a kitchen staff of 3-4.

What we expect from your adult leaders: We're excited that you will be serving as an adult leader with your church this summer! We want to help make this a great experience for you and we want you to be as prepared as possible for your role as an adult leader during the mission week. It will be an enjoyable experience for you and your team!

Participation

Adults are expected to participate in all the camp activities because they, like the students and staff, are part of the community. We are committed to working, playing, and worshiping together, with the hope for all of us to see the power of a Christian community in our lives.

Support your JP Staff

Another important element is to support and be in partnership with the Jeremiah Project staff. Help the staff by enforcing the guidelines for appropriate behavior, participation, etc. The camp staff will look to the adults as positive role models for their students. Maintaining a positive outlook on the camp experience is one way that adults can teach a valuable lesson in maturity.

Conversations around human sexuality

JP's mission at camp, simply put, is to provide opportunities for students to serve and to point them to Jesus Christ. Although this mission trip experience can be seen as an experience for just *your church*, the reality is that you are part of a bigger community where other churches will be attending. Work teams and breakout groups will be made up students from multiple churches and our overall community as we gather to worship, pray, and lift up the name of Jesus together encompasses *all* churches.

Knowing that there will be churches on your JP week that will likely hold differing views on the topic of human sexuality and gender identity, we respectfully insist that you refrain from initiating conversations on this topic with students while at camp, at the worksite, etc. Engaging in these conversations will only serve to divide the community

and distract us from JP's mission. Should a student initiate a conversation on this topic, we ask that you acknowledge the importance of discussing it, but since others may have different views on this topic, encourage the student to continue the conversation with their youth leader either on free day, or when they return home from JP.

Empower your Students

Adults need to "empower" students, not "overpower" them. Even if it takes longer than you believe is necessary, take the time to teach students and allow them to accomplish a task.

Be Responsible for your Students

The staff needs you to handle any situations that require disciplining your students, should it be necessary. We also ask that you be responsible for getting your students to sleep at night, and to see to it they are out of bed and ready for the first activity of the day. Please ensure that they are present and on time for all events.

Q: When do we arrive at camp?

A: Plan your travel to arrive at camp between 2:00 pm and 3:30 pm on Sunday afternoon. It is important that all groups arrive on time since activities cannot begin until everyone is in camp. If there is some emergency that will delay your arrival, please call Todd Freneaux at 757-342-5757 to let us know. For late arrivals, you can also try the 4H Camp phone at 304-822-7313.

Q: I have a student who wants to arrive late (Monday, Tuesday, etc.) or I have a student who wants to leave early. Is that okay?

A: No. JP's policy requires that all participants arrive on Sunday between 2:00-3:30pm and depart no earlier than Saturday at 10:00am. Why? Participants that arrive late or leave early have a significant negative impact on their work team and the community. Because of this and many other reasons, we insist that all participants arrive and depart with their church mission team. The exception to this policy is a death in the family or a participant or family member that becomes ill.

Q: As an Adult, what must I participate in while at camp?

A: We expect all adults to participate in *every aspect* of the mission experience. The daily schedule is very structured and does not allow for a great deal of "free time" for students and, consequently, adults. JP works hard at building and maintaining a community throughout the week. You are part of that community. We know that living in a community is hard for many people, but we ask that you work toward that goal and let us know how we can help make that work for you.

Q: Will our kids be together on the same work team?

A: A typical work team is made up of 5 students and 1 or 2 adults – all from different churches. Occasionally, there will be two students from the same church on a work team. Any special situations that require a student to be with a specific adult should be communicated along with your student roster (due 2 weeks before camp).

Q: Will Middle and High School students be on the same work teams?

A: No. Middle School and High School students will be on separate teams and worksites. Middle School students will be moving to different work sites each day and High School students will be at the same work site for the whole week, or until the project is completed.

Q: Will our students be sleeping in the same bunkhouse together?

A: Yes, they are in the same bunkhouse together, but you will also have other church groups in your bunkhouse.

Q: What is the Jeremiah Project's child protection policy?

A: The protection of our students is vital to our ministry. All staff members 18 years and older are screened via a background check and all churches are required to screen each adult volunteer, including students 18 years and older. Your church submitted a signed copy of our *Child Protection Policy* when registering for camp.

Q: As an adult, can I have my cell phone with me at all times?

