## A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR SANDY KESSINGER

### *Come and Worship*

In the *Overview of the Bible* Class we just finished studying the *Acts of the Apostles*. We learned that as the life of the early church started to unfold there were certain elements of the church that were essential. It is beautifully summed up in Acts 2:42 and 46-47a:

Those who welcomed the message of God devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people.

It is beautiful to imagine a church where its members would wake up every morning and spend time studying Scripture and then enter into a time of prayer. Our personal devotional lives would then point us to our time of worship when we would come together in obedience to God and in praise of God (because we recognize that worship is central). It is in worship that we hear the Word of God and are fed at his table. We leave with glad and generous hearts to share the good news and to care for those in need. It is how we define the church.

As worship leaders we hope that what takes place inside the church coincides with what is happening in our world. We see that most clearly in the month of November.

### **November 4 – All Saints' Sunday**

We celebrate this festival day on the first Sunday in November. It is the day that we remember those who have gone before us in faith. All of us experience the reality of death and none of us escapes our sense of loss. But on this Sunday we return to the promises of God that offer us comfort and hope. Our family members and friends (the great cloud of witnesses) were touched by the love of God and we share that love on this day with a deep sense of gratitude for the gift of eternal life.

I kept this quote from the late Cardinal Joseph Bernardin of Chicago (1966):

Many people have asked me to tell them about heaven and the afterlife. I sometimes smile at the request because I do not know any more than they do. Yet, when one young man asked if I looked forward to being united with God and all those who have gone before me, I made the connection with the first time I traveled with my mother and sister to my parent's homeland in northern Italy. I felt as if I had been there before. After years of looking through my mother's photo albums, I knew the mountains, the land, the houses, and the people. As soon as we entered the valley I said – My God, I know this place. I am home. Somehow I think crossing from this life into eternal life will be similar. If we spend any time filling our minds with thoughts of heaven then when we finally cross over into eternal life the images we see may not be foreign or startling or strange. We, too, might be able to say – My God, I know this place. I am home.

## **November 11 – Veterans Day**

Veterans Day is a national holiday that honors our military who served in our Armed Forces. It coincides this year with the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Armistice Day. In 1918 at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month an armistice was signed between the Allies of World War I and Germany.

The ELCA has sent us worship resources to use on that Sunday. In addition we ask all of you who are veterans of our Armed Forces (or who currently serve) to bring in any memorabilia and/or pictures of when you served (please mark them well so we can return them to you safely). Materials will be collected from now until Friday, November 9. We will display them in the Crossroads on November 11. It would be helpful if the items were also labeled for the time period served.

We would also like to know of anyone who is currently serving overseas so that our children could send him/her greeting cards from Redeemer. Please send us an address and the relationship you have with that person.

And if anyone still fits in their uniforms –  
Please feel free to wear them on that day!

## **November 18 – A Sunday of Thanksgiving**

Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him and bless his name. For the Lord is good. His steadfast love endures forever and his faithfulness to all generations. (Psalm 100:4-5)

As Thanksgiving Day approaches, we tend to be a little more thoughtful and a little more generous as we dwell on all that we have received from God. We voice our love for God in deep gratitude for his blessings and all the riches we have in Christ. But this year I encourage all of us to think of how our grateful hearts can inspire us into concrete actions that are lived out beyond this one single, brief day.

On this Sunday we will remember the covenant we made with God to proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace. We will remember that we were sealed in that covenant by the gift of the Holy Spirit as we were marked (at the time of our baptism) with the cross of Christ forever. Our faith is not passive but is proactive, public and powerful. We will pray for the Holy Spirit to open our eyes and our hearts so that our prayer of thanksgiving will become a daily prayer.

## **November 25 – Christ the King Sunday**

It is the end of the church year! It is a festival Sunday! We celebrate with joy and thanksgiving our Lord who reigns over our lives. It is also a special day for three of our young people – Hendrik Johnson, Charles Lindsay, and Joseph Warren – who will receive their First Communion at the 11 am service.

In our attempt to make worship relevant we know that on Sundays like this one it is important to understand the nature of God who created this world and who governs it. God has placed each of us on this earth for a fixed period of time. It is appropriate on this day to take stock of what we are doing with the time allotted to us. As we end one church year and turn to another we contemplate time as a gift. Every morning when we wake up we are invited into a new day and we circle back to the what we do as church – we study Scripture and spend time in prayer, we gather together in worship as we hear the Word of God and are fed at his table, and we leave so we can proclaim the good news of Christ and care for those in need.

I invite you to come and worship with us in November ... and as often as your schedule permits in December, January, etc. With glad and generous hearts we worship in obedience to God and to praise his Holy name.

