Minutes from the Annual Meeting of the Congregation of Lutheran Church of the Redeemer February 12, 2023 In-Person and Via Zoom

Call to order:

President, Nate Paukovits declared a quorum and called meeting to order at 12:10 PM. Pastor Kessinger opened with prayer.

Consent Agenda:

President, Nate Paukovits moved to approve agenda-as-a-whole, including the Meeting Agenda, Pastors' Reports, President of the Council Report and Ministry Reports as published in the Annual Report. The motion was seconded by Betsy Kutcher. The motion to accept the Consent Agenda was approved.

Approval of Minutes of Previous Annual Meeting:

Stephanie Beckes Hunter moved to accept the slate of candidates. The motion was seconded by Ellen Kennedy and the motion was passed without discussion.

Presentation and Adoption of the Redeemer Renaissance Bylaw Amendment:

President Nate Paukovits presented a proposal to change the Bylaws (Sections C14.03 and C14.03.02) for the purpose of bringing the administration of the Preschool and After-School programs together as one ministry. President Nate Paukovits moved to accept the proposal. Karen Miller seconded the motion. During the ensuing discussion, concerns regarding the relationship of the programs to Fairfax County Public Schools were addressed. Clarification of the role of the Council Liaison to the Redeemer Renaissance Board was requested for the charter of the governing board.

The motion was passed.

Presentation of Proposed 2023 Budget:

Rob Wenk Presented the 2023 budget for Lutheran Church of the Redeemer and made a motion to accept the budget. Florence Ofili-Toviho seconded the motion, and the motion was passed without discussion.

Presentation for Adoption of the Facility Renovation Project and Capital Campaign:

Rob Wenk presented the proposed Facility Renovation Project including:

- Outdoor improvements for drainage, safety, fencing and enhanced play area.
- The addition of a columbarium and its associated ministry.
- Renovations and enhancements to classrooms, restrooms, offices, vestry, sacristy, heating and cooling system, and the addition of solar panels.
- Funding for the project including a capital campaign.

Rob Wenk moved to adopt the project. Ron Kutcher seconded the motion.

The following items were discussed:

- Current interest and commitment to the columbarium
- Possibility of considering or eliminating individual components of the project
- Governance and use of the columbarium
- Concerns over indebtedness

Ann Lawrence moved to amend the motion to remove the columbarium from the current project proposal. The amendment motion was seconded by Tammie Koenig. Discussion of the amendment ensued which included:

- Support for the columbarium
- Objections to the columbarium
- Governance, maintenance, and use of the columbarium
- Concerns over indebtedness

Roberta Pittman called question to end the discussion. The motion to end the discussion was seconded by Alex Skotzko. The motion to end the discussion carried. Pastor Kessinger offered prayer. Ballots were distributed. When votes were counted, the motion to amend the proposal failed. (28 votes to accept the amendment; 60 votes to reject the amendment; 4 abstentions)

Lon Augustenborg called the question to end discussion on the facility renovation project and capital campaign proposal. The motion to end the discussion on the proposal was seconded Samantha Dobkins. The motion to end the discussion was carried. Pastor Kessinger offered prayer. Ballots were distributed. When the votes were counted the motion to proceed with the facility renovation project and capital campaign passed. (81 votes to accept the proposal; 9 votes to reject the proposal; 0 abstentions)

Final Comments and Prayer:

Pastor Kessinger made final comments and offered a closing prayer.

Adjournment:

President Nate Paukovits moved to adjourn the meeting. Ron Kutscher seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 2:05 PM.

But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed?

And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard?

And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him?

And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent?

How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news! – Romans 10:14-15

This passage from Romans is one that I have put to memory. It best describes how I approach my call to Redeemer and the wider church. Together we are to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ in word and deed both inside the church and out in the community. Since not everyone has heard of God in Christ or of his grace, we are to go out and shower them with love and compassion. As one seminary professor once taught us, we should need a new pair of shoes at least every year if we are doing what we have been called to do.

