A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR SANDY KESSINGER

Last month I did not have any plans to travel overseas but within a three-week time period I was boarding Turkish Airlines and heading to Tel Aviv. It was a whirlwind of a trip but a memorable one for me and my daughters. Even as our original flights were canceled, we learned how to be flexible and how to think and respond quickly to challenges that were clearly out of our control. We worked well as a team and as a result we arrived safely, we saw many of the holy sites in and around Jerusalem, we learned about the culture and traditions of the Israeli people, and we spent our evenings eating our meals at the best-rated restaurants.

It was amazing to be in Israel just a couple weeks before Holy Week. I gained a new perspective on the proximity of the different places we read about in Scripture. It did not take us long to travel from one site to the next since Israel is not much larger than the state of New Jersey. As we climbed the steps of Old Jerusalem it was easy to imagine our Lord following a similar path. Each site was a place of veneration for Christians, Jews, and/or Muslims but nothing compared to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher which, according to tradition, is the site of Christ's crucifixion and where it is said he was buried and rose again from the tomb. In that same area different gates led you into the different religious traditions and into the different marketplaces. We could walk around freely from each of these sections but some places were off-limits. Those sites were protected by armed guards.

Outside the city gates, in the Mount of Olives and the Garden of Gethsemane, we saw a stunning view of Jerusalem that highlights the bright gold dome of the Temple Mount. Temple Mount is a holy site for both Jews and Muslims. For the Jews it is said to be the place where Abraham demonstrated his devotion to God by taking his son, Isaac, to be sacrificed. It is also said to be the location of the historic Jewish temple, one built by Solomon and then rebuilt around the 6th century BCE. For the Muslims it is the site of Muhammad's ascent into heaven and is considered the third holiest site in Islam.

We were not permitted to enter the area because it was a time of prayer for the Muslims. Jews traditionally will not enter the Temple Mount for fear of treading on holy ground. The Western Wall (the last of the retaining wall of the Temple Mount) is the closest to the temple that Jews are traditionally permitted to go for their time of prayer. We visited the wall on the day when the young Jewish boys celebrated their Bar Mitzvah. With a white canopy over their heads, the boys joined their friends and family and marched to the wall with loud music and lots of singing. The men continued to their place of honor on the one side of the wall where the ceremony would take place as the women covered their heads and walked around a barrier so that they could climb on chairs and tables to watch the event unfold from a distance. This was clearly a time and place where we recognized how deeply the people respected and honored their traditions.

Our trip to the different cities around the Sea of Galilee was much more serene. As we stood on the shores of the sea, we could envision our Lord sitting in the midst of the crowds as he taught them and healed them. In Nazareth, different countries from around the world displayed their artistic renderings of Mary, the Mother of Our Lord. We were especially intrigued with the statue of Mary that showed her stepping on the head of the serpent. Joseph had a place to call his own as excavations uncovered the home of a carpenter. Couples throng the church in Cana to renew their wedding vows. The site where the transfiguration was to have taken place is set off in the distance on the highest hill. At the River Jordan hundreds of people put on white robes to be baptized in its waters. In Capernaum, a statue of Peter stood tall as he held a shepherd's staff in one hand and the keys of the kingdom in the others. And in the same location there were remnants of the house of his mother-in-law and many more artifacts that gave us a real sense of what it takes to discover and restore the history of these people.

We walked the streets of Tel Aviv and Joppa. For most of the day we walked around the cities without a guide and discovered things on our own. But later in the day we joined a walking tour of Joppa and learned about this important seaport to Jerusalem. At the encouragement of her audience, our guide went off script and shared some of her thoughts about the Israeli people. She talked about the measures they take to prepare and protect themselves. Walls and barriers have been built to keep their enemies out and it is mandatory for both men and women to serve in the military at the age of eighteen. As soon as they graduate from high school they are enlisted into service. The men serve for three years and the women for two years. After that they can return home or enter college but they remain on the reserved list and can be called back to active duty at any time. The people desire and pray for peace while they stay alert and prepared.

The significance of visiting the holy sites will come through in my sermons for a while. Every time I open my Bible images come back to me, and I rejoice that I had this opportunity to travel to this part of the world that has such significance for our walk of faith. It is pure joy for me to recall the Bible stories and to let my imagination picture the different scenes. But alongside the journey of faith all three of us came home with a better understanding of the history of the country and what has helped define them as a nation. We saw barriers of different kinds to separate people but there were plenty of places where there were no walls. It is my hope and prayer that the people will continue to strive for the peace they say they long for.