A: Yes. You are welcome to have your cell phone, but we ask that you do NOT have it out during worship or devotional times. Students are not allowed to have cell phones on their persons during the camp week except on free day.

*Wednesday is "Free Day"

Since part of our mission is to have fun, we have set aside Wednesday to be a "day off" from the camp workweek. This is a free day for your church group to have fun together! Church groups are not allowed to stay at camp on Wednesday during the day. Church teams should plan on leaving shortly after morning devotions end (around 9:30am) and returning no earlier than 3:30pm. Suggested Activities can be found at the end of this document.

IMPORTANT: If someone from your church is staffing, they are not allowed to participate in free day activities with the church.

Safety/First Aid Kits

- **1.** Only adults listed by their churches as "designated drivers" can drive work crews to the work sites. All drivers must be at least 25 years old.
- 2. Students will not operate power saws.
- **3.** No participant will be required to work on roofs or ladders if he/she is apprehensive about heights.
- 4. Special care will be taken to remove nails from any lumber lying on the ground.
- 5. Special care will be taken to encourage each participant to drink adequate fluids.
- **6.** Participants must bring and wear (sturdy) long pants (no sweatpants, etc.) and shirts with sleeves at the work site. Sturdy shoes, hats, gloves, and sunscreen are strongly recommended.
- **7.** At least one adult participant will be present at each work site.
- **8.** Close adult supervision is built into the work-camp program, and church leaders are asked to bring only responsible, service-oriented youth who will work with safety in mind.
- **9.** If a camper (student or adult) is injured at the work site and blood is present, that camper must first have the wound treated and/or bandaged before further participation.

IMPORTANT: Each Church attending JP must bring an extensive and well-stocked first aid kit for each vehicle.

Transportation Requirements

Your vehicles must be large enough to seat belt a 7-member team as well as carry several tools, a large chest cooler, and a water cooler to a worksite. A "team" includes both student and adult participants. It is imperative that you follow our guidelines set forth below. You will be asked to submit your transportation details 2 weeks prior to your work camp week.

- For teams bringing up to 7 participants: You must bring 1 vehicle that can safely transport at least 7 people, and be able to transport tools, as well as a lunch and a water cooler.
- For teams bringing 8-14 participants: You must bring 2 vehicles that can safely transport at least 7 people each, and be able to transport tools, as well as a lunch and a water cooler.
- For teams bringing 15-21 participants: You must bring 3 vehicles that can safely transport at least 7 people each, and be able to transport tools, as well as a lunch and a water cooler.
- For teams of 22 or more: You must bring a minimum of one vehicle (7-passenger or greater) for every 7 participants, and be able to transport tools, as well as a lunch and a water cooler.

Reminder: Each Church attending JP must have a first aid kit for each vehicle.

Camp Guidelines

- **Cell Phone/Device Policy.** Students are not permitted to have cell phones/devices at JP, except for daytime use on "free day" (Wednesday). Adults may have cell phones, but we strongly encourage them to use them only when needed. Exceptions to this policy are for medical reasons where a student needs to have access to their device.
- Tobacco: Tobacco products of any kind are not allowed and may not be used by any camp participant – student or adult – during the camp week.
- **Tetanus Shots:** All participants must have had a tetanus shot within the last 10 years.
- Medications: Church group leaders will be responsible for ensuring that members of their group receive any medications on time.
- Pets: Pets are not allowed in camp.
- **Conduct:** The use or possession of, intoxicating beverages, illicit drugs, firearms, or fireworks is forbidden! If someone is in violation of this guideline, he/she may be sent home at his/her own expense.
- Lodging: Participants will be housed based on birth sex.

Dress Code

- At the Work Site: All participants are required to wear long pants at the work sites.
 Pants must be made of jean material or similar to provide appropriate protection.
 Sweatpants, leggings, or similar, are not acceptable. No torn clothing. Shirts must have sleeves. These requirements exist for safety and out of respect for the families we will be working for, fellow participants, and to maintain a good image throughout the community we are working in.
- At Camp: Shirts that reveal too much of a person's body may not be allowed if the staff deems them inappropriate. Shirts must cover the midriff. Shorts at camp are okay but must be an acceptable length. Pants and shorts should not sag to the point of displaying underwear. Staff will work with adult church leaders prior to addressing the issue with campers directly.
- Other Clothing Requirements: Please do not bring clothing that bears an alcohol ad, cigarette ad or logo, or questionable wording or graphics.