This proclamation of the gospel is lived out with every meaningful conversation I have with members and friends of the congregation. It is what happens when I sit in homes and offer Holy Communion to those who are unable to attend worship services. It is what I teach to those who are bringing their children to the baptismal waters or who are preparing for their First Communion. It is the presence of that good news that we talk about before couples get married. It is the gospel that we cling to when we lay our loved ones to rest. How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!

It is one reason that worship and the study of Scripture are so important to me. It is within the chapters and verses of the Bible that we learn about God and the relationship we have with God. Our Women's Prayer Group allows us the safe space to be honest and vulnerable with each other and is always open to anyone who wants to join us. The same is true for our Wednesday Bible studies that are very different from each other. In the Wednesday morning Bible study, we are looking at the different articles in the Augsburg Confession. We put them next to the teachings of Luther and the Bible passages that support his doctrines. In the Wednesday evening Bible study, we take one of the books of the Bible and meticulously go through each chapter and verse. We have discovered the joy of taking it slowly and steadily.

My studies this year took me in the direction of how to live out the gospel message. We finished the course called *Sacred Ground* which enabled us to look at the history of our country through a very realistic lens. Although I am not part of the book club that reads books on the topic of racial justice, I read many of the same books and have been able to recommend some of my own to the group. It has become an important part of my ministry to do whatever I can to speak the truth in love and to do whatever I can to move us in a direction that honors and respects all people.

Another way to live out the gospel message was to gather people for retreats. Our Lenten retreat allows us to be self-reflective as we contemplate the journey that Christ took to the cross. Our Confirmation retreat allows us to spend time with our youth to nurture their faith in God through Christ. And this year we held two council retreats. One helped us develop concrete goals for our work together and the other one helped us to understand that our role on council is a spiritual one.

One of my greatest joys of this past year is that I have made my way into the community in new ways. I remain an active participant in the Safe Community Coalition. I have also been designated as the coordinator for our McLean Clergy group. I communicate on a regular basis with 33 of our clergy of all faith traditions. We meet once every other month and email each other when needed. When the war between Israel and Hamas started, we held a prayer service to support all of our faith communities. We have plans in February of 2024 to gather the community together to help us be a positive voice in the midst of so much hatred.

Outside of the McLean clergy group, I have completed my first year on the board of Tysons Community Alliance. I am there to represent Tysons Interfaith and to keep before the board the need to address the spiritual needs of the people who live in that community. It has been a very interesting experience for me and I am grateful for this opportunity to serve in a more corporate setting.

Another joy comes from the opening of the Sunrise Senior Living facility. It is wonderful to take a break in my day and just walk over to visit people. We have about six residents who come to our worship services on a regular basis. Some are members who chose to live there so that they could be close to Redeemer. Others we acquired along the way. Pastor Josh, Joy Mentzel, and I hold monthly worship services at their facility. We have about 12-14 people who attend.

Special projects this year included the *Food for Others* food collection and packaging that was organized by our high school youth. Our summer mission trip took us to Logan County, West Virginia, and was yet another way for us to share the gospel message. We certainly learned a lot about how the message is spread through their outreach projects. We have also been working all year on a welcome statement to make it more clear to those who look at our website or any of our other announcements that we are truly open to all people.

Our staff has gone through some major changes this year. In the church office we transitioned from Andrea Meier to Amber Price to Cynthia Finocchiaro. We are grateful for the work of those who have moved on to take other positions. We are equally grateful that Cynthia is quickly learning the rhythm of our office and is up to the task. In all of these office transitions it was Judy Kuhagen who held us together. She never missed a beat in making sure the office ran smoothly as we went through our search for the right match for our needs.

We also had a transition in the Evening Host position from Jamie DeGrafft to Jonathan Marroquin. Once more we are grateful for all that Jamie did while in this position and appreciate the dedication that Jonathan is already showing. Sara Nail remains a steady presence in our office. She is not only trustworthy and very competent, but she also lives out her faith by showing patience and compassion to all of us. Bill Parks is also a steady presence. He is our handyman who can fix almost anything and does so with a smile and a good dose of humor. Linda McConnaughay and Gina Thorson also do an outstanding job for the Redeemer Renaissance program. They are dedicated and creative and both have the well-being of the children at the heart of their ministry.