It is difficult to put into words all that happened in the span of one week.
I was blessed to have this time with my daughters.
And I am glad to be home!

March 12, 2018 Meeting of Congregation Council

Call to order: 7:30 pm

Opening devotions: Deacon Erin led the Council in devotions based on Romans 8:31-39 with the theme "Nothing can separate us from God's Love."

Adoption of agenda: The agenda was agreed upon with Tom Van Wazer's budget discussion as the opening topic.

Guest Presenter: Tom Van Wazer, an attorney and accountant, was welcomed to discuss our budget practices. Dean Graves explained how the budget categories work. We as a council agreed that we could be clearer about our dependence upon year-end requests and how the categories work in practice.

Pastor's report / Deacon Erin report / Marlon Yearwood report were distributed by Deacon Erin.

Approval of minutes of February 12, 2018 Council meeting (copy attached). The minutes were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's report (copy attached)

Executive Committee report: The Executive Committee met as scheduled despite the recent windstorm.

For Council action:

- Lenten activities: Easter Saturday there will be a Vigil Walk (new this year). More information will be forthcoming. Attendance is good for the Wednesday evening services and some new people are attending.
- Stained glass window update: The installers test-fit the first window. We anticipate dedication on May 20. PSK will reach out to donor family members to ensure they will be present.
- New Connections update: Florence was unable to attend this evening's meeting, so this report is deferred to next month.
- New member photos: Carol needs a photo of each new Council member for the bulletin board. It is also an opportunity for continuing Council Members to update their photos.
- Discussion of Council priorities for 2018: President Kratz solicited Council ideas and suggestions/recommendations for priorities and practices.

- Dean Graves suggested that Council set aside some time for special topics like this evening's discussion of the budget.
- Perhaps having the Committee Chairs or leaders come to a Council meeting would enable dialogue and emphasize transparency.
- The "Redeemer Listens" practice for discerning needs and issues could be revisited and perhaps done again.
- Possible community-building activities could include mixers, a men's group, a trip to the new Bible Museum, and/or a square dance. Faith and Fellowship will be a featured topic at next month's Council meeting.

Committee Liaison reports:

- Social Concerns: Deanna Heier reported on the Refugee program. Our point person for the Good Neighbor Program has moved on. Two other individuals are serving as points of contact for Redeemer.
- Youth: Joseph Kratz noted that last night was the Confirmation Seder. About 56 people attended. The High School group has begun meeting on the second and fourth Sundays of the month.

New business: Roberta Pittman suggested having a workshop to explain how people who are aged 70 1/2 can designate their required minimum distribution (RMD) from IRAs to go to the church, creating a beneficial effect for the giver and the church. Ideally, one or more people who gave their RMDs to Redeemer could explain the process.

Redeemer Moves Forward With LSS Good Neighbor Program

Minutes from Planning Meeting. Stephanie Hunter (Redeemer LSS Good Neighbor Program Chair) provided an overview of the program. Redeemer has submitted an application with a six-month commitment to work with a refugee family, helping them adjust to life in our community. Seven Social Concerns members attended a training session on January 23. The next step is to get background checks for volunteers who will have extended direct contact with the family that LSS will assign to Redeemer. The family may be assigned within the next couple of months. Volunteers are needed for direct contact (e.g., transportation, mentoring) as well as behind the scenes tasks (e.g., collecting household items, coat drive).

Here is your February Ham Report.


On February 1, Gordon Jones delivered 10 boxes of ham weighing approximately 350 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Fairfax and Falls Church HoneyBaked Ham stores.

On February 8, Rick Stewart delivered 8 boxes of ham weighing approximately 280 pounds from the Falls Church and Fairfax stores. Three boxes went to Martha's Table and five boxes to the DC Central Kitchen.

On February 22, Rick Stewart delivered 17 boxes of ham weighing approximately 595 pounds from the Reston store. Four boxes went to ThriveDC, 4 boxes to CFLS and 9 boxes to Martha's Table.

So for the month, we delivered approximately 1,225 pounds of ham. Pretty good for a short month. Our delivery breakdown was as follows: DC Central Kitchen, 525 pounds; Martha's Table, 420 pounds; Thrive DC, 140 pounds and Community Family Life Services, 140 pounds. So our annual totals come to: DC Central Kitchen, 1,680 pounds; Martha's Table, 420 pounds; ThriveDC, 140 pounds and CFLS, 245 pounds. Our year-to-date total is 2,485 pounds of ham.
