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A Message from Pastor Sharon Core August 2025

In-between Times

Siblings in Christ,

With this inaugural piece for *Tidings*, I send you grace and peace from Cleveland, OH. I am concluding my service of 8 ½ years with Presbyterians in NE Ohio. And I am looking forward to service with Lutherans in McLean, VA!

As I prepare to join you all on August 19, I find myself in an in-between time. I am winding up my work, packing my house, taking lots of bags to Goodwill, filling out change of address forms, and saying goodbye to friends. Boxes are packed, movers have been scheduled, and our real estate agent is confirming house showings. And I'm standing in the midst of all of it—marveling at what has already been done, taking note of what still needs to be accomplished, and wondering what will next present itself that hasn't made it to my "to-do" list. Nothing is quite finished and nothing is quite ready to begin. I'm in-between.

My sense is you all may be experiencing some in-between as well. You have recently said goodbye to a beloved long term pastor, you've remembered well, have shed some tears, and walk by an office that is devoid of personality. Minutes: July 14, 2025, Meeting of Congregation Council RLC Conference Room and via Zoom

Call to order. Karen Miller called the meeting to order at 7:31

Opening Devotions. Pastor John Teitman led opening devotions with a reading from Numbers and an opening prayer.

Approval of Minutes. Minutes from the meeting were previously approved by email.

Adoption of Agenda. The agenda, as emailed in advance of the meeting, was approved by the Council.

<u>Senior Pastor Report.</u> PSK submitted her final June report via email in advance of the meeting. In her written report, PSK thanked the congregation for the warm celebration in June and offered her prayerful best wishes as she begins her retirement.

<u>Discussion Item: Recommended Mortgage Provider.</u> Rob Wenk summarized to Council the financing options from two separate lenders, Chain Bridge Bank and the ELCA Mission Investment Fund, for the Congregation-approved loan of \$1.6 million for the capital building and grounds project. After guiding Council through the details, Rob recommended to Council the ELCA Mission Investment's 25-year Amortization ARM option. He further noted that ELCA Mission Investment guidelines would require full congregation approval of the loan terms, preferably obtained by September, to proceed.

Sarah Getter made the motion to take on the ELCA Mission Investment's 25-year Amortization ARM option as detailed in Rob Wenk's Mortgage Summary. Sabine Detweiller seconded the motion. Council discussed plans for presenting the mortgage details to the Congregation for approval and considered the feasibility in the long term of refinancing the loan and the congregation's ability to pay off the mortgage early. After discussion, the motion was approved unanimously by Council.

<u>Approval Item: HVAC Repair Price Increase.</u> Rob Wenk reported to Council that the lowest bid for the roof-top HVAC repair exceeded the amount approved in the June 2025 meeting. Rob requested that Council increase the authorized amount to \$24,000, which is still within the amount in maintenance reserves.

Karen Miller made the motion to increase the authorized amount for the rooftop HVAC repair to \$24,000. Megan Kratz seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously by Council.

Executive Committee Summary. The Executive Committee met on July 2 and talked about the arrival of Interim Pastor Sharon Core and the other items on tonight's agenda.

<u>Treasurer's Report.</u> Treasurer Steve Bott presented the 2025 Financial Summary through June 30, which was also made available via email prior to the meeting. Expenses exceeded receipts by \$58,607, due primarily to a dip in congregational giving. It was noted that while a dip in giving during the summer is not unprecedented, the current shortfall had started sooner than it had in prior years. Council discussed the impact of economic uncertainty in the region and considered how summer shortfalls from previous years had been resolved by the end of the year.

<u>Discussion Item: PSK Retirement Summary.</u> Karen Miller offered a recap of the retirement celebration of PSK on June 21.The final cost of the event came in under budget, and Karen expressed her thanks to Kim Wenk for her fiscal responsibility in organizing the event and to families who worked with local providers to secure discounts on catering items.

<u>Approval Item: Housing Allowance for Interim Pastor Core.</u> As is customary for Pastors and Interim Pastors under contract with Redeemer, Council is required to specify the portion of salary which shall constitute a housing allowance and to which the recipient can refer for his or her own internal accounting and tax purposes. Karen Miller reported that Interim Pastor Core requested that Council approve 48% of her salary as housing allowance.

Karen Miller made the motion to specify the housing allowance at 48% of Pastor Core's salary. Sarah Getter seconded the motion. After discussion and clarification, the motion was approved unanimously by Council.

