A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR SANDY KESSINGER

By What Authority



Since the time of my ordination (which was twenty-three years ago) my wardrobe consists of casual clothes and clerics. I wear the clerical collar almost all the time for several reasons. In Pittsburgh, where most of my ordained ministry has taken place, it is the tradition for pastors to be seen in their *collars* when in public. After so many years it has become my habit (no pun intended) to put it on almost every morning. Since I know what I am going to wear it allows me extra time to think about my responsibilities for the day. Wearing the collar keeps me prepared for any emergencies and for those sudden trips to the hospital. And when I am out and about in the community it is easily recognizable by others ... although not by everyone. When wearing the clerical collar I have been mistaken for a store clerk on more than one occasion. Most people are not sure what the collar means so they are curious enough to ask. And every now and then someone will ask me when nuns started wearing the collar.

On the one hand, we are the same people with or without the collar. We are no better or no worse than others. But on the other hand it does change things. It changes how people look at us and how they address us and how they engage us in conversation. They know what they can expect from us in terms of our behavior and overall demeanor. They know we are approachable.

Case in point: A couple of weeks ago I had to service my car. I went to the car dealership and turned it over to the representative. When the car was done he walked me to his desk and then immediately he asked me what I was. I told him I was a Lutheran pastor in McLean and he proceeded to talk for the next fifteen minutes about his journey to Christ. He was passionate about the hand of God coming upon him in an unexpected way and how that directed him on a path he never imagined. He was a grateful and a blessed man.

Later that same day I went to the local Giant and encountered a man who wanted to know who I was. I told him I was a Lutheran pastor and he proceeded to ask me where I served. As he continued to check out his groceries he wanted to know more. He asked if I would be willing to sit down with him sometime so he could learn more about God. I gave him the location of the church and invited him to stop by when he had the time.

When people see us in the community the black shirt and the white collar allow them to make certain assumptions about us. They assume that we are people who will easily engage them in conversations, who can be trusted, who can keep a confidence, and who have dedicated their lives to serving our Lord. When people see us in the church other assumptions are made. As we stand in front of everyone on a Sunday morning we have the authority given to us by the church to absolve people of their sins knowing that the forgiveness we offer comes from God alone. When we stand behind the altar on a Sunday morning we have the authority given to us by the church to consecrate the bread and the wine knowing that the meal is the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are to take these responsibilities very seriously and we are to do our very best to fulfill our calling with the utmost integrity knowing that we will fail from time to time.

So the news earlier this month shocked and saddened me. A grand jury report was released on August 14 and it put back in the spotlight alleged sexual abuse cases by priests ... this time in the state of Pennsylvania. More than 300 priests affected more than 1,000 child victims over a period of seven decades. Every single time I hear about such incidents I am troubled but this time it took place in the state where I did most of my ministry. I watched the news more closely to see if Pittsburgh (where I spent the majority of my life) was included in the list of locations. Sure enough ... allegations were named in the Diocese of Pittsburgh and the Diocese of Greensburg (a part of Southwestern Pennsylvania).

In my previous call as one of the bishop's assistants in the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod, I had oversight of the ecumenical ministry. I came to know well Bishop Donald Wuerl of the Diocese of Pittsburgh who served at the time when these alleged abuses took place. In 2006 he became the archbishop of Washington, D.C. and then in 2010 Pope Benedict XVI elevated him to the College of Cardinals. His pristine reputation has taken a significant hit in the last couple of weeks.

I met with him numerous times over the years as he had a close working relationship with our bishop. Now I see his name and picture in the news as people wonder if he mishandled these cases and did not do enough at the time. After having a conversation with one of my colleagues in Pittsburgh I know that the sign that displays the name of a school in Cranberry Township (a northern suburb of Pittsburgh) used to read *Cardinal Wuerl North Catholic High School*. Before the first day of classes someone vandalized the sign and painted over the words *Cardinal Wuerl* with red paint. Since that time Cardinal Wuerl has requested that his name be removed so that all that is unfolding will not be a distraction to those seeking an education.

All of us (whether we wear a clerical collar or not) must be held responsible for the safety and well-being of all people and especially our children. For those of us who are ordained we must follow the rules and regulations along with everyone else. We are not exempt. At Redeemer we have a *Child Protection Policy* that we review with our Faith Formation Mentors (Sunday school teachers) at the beginning of each year. We follow state laws for background checks. We always look for ways to improve current policies.

I pray for those in the Diocese of Pittsburgh and in the Greensburg area and throughout the state of Pennsylvania. I pray for all those who have made their situations known so that healing will take place in their lives. I also pray for those who are accused of such crimes that the truth will be made known for the sake of all those involved. And I pray for us as the body of Christ. We are all part of the priesthood of all believers. Whether we wear our faith on the outside and/or within our souls, we want to be faithful in our calling to love God and neighbor in good and healthy and appropriate ways.