And then there is Pastor Josh! He has been a wonderful presence at Redeemer. We work very well together as a team and I appreciate his compassion for others. He has an open heart and works hard to ensure that all are loved. While he was fulfilling his responsibilities with the Air Force, it gave us the opportunity to invite Bishop Kurt Kusserow from the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod and Bishop Leila Ortiz from our synod to preach and engage in conversation with our members and council. It was good for them to be with us.

We also welcomed Jessica Zurcher, a seminarian from United Lutheran Seminary. She is fulfilling her field work with us and is doing an awesome job. She is very flexible and has a wonderful pastoral presence. She preached once and also taught one of the Confirmation classes. Jessica will be on semester break until the end of January when she will return until the middle of May. We look forward to her return.

As you can see, it has been a busy year for me and for Redeemer! I am grateful for all of you and the love and support you continue to offer me as I complete twelve years of ministry here. I just got a new pair of shoes for Christmas so I look forward to full speed ahead for the coming year.

Greetings, Friends in Christ,

I give thanks for another year of service and ministry alongside each of you here at Redeemer. 2023 has proved to be another busy year, but I am learning here at Redeemer that is the status quo.

Over the past year I have spent my time walking with and ministering to God's people both here at Redeemer and in the surrounding community of McLean and the greater Washington D.C. area. Along with my call to preach the Gospel and preside at Christ's table, Pastor Sandy and I have worked together to welcome new members, baptize, and commune our youth, to teach Confirmation Class to

our confirmands, to lead the Spring evening Bible Studies, to create and lead Lenten and Advent weekly services, to work with our various committees hosting fellowship events, New Members Dinners, Spiritual Retreats, Fall Festivals, and to create a congregational welcome statement.

Reflecting specifically in my call and roll as associate pastor here at Redeemer, I have also over the past year been tasked with leading the Redeemer Youth Group in weekly events (check out the youth group report for more details), the Men's Bible Study Group in various studies, the Men's Retreat to Camp Caroline Furnace, the monthly meal group "Good Grub and God," establishing the Little Free Pantry, and working with the McLean Clergy Group in creating a seminar on interrupting hateful rhetoric.

Outside of my congregational responsibilities, I have also spent time this year continuing with my First Call Theological Education. In this training I meet regularly with other clergy in our Synod to learn and grow in our pastoral identity and ministerial skills. The culmination of our year is a weeklong retreat where we come together with all of Region 8 (Virginia, D.C., Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia) to focus specifically on our first call ministries.

Also, I continue to serve as a Reserve Chaplain with the United States Air Force. I spent my summer at my assigned duty station in Montana working with the men and women of that base. I offered counseling, worship opportunities, and unit engagement/enrichment for the airmen under my care. I truly give thanks for the congregation's support in allowing me to spend a month each year away serving in this manner.

Looking towards the future, I am excited to see where God leads Redeemer in the year ahead. Pastor Sandy and I are working hard to provide new fellowship opportunities for our members of every age and further chances to serve God's people in our community and around the world.

I give thanks to God for each of you, for our ministry together in the past year, and I pray that God would continue to guide our every step in the year to come.

Council President Report

Dear Redeemer Congregation,

The Council has had a rewarding year. We spent some time reflecting on our work at a retreat in May, discussing how to center our Redeemer work on our mission: to share Christ's love with the greatest number of people. It was a great day of discussions about Redeemer. Several themes that emerged from our work included: a continued emphasis on Bible studies and spirituality, serving our youth by increasing communication and social engagement, and ensuring good stewardship of our resources.