### **Minutes from the Church Council Meeting of October 8, 2018**

Council members present: Matthew Kratz (President), Mitch Brown, Karen Detweiler (Secretary), Laura Duval (Vice President), Stephanie Hunter, Dean Graves (Treasurer), Gordon Jones, Steve Lancaster, Pastor Sandy Kessinger, and Rob Wenk. Absent: Deanna Heier, Joseph Kratz (Youth Representative), Florence Ofili-Toviho, and Roberta Pittman.

#### Opening

Matthew Kratz called the meeting to order at 7:36 pm.

Pastor Kessinger led devotions from *Living Our Baptism ... Five Gifts of Discipleship*. Council discussed the meaning of help and service.

#### Adoption of Agenda

The agenda was adopted as presented with addition of Redeemer Preschool Board members for approval.

#### Pastor's Report / Deacon Erin Report

Pastor Kessinger reported on her recent activities. The church staff has been working on reorganization of the office space. The Young Adult group is changing their name to the Social Crew. The Blessing of the Animals was very well attended.

#### Approval of Minutes

The minutes from the September 10, 2018 Council meeting were approved unanimously.

#### Treasurer's Report

Dean Graves shared the Treasurer's report. He noted that we have two new six-month Certificates of Deposit. The Council discussed timing for end of year financial updates. Rob Wenk will pull out the schedule and messages from last year. We plan to streamline the presentation of the budget in the Annual Meeting to make it easier to understand.

#### Council Discussion

- Pastor Kessinger shared an update on the start for the newly hired Director of Youth Ministry. Amanda will arrive in October and begin November 1.
- Council discussed timing for both the Annual Meeting and future Call Meeting. Pastor Kessinger has written to the Bishop with questions regarding call practices. There are many steps involved, including approvals and assignment, once Deacon Erin is approved for ordination. Will keep the Council updated.
- As the year comes to an end, Council discussed current members terms. Gordon Jones has agreed to head the nominating committee for Council positions.
- Deanna Heier and Laura Duval will finish their first terms and can be re-elected.
- Dean Graves is coming to the end of his first term as treasurer.
- Joseph Kratz will finish his term as Youth Representative.
- Gordon Jones will finish his second term so he is not eligible for re-election.
- There are also two empty seats on the Endowment Fund Committee.

## Committee Reports

- The Redeemer Preschool presented a slate of three new Board Members: Marti Hopler, a member and alum parent; Michelle Milic, a non-member parent; and Danielle Princi, a non-member parent. The Council unanimously approved the new board members
- The prayer shawl ministry would like to sell shawls during the holidays to benefit the Redeemer refugee family. It was approved by consensus.
- Rob Wenk reported on the recent meeting of the Endowment Fund Committee. The current members are Dave Muchow, Mike Chambers, and Lorinda Opsahl-Ong. As no gifts were given in 2017, the Committee recommended presenting four grants including N St. Village, Partners for Surgery, the McLean-Falls Church Children's Center, and Homestretch. There will still be funds available in 2019 to give additional gifts. The Committee will reach out to the congregation for future suggestions. The initial request for gifts was approved unanimously by the Council.

## Closing

The meeting closed with The Lord's Prayer at 8:44 PM. The next Council meeting will be November 12, 2018, and the next meeting of Executive Committee will be October 30, 2018.

## **The Stickiness of Memory Glue**

Gail Ramshaw discusses the importance of keeping traditions in her book, *The Three-Day Feast*. She writes: "To keep is to retain something, to hold it close, to preserve it, to protect it. Festivals need to be 'kept,' or their influence over our lives will cease" (Ramshaw, 9). She went on to talk about 'memory glue' and how celebrations help form and shape communities. This is one of the reasons why we gather for worship. We gather together in weekly fellowship to hold close our memory of the grace and mercy we experience through the baptismal waters and communion table. We hear God's Word and pray as a community of believers knowing we meet God in His Word. When we forgot to 'keep worship' – when we fail to gather as a community of believers – we begin to lose this memory glue. We forgot that community holds us accountable to God and each other. When our memory glue begins to diminish, the focus of worship can so easily shift to our needs, our desires, and our wish to manage and control instead of what God is doing in our midst and all the ways God is breaking into our lives. By keeping worship – by keeping the feast at the communion table – by caring for our memory glue, we see all the ways God keeps us, holds us, and preserves us.

## ELCA Advocacy Activities

[This article is offered in response to those who have asked pastor how the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (the ELCA) addresses some of the issues that we face currently in our country and world.]

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America has Advocacy Offices throughout the United States including one in Washington, DC. The ELCA advocacy website (<https://www.elca.org/Our-Work/Publicly-Engaged-Church/Advocacy>) explains the connection between faith and public life:

“As members of the ELCA, we believe that we are freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor. God uses our hands, through our direct service work and our voices, through our advocacy efforts, to restore and reconcile our world. Through faithful advocacy, the ELCA lives out our Lutheran belief that governments can help advance the common good.”