What to Bring: Individual List

Each person attending the Jeremiah Project should bring the following items. Please note that there are no laundry facilities at camp. Please bring enough clothing for the entire week.

- Bible (if possible)
- Required medications: Please advise your group leader of dosage amount and timing.
- Sleeping bag or sheets and a blanket/pillow & pillowcase.
- Towels and washcloth.
- Toilet articles and personal items.
- Sunscreen & Insect repellent.
- Work clothes: Clothes may get dirty or possibly ruined:
 - Long pants made of denim or sturdy material as required for safety on work sites
 - No pajamas, sweatpants, or scrubs for the work sites.
 - T-shirts (no offensive logos) or shirts. All shirts must have sleeves on the worksite
 - Sturdy shoes or boots (no open-toed on job sites)
 - o Work gloves, Cap or hat.
 - o Rain gear.
- Leisure clothes (to wear in camp) NOTE: Shirts that reveal too much of a person's body
 may not be allowed if the staff deems them inappropriate. Shirts must cover the midriff.
 Shorts at camp are okay but must be an acceptable length. Pants and shorts should not
 sag to the point of displaying underwear.
- Jacket or sweatshirt.
- Water bottle.
- Flashlight.
- Sleepwear.

Optional Items

- Digital camera.
- Sandals for showers.
- Swimsuit (for possible free day activity with your church)
- Small amount of spending money
- "River shoes" for tubing if your group chooses this free day option.

Stuff NOT to Bring

- IPads, mp3 players, etc.
- Electronic games.

What to Bring: Group Checklist

Each group attending The Jeremiah Project must bring the following:

 Several 2", 3", or 4" INEXPENSIVE paint brushes to donate (they will be discarded after one use)
One ice-chest cooler (56 quart or larger) for each vehicle. The cooler will be used to carry your lunches and beverages to the work site each day. This will be your lunch cooler for the week! Failure to bring the required number of coolers (and size) means your group will need to purchase one or more once you arrive.
 One large (5 gallon) insulated water jug for each vehicle.
Emergency funds, vehicle registration, and insurance information readily available in each vehicle.
 First aid kit for each vehicle.
One (1) copy of each participant's "Medical Information/Parental Permission for Treatment" NOTE: Students will NOT be permitted to leave for work sites without a signed and completed medical form. Medical forms are required for all adult participants as well.
 One (1) completed "Group Covenant of Participation."
 One (1) completed "Group Photo Release Form."
 Leaders: Consider bringing some extra Bibles for your students that may not have one.

ROMNEY, WV: HAMPSHIRE COUNTY 4-H CENTER

From Richmond and points south: Approx. drive time from Richmond: 3 hours, 30 minutes

- Take I95 North to exit #133 (Rt. 17 North to Warrenton)
- Take Rte. 17 North toward Warrenton for 26 miles at which point you will come to a 3-way intersection take a RIGHT and continue following signs for Rte. 17 North toward Winchester (From here on, follow the signs very closely you will soon need to exit RIGHT in order to stay on 17 North)
- Once you exit RIGHT, go approx. 9 miles and follow signs for I 66 West (this will be a LEFT exit) Stay on I 66 West until you see signs for I 81N. Take I 81N toward Winchester.
- At Exit 310, follow the signs for Rte. 37 N/W. This is a bypass around Winchester. Once on Rte. 37, take the exit for Rte. 50 WEST to Romney. Follow this for about 50 miles. Go through Romney you will go through 2 traffic lights.
- At bottom of the hill just before the bridge crossing the South Branch of the Potomac turn left onto River Road.
- 3.5 miles the Hampshire County 4-H Center will be on your left.

From Northern Virginia: Approx. drive time from Northern Virginia: 2 hour, 30 minutes

- From 495 Capital Beltway, take I 66 West to I 81 North.
- At Exit 310, follow the signs for Rte. 37 N/W. This is a bypass around Winchester.
 Once on Rte. 37, take the exit for Rte. 50 WEST to Romney.
 Follow this for about 50 miles.
 Go through Romney – you will go through 2 traffic lights.
- At bottom of the hill just before the bridge crossing the South Branch of the Potomac turn left onto South Branch River Road.
- 3.5 miles the Hampshire County 4-H Center will be on your left.