Redeemer Family,

I feel like the Apostle Paul, who wrote several letters, specifically to the churches that he loved. In many of his letters, Paul would often mention people by name, sometimes for rebuke and sometimes for encouragement and thankfulness. What I love most about Redeemer is not the beautiful building, but rather the love in the hearts of the people who reside there. Over the seven years that I have been a part of the Redeemer community, my family and I have been received, encouraged, welcomed, and served. I praise God for the tremendous relationships that I have made in this place.

One of my favorite passages in the Scripture is Ecclesiastes Chapter 3:

To everything *there is* a season, A time for every purpose under heaven:
A time to be born, And a time to die; A time to plant, And a time to pluck *what is* planted;
A time to kill, And a time to heal; A time to break down, And a time to build up;
A time to weep, And a time to laugh; A time to mourn, And a time to dance;
A time to cast away stones, And a time to gather stones; A time to embrace, And a time to refrain from embracing;
A time to gain, And a time to lose; A time to keep, And a time to throw away;
A time to tear, And a time to sew; A time to keep silence, And a time to speak;
A time to love, And a time to hate; A time of war, And a time of peace.

In Ecclesiastes 3:11, King Solomon went on to say, “God has made everything beautiful in its time.” And in Ecclesiastes 3:14, King Solomon said, “Everything God does shall be forever, nothing can be added to it and nothing taken away.”

As you are all, hopefully, aware, my season at Redeemer has come to a positive end. I have now begun the next season in my life: seasons are supposed to change and new seasons are good!

Like the apostle Paul often did in his farewell letters, I would like to reflect back and highlight three individuals that God had used as an instrument in the beginning and throughout my time at Redeemer. The first would have to be my beautiful wife, Deborah Yearwood. Deborah was the one who saw an advertisement stating that Redeemer was hiring teachers for their after-school program and it was also she who scheduled both of our interviews. However, my journey at Redeemer would not have continued if Roberta Pittman did not hire me as a teacher for the Redeemer Renaissance After School Program (RRASP). I remember that while there were many applicants interested in the position, there were only two positions available, one of which was of great interest to my wife. To cut a great story short, Roberta decided to hire not just me, but also my wife Deborah. God was definitely at work during the hiring process and it was an absolute honor to serve with Roberta as she led with love and grace and as we impacted the lives of the elementary kids in our community. Thank you, Roberta, for allowing the Lord to use you in impacting the next seven years of my life!

The next person I would like to thank is PSK. After serving one full year at the after-school program, my wife became pregnant with Moses and, as a result, we agreed that it would be best for her to stay home and serve our son full-time. At that time, PSK came on board at Redeemer and a search started for a part-time youth mentor. PSK reached out to me to see if I would be interested in serving the youth at RLC (God at work, again). PSK and the council, after seeing my resume and having a great connection with me, decided to hire me part-time. The timing was very impeccable because Deborah had just stopped working at RRASP and I was the only one who was producing an income. With me working at RRASP and part-time with the youth at RLC I was able to supply the income that Deborah would have been making, had she been working. Later, in 2013, PSK and the council hired me as full-time Youth Mentor. I thank PSK for many things, for not only did she hire me, she was a great leader and she gave me the opportunity to serve in a field that corresponded with my calling and passion. PSK truly loves people and is an excellent servant to all. Thank you, PSK, for everything!

In conclusion, the relationships that my wife and I have made at Redeemer are priceless. We can name several people and speak about many of the families that have touched and impacted our lives for the better. This is what I want to leave with you all: always be conscious of the people that God uses in your life to impact you and never take them for granted. I want you all to take a moment to think about all the people that God has sent to touch your life for the greater, and then thank God for them.

The next season of my life continues with me preparing to plant The Way City Church in Woodbridge, VA, in the Fall of 2019.

Next year, I will be doing a church planting residency at McLean Bible Church (MBC). MBC will be my sending church and they have committed to support, mentor, train, and prepare me for the next season of my life.

Here is Your June Ham Report

On June 7, Bob Hahne and Nancy Power delivered 6 boxes of ham weighing approximately 210 pounds to Martha's Table from the Falls Church and Fairfax HoneyBaked Ham stores.

On June 14, Rick Stewart delivered 7 boxes of ham weighing approximately 245 pounds; 3 boxes to Martha's Table and 4 boxes to Thrive DC. All boxes came from the Falls Church store.

On June 15, Ralph Dutrow delivered 15 boxes of ham weighing approximately 525 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Reston store.

On June 21, Laura Wareham delivered 9 boxes of ham weighing approximately 315 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Falls Church and Fairfax stores.

On June 8, Gordon Jones delivered 9 boxes of ham weighing approximately 315 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Falls Church and Fairfax stores.

So for the month of June, we delivered approximately 1,610 pounds of ham. A hot month by any standard! That brings our year to date total to 9,130 pounds.