“ELCA advocacy works for change in public policy based on the experience of Lutheran ministries, programs and projects around the world and in communities across the United States. We work through political channels on behalf of the following biblical values: peacemaking, hospitality to strangers, care for creation, and concern for people living in poverty and struggling with hunger and disease.”

The ELCA also has programs addressing specific areas that also involve advocacy. Current topics include *Justice for Women* that speaks to gender discrimination, *Racial Justice Ministries* that confronts racism and works towards equity, and *Peace Not Walls* that focuses on peace and justice in Palestine and Israel. ## STAINED GLASS WINDOW: SACRAMENTS

*In the October Tiding we focused on the Bible window. This month we are sharing a reflection about the window we have entitled “Sacraments”.*



### SACRAMENTS

The Lutheran Church has two sacraments based on the commandments of Jesus: Baptism and the Eucharist. The Holy Spirit, usually represented as a dove, is present with a physical component in each: water in Baptism as we become children of God; bread and wine in the Eucharist as we share in the body and blood of Jesus Christ. Through both sacraments, we receive forgiveness for our sins.

When Christ commissioned the eleven disciples before His ascension, He said:

*Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age. (Matthew 28:19-20)*

On the night before He was crucified, when He was eating with His disciples:

*... Jesus took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to the disciples, and said, “Take, eat; this is my body.” Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, saying, “Drink from it, all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins.” (Matthew 26: 26-28)*

A seashell is commonly used to symbolize baptism; wheat and grapes represent the body and blood of Jesus Christ. All three symbols became popular in the early Church. The bowl and sandals flow from the baptismal waters as we are sent out to serve in the name of Christ.

The Lutheran Church considers these two sacraments and the Gospel message to be “means of grace,” through which the Holy Spirit helps people to grow spiritually.

## Here is your September Ham Report.

On September 13, Laura Wareham delivered 5 boxes of ham weighing 175 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Fairfax HoneyBaked Ham store.

On September 18, Rick Stewart delivered 12 boxes of ham weighing 420 pounds to the DC Central Kitchen from the Reston store.

On September 27, Roberta Pittman delivered 18 boxes of ham weighing 540 pounds to CFLS, the DC Central Kitchen and N Street Village from the Falls Church and Fairfax stores.

So for the month of September, we delivered 1,135 pounds of ham. Excellent!!

That brings our yearly total to 12,570 pounds. Here is a breakdown for the month: DC Central Kitchen 955 pounds; CFLS 120 pounds and N Street Village 60 pounds. Our annual totals are: DC Central Kitchen 9,465; Martha's Table 1,785; ThriveDC 595; CFLS 365 and N Street Village 360 pounds. All weights are approximate.

## Serving Dinner at Luther Place for 18 Years

NSV began at Luther Place Memorial Church in Washington, DC, in 1972 as an interfaith project by offering temporary housing for 8 homeless women. By 1991, NSV had expanded its services, and Luther Place Memorial Church created a 31 bed temporary shelter for homeless women on the 4<sup>th</sup> floor of the church.

Since then NSV has added several housing options for homeless women, including :

- permanent housing for 44 individuals
- recovery housing for 21 women who have mental illness and addiction issues
- Miriam's House for 25 women who are living with HIV and AIDS
- Erna's House for 30 women with histories of chronic homelessness and disabling conditions
- Eden House, a 51 unit apartment complex, for low and moderate income families and individuals
- Patricia Handy Place, a DC homeless shelter for women, where NSV provides critical services for residents
- Phyllis Wheatley YWCA, where NSV provides wrap-around support services for 42 formerly homeless women.

The NSV Dinner Group was formed 18 years ago when the 6th through high school Sunday School classes took turns for 6 months preparing and serving meals for homeless women at Luther Place. It was clear though that the service was difficult for students since the need was on a Monday night - a school night. However, a few of the adult volunteers decided to continue to serve diners at Luther Place 6 times a year. The composition of the team shifted over the years but the enthusiastic spirit continued and often as the group left Luther Place, it talked about their time together being meaningful to them and how inspiring it was to see the residents working to improve their lives. Of course, they all enjoyed cooking for the residents and have many stories of their adventures getting the meals ready and finding their way to Luther Place.

Under the guidance of Gretchen Stark, 11 other Redeemer volunteers faithfully served meals at Luther Place. Volunteers included Karen Devlin, Paula Green, Kate Jones, Judy Loving, Diane Miller, Lynn Ann Mullane, Carol Pribulka, Lucinda Romberg, Heather Scott, Eric Sivertsen, and Sharie Sivertsen.

Although Luther Place has closed, there are still opportunities to serve meals at Patricia Handy Place for Women and at Bethany Women's Day Center.