Council defined three Goals, or Guiding Principles, as focus areas:

- Cultivating and expanding connections with a diverse population through spirituality, fellowship, and service.
- Developing an understanding of the needs of a diverse and changing community to meaningfully share Christ's love.
- Through modeling the teachings of Jesus Christ, we promote a welcoming environment. This can be accomplished by:
 - Spiritual growth for all God's children
 - Educational opportunities
 - Relevant social outreach programs
 - Environmental stewardship

A September Spiritual retreat gave us more time for contemplation and fellowship, and we continued the discussion at a November Thanksgiving dinner with the chairs of our vital ministry teams. Those teams are a great way to get involved at Redeemer, in the ways that you feel called to serve. The contacts for each team can be found in the annual report, where you can also read more about their work over the last year and ways that they would welcome your contribution.

Many Council discussions this year provided feedback to the dedicated members of our Beyond Measure capital campaign task force. As we will discuss more at the annual meeting, 2024 will see the next phase of the Beyond Measure campaign. Even while considering how to raise funds for the next phase of major construction at Redeemer, minor projects also required attention and decisions on expenditures. We replaced a gas line outside Redeemer; we had unforeseen repairs necessary to keep Redeemer connected to the internet, and in the coming year we will replace the kitchen stove.

Council also kept abreast of the work of the Building Koinonia group as they crafted a welcome statement that highlights our open doors to all God's people and followed the progress of a new Charter to govern the work of our Redeemer Renaissance Board. Thanks to your continued faithful giving, we approved a budget that increased staff compensation and replenished our Buildings & Grounds reserves. We approved endowment grants for organizations including Alice's Kids and Nuru International and hired a new Office Manager.

A huge thank you to my fellow council members for our work together. Members over the past year were: Arash Behravesh, Chris Hernadi, Pr. Sandy Kessinger (Senior Pastor), Sheridan Kanski (Youth Representative), Megan Kratz, Lena Martikainen, Karen Miller (Vice President), Gene Morrow, Nate Paukovits, Roberta Pittman

(Secretary), Tyler Posey, Ed Regan (Treasurer), Tutu Toviho (Youth Representative), and Pr. Josh Wullenweber (Associate Pastor). I want to especially recognize our outgoing members Arash, Roberta, Tutu and Sheridan — for a job well done. Roberta has served as secretary for several of her years on Council, and her thorough and swift preparation of the minutes was amazing.

In the coming year, Council will continue to focus on our goals while considering ways to increase opportunities for congregation feedback and engagement. We are thankful for Pastor Kessinger's strong leadership and guidance, in partnership with Pastor Wullenweber, and for the faithful work of our many volunteers and ministry teams. Redeemer is blessed Beyond Measure!

2023 Annual Report Stewardship Committee

Stewardship is an important ministry of any church and one of the most challenging. It encourages us to give of our time based on our different abilities. But as we put the pandemic behind us and see more people returning to our worship services, we have also increased the activities of the church and we need your help to make things run smoothly.

As a result, we revisited the manual titled *Opportunities to Serve* that outlines all the different ways people can give of their time. Over the summer we also broke down those opportunities into categories. They were then put on small slips of paper that resided in the Crossroads for several months. We hoped this would make it easier to engage in our ministry and we are still a work in progress.

When it comes to our offerings, we monitor the overall giving and develop the quarterly letters to share with you how we are doing. We highlight all that is taking place at Redeemer as a way to emphasize that the donations you make to Redeemer help us to maintain a vibrant ministry.

This year we also had conversations around the Capital Campaign called "Beyond Measure." We are not part of the task force but we also monitor how it is unfolding as it will have an overall impact on our annual giving. It is a commitment apart from our annual budget and we are grateful for those who are pledging and/or making a contribution towards the building and grounds project.

Endowment Committee 2023 Annual Report

"Charitable Giving to Support Mission Outreach"

Redeemer's Endowment Fund was established in 1995 by the congregation to expand our mission outreach. Gifts to the Fund can be any amount, at any time and remain permanently invested. Only the earnings are dispersed to charitable organizations with at least 50 percent to be used in our metro area.