Here is a breakdown by charity for the month:

DC Central Kitchen 1,155 pounds; Martha's Table 315 pounds and ThriveDC 140 pounds. Our annual totals are: DC Central Kitchen 6,855 pounds; Martha's Table 1,540 pounds; ThriveDC 490 pounds and CFLS 245 pounds.

In the August Tidings we talked about the Creation window. This month we will share with you the information from the booklet that describes the window we have entitled "Bible."



BIBLE

The Bible tells us the story of God and His people. The overarching theme is God's plan to redeem His people. We are reassured that His *steadfast love endures forever* (as recorded in so many of the Psalms).

As Lutherans, we "accept the canonical Scriptures of the Old and New Testament as the inspired Word of God and the authoritative source and norm of our proclamation, faith, and life." (From the ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations)

... because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God. (2 Peter 1:21)

The Old Testament is the Hebrew Bible. It contains historical writings, hymns of praise, and wisdom literature as well as writings of the prophets. The Old Testament tells us about God's chosen people and their Exodus from slavery in Egypt. One of the many covenants between God and His people was made while they were on that journey; on Mt. Sinai, Moses saw the presence of God in the burning bush and later received the Ten Commandments from Him.

Even though God's people disobeyed and endured disasters, warfare, and exile, God preserved a remnant of them each time with the promise that He was their God. Some instances include Noah's family saved after the Flood, baby Moses saved when the Pharaoh ordered that Hebrew male babies be killed, and the portion of the Israelites who returned to Jerusalem after the Exile to Babylon.

The New Testament includes the four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John -- depicted as candles) that tell us of the life and teachings of Jesus Christ; the letters of Paul and other authors speak to the formation of the early Church and address specific issues that developed along the way. It is through the Church that the good news of Jesus Christ spreads.

From creation to the end of times, the Word of God *is a lamp to our feet and a light to our path.* (Psalm 119:105)

Fuego Volcano Eruption: Partner for Surgery says Thank You, Redeemer!

As many of you know, Guatemala's Fuego volcano suddenly erupted in June and sent hot lava into numerous villages. Hundreds were killed and many more still missing. Among the survivors were many burned children and Partner for Surgery immediately sent out an appeal for funds to help in their post-operative recovery. The generous response of Redeemer and others allowed us to give a \$5,000 check to Dr. Lourdes Santiso, the burn surgeon who has collaborated with us for many years at the Children's Burn Clinic in Guatemala City.

At the burn clinic we were able to talk with Herman Perez and his three daughters and hear their story: On the Sunday of the eruption, Herman was at his job loading crates 40 kilometers away and his wife and daughters were spending the afternoon with Herman's sister. Suddenly there was a rumble and commotion and they stepped outside to see a very large, dark cloud bearing down on them. Herman's sister's family ran back inside but Herman's wife and daughters decided to run. The Mom grabbed two year old Dayana, but Tatania, the oldest, realized her sister Cristy was not with her and went back inside the dark house. She could feel her skin burning but found Cristy by touch and ran out of the house with her. All seven members of the family that stayed inside perished.

Tatania ran with Cristy ahead with Cristy. Everything was very dark because of the smoke and ash but Tatania suddenly saw a light and led the family to it. The light was the headlights of a car loaded with people but there was no room for them. A crowded second tar took them in. Tatania was the hero of the family. Her father said: "Tatania is like the boy I never had because she's always next to me...interested in my work and helping me. That helped her to be touch and she is tough and was able to get her sister out and save her life."

All three of the girls have burns but will survive. Tatania will have scars on her face. Their house is gone and most of the village, including the school, is destroyed. Herman has lost his job because he has not been able to report for work. The mother was in surgery as we were visiting, with burns on her legs. They have lost everything.

Refugee Family Needs a Home

Through the LSS Good Neighbor Program, Redeemer's Social Concerns Ministry is helping a family originally from Eritrea to adjust to life in our community. Six years ago, Mewael was in an automobile accident that left him paralyzed from the waist down. Since he, his sister (Wehazit), and niece arrived in America last March, they have been living temporarily with his aunt's family in a small apartment.

Their biggest challenge now is to find housing. They are looking for a two bedroom apartment that is handicapped accessible. Are you aware of an in-law suite, basement, first floor apartment without steps, an apartment in an elevator building or other affordable apartment option in Virginia that does not require a co-signer? Mewael and his family need a home! Please contact Rosie at ebadatr@lssnca.org if you can help.

Once the family finds an apartment, Redeemer will supplement rent for two months and then furnish the unit. Redeemer members have already promised to donate furniture, bedding, kitchen and bathroom supplies, and other essential items. In the meantime, we have brought medical supplies to Mewael, as well as clothing and toys for 4 year old Midian who will begin Head Start in a few weeks. We have also helped Mewael complete an application for a power wheelchair which he hopes to receive soon. The family appreciates everything that Redeemer is doing for them and is especially grateful to Barbara Donne who is providing individualized ESL classes for each of the family's members.

Come meet the family at our Day of Service on September 9th. Hear from them about their challenges to settle here and their hopes for the future.
