A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR SANDY KESSINGER

Director of Youth Ministry

On Sunday, August 26, we blessed Marlon Yearwood and his family as a way to honor Marlon's full-time ministry with us as he heads into a new venture. Marlon will take the next twelve months to be trained as a mission developer. At the end of his training he will start the process of planting a new church near his current home. We wish him well as he continues to use his gifts to proclaim the gospel message in word and deed.

Marlon told us about his upcoming departure in the early part of May. He made the commitment to stay with us through the summer months so he could assist with our Vacation Bible School in July and take the lead with the YouthWorks mission trip that immediately followed. By sharing his plans with us as early as he did, it allowed our council the opportunity to start the process for hiring a new Director of Youth Ministry. We used the summer months to engage some parents and youth in conversation to determine our current needs for our youth ministry program. We reviewed the current job description and made changes to reflect what we needed moving into the future. Once the new job description was approved by the council we posted the position on social media and on church-related websites. We also used our connections with the synod to let other area congregations know that we were looking to fill this full-time position.

By the middle of August we were ready to proceed with initial interviews with the top candidates. We conducted in-person interviews for those that lived nearby and did interviews via Skype for those that lived further away. Once we narrowed it down to a primary candidate we invited the person to come to Redeemer to meet our staff, church leaders and youth. A committee made up of a good cross-section of members also interviewed her. We sought their opinion before the Human Resources Committee made a recommendation to the council.

We are pleased to announce that we made an offer to Amanda Gebhart and she has accepted the position to be our full-time Director of Youth Ministry. She currently serves as the Director of Youth and Family Ministry in a Lutheran church in Minnesota. One of the gifts that she will offer to us is her faith that centers on her love for God through Christ. When she wrote her introductory letter she started it with quoting her Confirmation verse from Micah 6:8. It guides her life and it states clearly the person she strives to become. She is very familiar with the Lutheran church as her father is an ELCA pastor in New Jersey. Her mother is a social worker and Amanda has blended well those two aspects of her family life.

Amanda has experience in working with adults and youth to organize and execute events. She likes to put together a schedule a year-in-advance so parents and youth know what to expect. She has experience with children of all ages. In addition to youth events Amanda has worked closely with Sunday school coordinators, developed curriculum for Vacation Bible School, organized mission trips, and most recently led a group of 35 youth to the ELCA Youth Gathering. She enjoys working as a team and with ecumenical leaders in the community.

Outside of the local congregation, Amanda is committed to using her gifts at the synod and church-wide level. Prior to her position in Minnesota, she served as a member of the New Jersey Candidacy Committee and was a voting member of the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. She was also a Camp Counselor in New Jersey.

We are very excited that Amanda feels called to come to Redeemer! Please keep her in your prayers as she bids farewell to her current congregation and begins her journey to Virginia. She will be arriving here on October 21 (and will need some assistance on moving day). She will take a couple of weeks to unpack and do all the things one needs to do when relocating to a new state. Amanda wants to have as much of her personal life in order before she starts with us on November 1.

We used this time of staff transition to review what we currently do with our office space. We are making some needed changes that will improve how we function. Amanda will have her office where Bill Parks and Lionel Jackson currently have their offices. It allows her to have adequate room to store some of her youth materials. It also places her closer to the youth activities that include the Preschool ministry, our Afterschool ministry, the Faith Formation classes, and the gym.

Bill will move to where Carol is currently located and they will share space since they both work on the use of the facility. They will be better able to coordinate their efforts. We will set up space for Lionel in Keillor Hall so that he can better serve those who come and go out of our building in the afternoons and evenings. His visibility will allow our guests to know that someone is available to help them as needed and it will also improve our security efforts.

We are excited about Amanda carving out her space with us and using her God-given gifts to continue to foster the faith of our children and help them build stronger relationships with each other. Please come to the worship services on Sunday, November 4, to welcome Amanda and greet her at a special reception we will hold in the Crossroads.

September 10, 2018 Meeting of Congregation Council

Council members present: Matthew Kratz (President), Mitch Brown, Karen Detweiler (Secretary), Laura Duval (Vice President), Deanna Heier, Stephanie Hunter, Joseph Kratz (Youth Representative), Pastor Sandy Kessinger, Florence Ofili-Toviho, Roberta Pittman, and Rob Wenk. Absent: Dean Graves (Treasurer), Gordon Jones, Steve Lancaster.

Opening

President Matthew Kratz called the meeting to order at 7:30pm

Pastor Kessinger led devotions from *Living Our Baptism ... Five Gifts of Discipleship*. Council discussed their early life experiences with memorable clergy.

Adoption of agenda: Roberta Pittman and Deanna Heier (Social Concerns) offered additions.

Pastor's report / Deacon Erin report: Numbers are up because the report covers two months. Discussion highlighted PSK's dinner with our youth.

Approval of minutes of July 9, 2018 Council meeting (copy attached): Eritrea, not Somalia, is the country noted. Approved unanimously.

Treasurer's report: In Dean Graves' absence, Rob Wenk presented the Treasurer's report. There were three payroll cycles in August. The mission line item is up because of costs related to the ELCA Youth Gathering; the numbers will come down as funds are transferred from the fundraising account (flower sale, etc.). Debt reduction included three principal payments. We closed out the program for the Preschool and Afterschool programs. The Preschool was a bit short on the Use fee, and the Afterschool program finished with a modest surplus.