The Endowment Committee manages the fund and recommends grants subject to Church Council approval. Current members are Tammie Koenig (Chair), Dave Kostelancik (Recording Secretary), Dr. Gene Morrow (Financial Secretary & Council Liaison), Joan Durman and Mary O'Brien.

In 2023, grants totaling \$9,000 addressed disaster relief, health, hunger, and youth. Grant recipients are announced to the congregation through Tidings or Temple Talks. In 2023, there were three Temple Talks. On January 15, Second Story shared their programs for at-risk youth. On June 4, Ron Fitzsimmons of Alice's Kids explained how the organization grew from personal experience to provide small grants for shoes, clothing, or lessons to low-income children. On November 19, Billy Williams of NURU International shared how they work to eradicate extreme poverty among vulnerable rural farmers in Sub-Saharan Africa.

Finance & Administration Committee Annual Report 2023

The Finance and Admin Committee has been involved with a variety of things throughout the year. Here is a list of the more significant items:

- Moved a portion of Redeemer's cash reserves into a program at Chain Bridge Bank that locates the funds at other financial institutions to stay below the current FDIC insurance limits.
- Set-up laddered CDs throughout the calendar year to take advantage of rising interest rates.
- Engaged a local CPA firm to do a financial review of our accounting processes as called for in Redeemer's constitution.
- Reviewed and submitted to the Executive Committee the results of the CPA review noted above which found no significant concerns.
- Reviewed the monthly financial statements for the church as prepared by the Treasurer.
- Prepared a recommendation to the Council on a special one-time wage and salary increase for the staff due to the high inflation environment being experienced.
- Reviewed current insurance coverages for any needed changes.
- Provided input to the Renaissance Director on the Preschool and After-school annual budgets.
- Prepared the draft church budget and submitted it to the Council for review and discussion.

A special thanks goes to Sara Nail who as Redeemer's Financial Coordinator does a tremendous job for the church in service to the members and to the staff.

Faith Formation Annual Report

In May of 2023 we closed out another successful year of Christian Education classes and paused for the summer. September saw the return of our Faith Formation, Confirmation and High School classes for a new school year!

For Faith Formation, we offer four classes led by a wonderful team of both long-time and new mentors:

- Pre-K K Shelley Brennan and Joy Hughes
- 1st 2nd Grade Sara Egeland and Janet Pfister
- 3rd 4th Grade –Amanda Rodriguez and Sarah Getter
- 5th 6th Grade –David Muchow and Greg Adams

We have also been fortunate to have the help of Kryss Speegle, Leslie Humes, Shawna Tunnell, Doug Johnson, Claudia Wrzesinski and Annabelle Allard stepping in when substitute teachers are needed. We are also grateful to all the parents who have volunteered their time this year.

For the 2023-2024 school year, we have 54 students registered for our Pre-K – 6th Grade classes (as compared with 56 last year) with strong attendance each week across all our classrooms.

We are again using the Feasting on the Word curriculum for $3^{rd} - 6^{th}$ grade, which follows the lessons that are heard in worship each week. The Pre-K – 2^{nd} grade classes focus on a different Bible story or core message each week and incorporate more crafts and games into their curriculum.

Our younger students are starting each class with a musical opening, led by Waka Osifchin. Students have been learning both classic and contemporary Christian songs and we are very blessed to have Waka sharing her beautiful voice and time with them!

We have continued to incorporate Youth Leadership Sundays into our calendar, where youth are invited not only to attend worship with their parents but also to actively participate in the services as acolytes, readers, greeters, and ushers.

We also held a group activity this fall for all classes with Pastor Kessinger where we learned about the Feast of Saint Francis and how we are called to care for all of God's creatures. It was very well attended and made for a very lively morning! We have another group activity scheduled in January with Pastor Josh where we will come together to learn about and celebrate Epiphany.

We have incorporated service activities into our classrooms as well. This past spring, classes assisted in assembling power packs for school children in our area that go without when school is not in session. Classes also helped with labeling food bags ahead of the annual Rise Against Hunger event this past fall.

