THE REV. ELIZABETH A. EATON
PRESIDING BISHOP
EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH IN AMERICA**

A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled because they are no more. Matthew 2:18

As we live into these first days and weeks of Lent, we do so riveted by the news of another tragic mass shooting, this time at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Fla., on Ash Wednesday. My heart, like yours, is filled with anguish; my spirit, like yours, laments. Rachel weeps for her children, refusing to be consoled because they are no more, and so do we.

We pray for the inconsolable loved one and for the shooter and his family, for those terrorized by what took place and those who are unmoved. We acknowledge our own failing and ask God to guide us in finding new ways to turn the tide together on both the availability of assault weapons and the lack of mental health care.

But we know that those things alone won't solve this epidemic. All of us, including the church, must take a close look at ourselves. How are we cultivating a culture of violence, hatred, anger and fear, and how can we participate in building a counter-culture where people can experience God's intended peace and life abundant for all?

Lent is a time for lamentation, dwelling with our sorrow, and facing the painful reality of death. We take each step certain that God weeps with us, walks with us in our deepest sufferings, and in the end makes the ultimate sacrifice for us – through death on a cross. This is our strength for the journey.

**AND A MESSAGE FROM
PASTOR SANDY KESSINGER**

I remember exactly where I was on September 11, 2001, at 8:46 am. I was in the basement of the church and I was just about to make my way to my office when our intern came rushing down the stairs to tell me what was unfolding. The next few hours were a blur as the city of Pittsburgh shut down and people were told to evacuate immediately because Flight 93 was fast approaching. Due to the bravery of the people on that plane, it crashed in Somerset County only 65 miles outside of the city, at 10:06 am.

It seems as if we measure every tragedy from this distinctive marker. I do not have that same clarity with other events but I could name the ones that stick in my mind: the shooting in the Colorado movie theater, the children killed in the Amish community, and the shooting that took place at Virginia Tech. There are others that I remember but some have already faded into the background because the losses have been overshadowed by larger catastrophes.

On this Ash Wednesday (also Valentine's Day) we sat in our Fellowship Hall for dinner while the news was unfolding about the high school shooting in Parkland, Florida. By the time we entered our worship space, the number of fatalities had climbed to seventeen while an unknown number were in critical condition at the hospital. My own emotions were at the surface as I preached from the prophet, Joel. Yes, God wants us to be obedient to his will. Yes, God does judge our willful disobedience. But (most importantly) God always leaves us with an opportunity to turn our lives around and return to the Lord.

Since this latest shooting is so fresh on my mind, here are some of my own reflections.

- 1) As a parent I cannot imagine the anguish of those who lost their sons or daughters. I watch the news and I see the faces of the high school students who will forever be changed by what happened on February 14. It is beyond human comprehension.
- 2) But I also see something fresh and hopeful in how the young people have responded to this tragedy. They seem to have the words and the dedication to use their gifts to work towards change. They are holding all of us accountable. In their grief (but wisdom) they do not want what happened to them (and happened to so many before them) to keep happening in the future. If there is no change we can only expect the same results.
- 3) I heard repeatedly that they appreciate the prayers that have come their way but prayer alone is not enough. This message rings the loudest in my ears.

From the book of James:

What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but you do not have works? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them – *Go in peace! Keep warm and eat your fill!* – and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith (by itself) if it has no works, is dead.

In every confession we make on a Sunday morning we acknowledge the sins we have done, and we include those things we should have done but failed to do. Because these tragedies are such a physical distance from us I hope (and pray) they do not let lessen our zeal to correct whatever wrongs we see. There are plenty of issues before us that occupy our time such as acts of racism, acts of violence, sexual abuse, drug abuse, bullying, and human trafficking (to name just a few). Choose your passion and be guided by your faith to act on behalf of those who are crying out to us.

In the affirmation of faith that was read at the time of our confirmation, we made a promise to follow the example of Jesus Christ and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth. I am certain we are all on different pages on what that means – on what needs to be done and how it should be accomplished. I hope that what we can agree on three things:

Something needs to change.

We need to be the agents of that change.

We do it in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

What should we do? How should we feel? How do we look in the face of our children and tell them they are safe in the presence of such unfathomable experiences?


John 15:1-5 is often referred to as the Vine and Branches. "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine grower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit....Abide in me as I abide in you."

Jesus' metaphor of the vine and branches reminds us that our spiritual life is dependent upon God's grace. It is one of seven "I am" metaphors in the gospel of John. (I am the bread of life; the light of the world; the gate; the good shepherd; the resurrection and the life; the way, the truth, and the life; and the vine.) The "I am" metaphors invite us to reflect what role we allow Jesus to take in our lives.

- Is Jesus the Bread of my life?
- Do I live by Jesus' Light?
- Do I trust Jesus to Shepherd me?
- Do I depend on Jesus as the Resurrection, or do I keep trying to lift myself up?
- Do I let Jesus be the Way for me, or do I ask others for directions?
- Is Jesus the truth by which I examine the truths of the world?
- Do I abide in Jesus? Do I cling to Him as a branch to a vine through which I draw my spiritual nourishment?

In the midst of great tragedy, it is easy to forget Jesus is all of these things and more. I encourage you to ground yourself in the Truth that Jesus is our way, our truth, and our life. Thanks be to God!

Redeemer Moves Forward With LSS Good Neighbor Program

Minutes from Planning Meeting. Stephanie Hunter (Redeemer LSS Good Neighbor Program Chair) provided an overview of the program. Redeemer has submitted an application with a six-month commitment to work with a refugee family, helping them adjust to life in our community. Seven Social Concerns members attended a training session on January 23. The next step is to get background checks for volunteers who will have extended direct contact with the family that LSS will assign to Redeemer. The family may be assigned within the next couple of months. Volunteers are needed for direct contact (e.g., transportation, mentoring) as well as behind the scenes tasks (e.g., collecting household items, coat drive).

January Ham Run Report

On January 3, Ralph Dutrow delivered 23 boxes of ham weighing approximately 805 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Reston HoneyBaked Ham store.

On January 4, Rick Stewart delivered 3 boxes of ham weighing approximately 105 pounds to Community Family Life Services (CFLS) from the Fairfax store.

On January 11, Laura Wareham delivered 4 boxes of ham weighing approximately 140 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Falls Church store.

On January 18, Roberta Pittman delivered 7 boxes of ham weighing approximately 210 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Falls Church store.

So for the month, we delivered approximately 1,260 pounds of ham. A good start to the new year. Our delivery breakdown was as follows: Community Family Life Services (CFLS), 105 pounds and the DC Central Kitchen, 1,155 pounds. Good work ham runners.

Your IRA and Required Minimum Distributions

Did you know that if you are required to take a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) from your traditional IRA, it can be used as a contribution to Redeemer? Now that Congress has made the Qualified Charitable Distribution provision in the tax code permanent, this is a great way to fund your giving to Redeemer and not have the RMD count towards your adjusted gross income. If you instruct the investment firm that is your IRA custodian, to send your RMD or a portion of it directly to Redeemer, then it does not get included as part of your income. The key point here is that it cannot be passed through you but has to be made payable directly to the church. If you are 70 1/2 or older, this may be a good opportunity for you to stay below the threshold for the Medicare high-income surcharge or help make less of your Social Security benefits subject to tax. You should check with your own tax adviser to confirm that this is something that would be appropriate for you.