For Council action:

- Director of Youth Ministry update: Five qualified candidates were reviewed. Three were interviewed. The thoughtful job description was noted as a reason why the candidates approached Redeemer. Deanna Heier shared the resume and cover letter for the top candidate, Amanda Gebhart. She is a NJ-native now based in Minnesota. She stayed with one of our families during her visit. The interview committee included youth of various age groups, Council Members, and Congregation members. Amanda's gifts are strong in planning and organizational skills. She has experience working with youth of all ages. She organized chaperones and travel for more than 30 youth to the ELCA Youth Gathering. She has built relationships with youth ministry personnel at other area churches. She is a "cradle Lutheran" who is good at connecting the kids with what is in the Bible. She will start on November 1.
- Rob Wenk reviewed the research and analysis regarding compensation, local benchmarks, and the Synod-provided worksheet. He described the package to the candidate, who felt it was workable. Rob Wenk will deliver the offer to the candidate tomorrow. We hope for a rapid response.
- Deacon Erin internship update. No news beyond the report.
- New Connections Task Force: PSK has a committee that includes three youth and adult members. The task force includes Emma Bradley, Florence Ofili-Toviho, Roberta Pittman, Larry Pittman, Nancy Power, Will Ubben and Ella Truslow. PSK hopes the new Director of Youth Ministry will become a member of the task force.
- The next dinner Pot Luck gathering will be October 13 at 5:00 PM with an Oktoberfest theme. Come early and help set up, eat, and help clean up.
- Faith Formation kick-off: The new school year is seeing very significant increases in enrollment for both youth and adult faith formation programs. Some classes are combined grades. More volunteers are needed.

- Council and church leader retreat: We will schedule the retreat for this spring.
- Lutheran World Relief (LWR): LWR has approached Redeemer about becoming a Cornerstone Congregation, which helps with a local farmer's cooperative. The cost of participating is \$10K. The intent is to support farmers in places like Nicaragua and Guatemala. We will ask our contacts with LWR for more details.
- Fall planning was discussed.

Committee Liaison reports

Social Concerns:

- Day of Service was very successful. The backpack drive was a big benefit to children who otherwise have few resources. Prayer shawls, baby rattles, and other initiatives were very engaged. We had to cancel the Children's Center brush clearing project due to weather. Girl Scouts delivered meals to fire and police stations.
- The bike collection project was highly successful. Tom found a truck and a man who repairs bikes to ensure the bikes were safe for kids. The Boy Scouts helped ensure safety of bikes.
- Rise Against Hunger is scheduled for Nov. 3.
- Oct. 7 the Social Concerns committee will work through the Faith Formation classes on service, making quilts. There's a thought to do one in the Fall and one in the Spring.
- Refugee Family: We visit approximately every week. There continues to be challenges on the housing front and the job front. The families enjoyed visiting with Redeemer as part of the Day of Service.
- Music and Worship: Roberta received notes and calendar highlights from the August meeting. They meet again Oct. 30.

STAINED GLASS WINDOW: LIFE OF CHRIST

In the September Tidings we talked about the Bible window. This month we will share with you the reflection from the stained glass window booklet that describes the window we have entitled "Life of Christ".



LIFE OF CHRIST

God sent His Son into the world for our salvation. He came as a baby (Christmas) and died on the Cross for us (Good Friday). The sign on His Cross had the Latin letters "INRI."

Pilate also had an inscription written and put on the cross. It read, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." (John 19:19)

Just as Jesus had two natures, human and divine, so He had two ways in which He disappointed those in authority. The Jewish leaders did not view Him as the Messiah, and the Roman authorities felt threatened by His growing popularity --- hence His crucifixion.

But the GOOD NEWS is seen in the empty tomb: He rose from the dead (Easter). Through His resurrection, we are saved and have eternal life.

The Bible's New Testament tells us of the life of Jesus Christ: calling His twelve disciples, teaching and telling parables, healing and eating with people from all parts of society, telling people about the Kingdom of God, and showing how we should live. He stressed the importance of prayer, forgiveness, faith, and love.

I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another. (John 13: 34-35)

The book of Isaiah in the Old Testament has verses that Christians say foretell the coming of Christ:

Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel. (Isaiah 7:14)

For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. (Isaiah 9:6)

Our Food Recycling and Meal Distribution programs fight food waste while nourishing hungry DC residents. Last fiscal year we recovered and processed over 1 million pounds of food that would otherwise go to waste and transformed it into 1.81 million healthy meals for hungry, at-risk individuals at local homeless shelters, transitional homes, afterschool programs, and senior care centers. **With your donation, we will provide critical nutrition to thousands of our city's at-risk children, adults, and seniors each day.**

On August 9, Bob Hahne and Nancy Power delivered 7 boxes of ham weighing approximately 245 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Falls Church and Fairfax HoneyBaked Ham stores.

On August 16, Laura Wareham delivered 4 boxes of ham weighing approximately 140 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Falls Church and Fairfax stores.

On August 23, Rick Stewart delivered 7 boxes of ham weighing approximately 245 pounds from the Falls Church and Fairfax stores. 4 boxes went to Martha's Table and 3 to ThriveDC.

On August 28, Ralph Dutrow delivered 10 boxes of ham weighing approximately 350 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Reston store.

On August 30, Roberta Pittman delivered 5 boxes of ham weighing approximately 150 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Falls Church and Fairfax stores.

So for the month of August, we delivered approximately 1,130 pounds of ham. Way to go ham runners!

That brings our yearly total to 11,435 pounds. Here is a breakdown for the month: DC Central Kitchen 885 pounds; Martha's Table 140 pounds and ThriveDC 105 pounds. Our annual totals are: DC Central Kitchen 8,510; Martha's Table 1,785; ThriveDC 595; N Street Village 300 pounds and CFLS 245 pounds.