In addition to our Faith Formation classes for Pre-K – 6th graders, we also have 19 registered 7th & 8th graders in Confirmation class this year (as compared with 18 last year) which is led by Pastor Josh and Pastor Kessinger. This two-year program focuses on both biblical education and exploration of Lutheran doctrine and theology. And then we have our High School Bagels and Bibles class which is led by Kim Wenk and Christian

Richter with 12 registered students enjoying bagels and open discussions on how the Bible applies to their lives.

In closing, I would like to thank all the volunteers that come together each week to mentor our youngest members and to help them learn and grow in their faith.

We gather weekly on Sunday nights to break bread together, share in conversation around relevant faith-centered topics our youth are experiencing, and then end with games and activities around that evening's topic. We have come a long way sense the pandemic and regularly have eight to ten youth in attendance.

Not all our time is spent here at Redeemer, however. Monthly we enter the community to either serve our neighbors or participate in fun group activities. Over the past year for fun, we have taken the youth ice skating, bowling, and scaling the trees on a high ropes course. Then, in service to Redeemer and our community, we have spent time with our neighbors at Sunrise, rejuvenated the Butterfly Garden near the playgrounds on our church campus, and created Warming Bag with blankets, socks, hats, and gloves for our neighbors in need. Enrollment for the Redeemer Renaissance program is increasing, with tours scheduled weekly.

- The Preschool maintains a waitlist to fill spaces if one becomes available and expects robust numbers of registrants for the 2024-25 school year.
- The Preschool currently has a waitlist of six children and the After-School program currently has a waitlist of eighteen children interested in registering for the 2024-25 school year.
- Preschool and After-School are proven pillars of the local community, and the financial health is strong. In 2023, eight scholarships were awarded to children attending preschool, after-school, and camp.

- In-house referrals have provided families with continuity of education and care for their children, as new families join us, or students move from preschool to the after-school program.
- Currently, there are sixty-seven Preschool and sixty-four After-School students enrolled for the 2023-24 school year. For camps enrollment, please see below.
- Staff for the year's programming included five teachers, twenty-seven support staff, eight contractors, one Office Administrator, ten substitutes, one Preschool Director and one Executive Director. We are grateful for each of them as they inspire our quality educational environment in a Christian setting.

After-School and Preschool formal year-round program offerings include:

- Good Beginnings for Toddlers and Caregivers Offered bi-weekly throughout the school year (9:30 AM 10:30 AM).
- 2.5 5-year-old Classes Offered as part-time, full-time, morning only (8:30 AM 12 PM), and all-day options (8:30 AM 3 PM).
- Child's Afternoon Out − 2's discovered with invitations to create art and play (12 PM − 3 PM).
- Learning Lab 3's and 4's explored with STEM activities and nature projects. (12 PM- 3 PM)
- K-6th After-School Daily programming included STEAM, sports, tutoring, music lessons, enrichment classes, and community building projects. Transportation provided from Churchill Road, Franklin Sherman, Haycock, and Kent Gardens elementary schools (2:30 PM 6:15 PM).
- K-6th Teacher Workday Special Camps Children from local elementary schools attended these 7 days
 of camps to engage in Reverse Engineering, 3D Art, Laser Tag, Lego Rally, workshops, and
 performances by professionals and more. (8 AM 6:15 PM).
- Preschool and K-6th Camps Over 230 children from local schools joined in summer, winter, and spring camp fun, making friends through games, art, science, workshops, water day, movie day, silly Olympics, Laser Tag, animals, and performances. Every day of camp is unique! (8:30 AM 6:00 PM).

The After-School and Preschool Boards met jointly and have been instrumental in providing feedback regarding programming, planning, and budget suggestions for consideration. Following the adoption in February 2022 of changes to the RLC Bylaws to RLC Congregation Council for the purpose of officially bringing the administration of the preschool and after-school programs together as one, three members volunteered to participate in weekly work sessions to write a Redeemer Renaissance Board Charter for governance of the program. The charter will be submitted to RLC Council for approval.

We invite you or someone you know to INSPIRE and join us in 2024! A significant part of our success in engaging with church and local families is due to our placing value on our community, observed through outreach and active involvement. We are proud to say that children who attended our programs regularly partner with us for service-learning opportunities, come work with us, and lead children in our programs they find value in and used to attend! Three prior program attendees, now in H.S. and M.S. volunteer weekly as assistants to the staff. Volunteers are INSPIRED, and their experiences serve them and our community well. Members of our staff, including teachers, teaching assistants, substitutes, music teachers, and tutors are often former parents of children who attended the program, or knew someone who worked with or attended the program. Recently, a few have been students who attended the program once upon a time. Parents, church members, friends, family, and community members honor the children and our ministries by volunteering their time and resources. For each of them, we give thanks!

- We are a praying community.
 - Quarterly days of prayer were placed on the calendar where members could sign up to pray

Tysons Interfaith

Tysons Interfaith

Redeemer is a founding member of <u>Tysons Interfaith</u> (TI) and continues to play an active leadership role in the organization. Founded in 2013, Tysons Interfaith is a collection of eighteen faith communities from the Tysons area that seeks to promote spirituality and build interfaith cooperation. TI is a member of the <u>Tysons</u> <u>Community Alliance</u> and is represented on its Board of Directors by Pastor Kessinger.

During 2023, Tysons Interfaith continued the "Oneness of Humanity" on-line conversations. Topics covered included: a workshop for communities of faith on the challenges faced in rebuilding and reconnecting post pandemic; a briefing by the Interfaith Council of Washington on its religious and cultural literacy workshops; and a presentation by Reverend Trish Hall on learning and applying interpersonal communications skills to bridge gaps and build peace in families and communities.

In April 2023, Tysons Interfaith members participated in Interfaith Iftars held in northern Virginia and sponsored an interfaith trash cleanup at Raglan Road Park, an area known as "Tysons' Last Forest." In June, the group gathered representatives of the Sikh, Bahai, Zoroastrian, Jewish, and Christian faiths for a public informal dialogue at the Tysons Center Mall Plaza. In the fall, TI partnered with the Fairfax County Police Department to hold a "Faith and Blue" food drive at the Tysons Community Alliance Fall Mixed Market over six consecutive Wednesdays at the Boro in Tysons. Collected food and personal care items were given to SHARE and Second Story.

Tysons Interfaith uses its <u>website</u> and other communications platforms to promote spirituality and faith education, as well as to foster a sense of community and mutual respect among faith communities and neighbors in the Tysons region. We look forward to continuing this important work in the new year.

Building & Grounds Committee Annual Report 2023

The Building & Grounds group has been involved with a variety of projects throughout the year. Here is a partial list of the more significant items completed:

- Maintenance of the church grounds was completed by the committee volunteers through weeding, mulching, pruning, trimming, and watering. As a result, there were significant operational cost savings to the church.
- Installed new plywood, venting, and shingles over the gym to resolve ongoing roof leak issues.
- Replaced an underground 4" pipe that failed inspection as part of our fire sprinkler system.
- Upgraded our file server to address security, software support and performance issues.
- Replaced the sound system console in the nave that had started to develop intermittent problems.
- Determined that a replacement of the kitchen stove is needed to meet county fire standards.
- Repainted lines in both parking lots using in-house equipment and supplies.
- Installed a storm water conservation landscape bed as a cost-sharing project with the county.
- Gained agreement from the owners of the office park next door for them to modify the way their storm water flows to reduce its impact to the church's grounds.

Building & Grounds Master Plan

We have continued to develop the details of our building and site plans with the architects, MEP engineers, civil engineers, arborists, and landscape architects. Our preliminary site plans have been submitted to the County to determine if we fall under our current existing Special Use Zoning Permit. There have been several rounds of questions and answers to provide clarifications to the County for this determination. This process has taken significantly longer than expected. In addition, detailed construction drawings are being finalized for the classrooms, offices and other interior spaces in order that they may be submitted to the County for review and permitting. Detailed work on the plans for columbarium will begin once the zoning approval is received.

A special thanks to Gretchen Stark, Pete Poulos, Steve Koenig, Joyce Clarke, John Teitman, Barbara Perlowski, Susan Posey, Alice Lockard and Tyler Posey who have volunteered many hours over the year to help care for the grounds and for the Memorial Garden. TableTalk is a small-group ministry at Redeemer in which participants explore questions of faith, build relationships, and deepen commitments to discipleship. As we gather around the table for Holy Communion as one body in Christ, we also gather around the table as one people for study, talk, and fellowship. We believe it is important for those who are part of the Body of Christ to have a forum for the in-depth study of Christianity and to be able to use those studies as a way of connecting Christian faith with a post-Christian, primarily secular world. As Christians have done throughout the history of the church, and in accord with our Lutheran heritage, we believe that one of the best places for seeking understanding of the Christian faith is communal discussion with our brothers and sisters in Christ. Accordingly, we meet every week throughout the year for study, talk, and fellowship.

Modern Understandings of Religion & God: The Christian Tradition

During 2023, we continued our series on *God: The Christian Tradition*. We began the year studying how God is portrayed in the Eastern Orthodox tradition. We then studied how Christian understandings of God are enculturated in different contexts. We explored 20th century European theology, process theology, Native American theology, Black theology, Hispanic theology, Asian-American theology, open theism, African theology, liberation theology, and Asian theology. In 2024 we will be discussing world religions and the Christian response to religious pluralism.

Gathering as a Hybrid Ministry

TableTalk is a *fully-hybrid ministry* of the church, meeting in-person and via Zoom. We offer a simultaneous live-stream to off-site attendees so that on each Sunday morning we have a mix of in-person and Zoom participants.

REDEEMER GREETERS

The Greeter Team at Redeemer is an ongoing program to help our worship community fulfill its overall mission "To Share Christ's Love with the Greatest Number of People."

Redeemer Greeters strive to foster ever greater hospitality and "front-door" welcome at worship services and many special events at the church, something we hope continued to be noticed by our church family and guests during the past year. A growing number of Redeemer congregants – now reaching nearly 100 in service since this initiative was launched about 10 years ago – have participated in such "greeting" activities at one time or another, contributing their time and enthusiasm to welcome guests and church members alike to our church community. During the past year our Redeemer greeters, in addition to greeting at regular Sunday worship services, have provided Crossroads/narthex and side-entrance welcome at various memorial and funeral services, as well as for Wednesday evening Lenten Dinner and services, Easter Week worship services, the Living Nativity/Christmas Concert night in December, and Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and "Lessons & Carols" services at year's end. Members of the Greeter Team also managed a "Welcome Table" at the Church parking lot for McLean Day shuttle bus users. The roster of greeters has been significantly enhanced during 2023 by participation of Redeemer youth joining adult greeters as part of their expanded service to the Redeemer worship community on certain Sundays of the church season.

Looking forward for 2024, we anticipate continuation (and hopefully broadening) of the Redeemer welcoming presence for the many greeting occasions -- for regular and special church worship services plus special community events at Redeemer -- in addition to re-establishing the "Front-Door" greeting at Redeemer Faith Formation venue and generally expanding the overall pool of greeters, that to include Redeemer youth.

In the course of enriching the "greeting" atmosphere at Redeemer, the Greeter Team whenever possible avoids relying on rigid scheduling for church member greeting, and arranges to fill needed Greeter spots on a week-to-week basis. The intention is to make welcoming gestures a commonplace practice among congregants in general when attending a worship service or other event at Redeemer. Advance-scheduled assignments are used only for special services or events when specific planning is required to assure sufficient greeting presence for the occasion ... for example, for Easter Sunday and Christmas Eve services, Living Nativity/Christmas Concert night, and McLean Day.

As leaders of the Redeemer Greeting Team, we offer a big "Thank You" to all our team members for their contribution to providing a warm welcome for congregation members and guests arriving at church entryway doors. We as well are keen to welcome more in our worship community to serve as greeters in this new year.