<u>Discussion Item: Preparing for Pastor Core's Arrival.</u> Karen Miller requested help from Council to prepare an orientation plan for Pastor Core for her arrival on August 19. Plans are already underway to introduce Pastor Core to individuals outside Council who can familiarize her with ministries and administrative activities. Council members offered to assist Karen in putting together an orientation packet.

<u>Discussion Item: Council dinner with Pastor Core in August.</u> Council agreed to hold a dinner with Pastor Core and her husband on Tuesday, August 26.

<u>Ministry Reports: Christian Education:</u> Annabelle Allard noted the announcement in yesterday's bulletin to call for a volunteer parent coordinator of Faith Formation. Grace Howie is on track to complete the administrative details of the Faith Formation program prior to the start in September.

<u>Ministry Report. Stewardship.</u> Karen Miller reported that the Stewardship team has completed a draft letter which is being reviewed and will be sent out soon.

New Business: Item discussed in Executive Session.

Construction Project Updates from July

The Council has selected the ELCA's Mission Investment Fund to provide the new mortgage for the completion of our upcoming construction project. The Mission Investment Fund is a part of our national church organization (ELCA), and they make loans to new and existing congregations for new buildings, renovations, and expansions. Their rates are very competitive with other lenders and banks. Plus, our monthly mortgage payments and investment would help fund future loans to other congregations. There will be opportunities for questions and discussion on the new mortgage following upcoming worship services, and those dates and times will be announced in the weekly bulletin.

In order to complete our construction project, we are planning to have a new mortgage of \$1.6M. Members have asked how that compares to what Redeemer has done in the past. Prior to when Pastor Kessinger was called to Redeemer, we had two mortgages totaling \$2.3M. The monthly principal and interest payments were approximately \$15K per month. We paid off the first mortgage 7 years early leaving a \$10K monthly mortgage payment remaining, which was then paid off 6 years early. Therefore, we have handled larger obligations in the past and have paid them off ahead of schedule.

With construction starting in the education wing on August 18th, we will have to move all items out of those areas. Some of the walls and ceilings in those rooms will be rebuilt. If your ministry team has things stored in those areas, please consider storing those items off site during the construction. We will have an on-site storage unit in the parking lot for some things, but obviously that will not be a good storage environment for all items. Things that the church no longer needs will either be sold, donated, or salvaged, in order to free up space for items that the church really needs to keep on hand going forward.

At a Scout Court of Honor ceremony in June, Pastor Kessinger was honored for all of her support for scouting at Redeemer over the years. The Scouts and their families presented her with a generous check in tribute to her and to be applied to the upcoming construction project. The girls and the boys scouting troops and their parents appreciate all of Redeemer's ongoing support.

Message from our Prayer Partnership Pastor Zhanibek Batenov at Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Mary in Ulyanovsk, Russia

I'm going to tell you a little about how things are with us.

In December a man, an ethnic Tatar, passed by our church. I invited him to our free organ concert. He was at the concert in the church. At the end of the concert I told him that on every Thursday we have an evening service accompanied by the organ. He wanted to be baptized and took a course in the Christian faith. We prepared for several months and in June he was baptized. I am very inspired when people who are traditionally Muslims are baptized in my congregation and find faith in Jesus Christ. At that moment I understand that my mission is not in vain.

I also hope that on July 6th there will be confirmation of a man and a woman who were baptized as children in the Orthodox Church, but wanted to become Lutherans and completed the course of the study. Their names are Margarita and Andrey. In addition to them seven more are preparing for confirmation, but have not yet completed the entire course. I get great pleasure when I conduct services, preach and teach classes on the Christian faith. It is these classes that are the most joyful for me.

In addition the following is planned for July. From July 7 to 11 we will have a canoe trip, there will be about 15 participants. We will be canoeing along the Volga in the daytime and spending the nights in tents on islands in the middle of the river. There will also be prayers, Bible studies, communication, and cooking together.

From July 14 to August 7 I, my wife and my children will be in Kazakhstan to visit some of our relatives. I also hope to see Bishop Rostislav Novgorodov of the Lutheran Church of Kazakhstan, we have agreed on a meeting.

I hope that God will allow these plans to come true.

I wish you God's blessings and congratulations once again!

Faith Formation Mentors Needed



Little Food Pantry - Summer Update

Thank you to everyone who has been placing food items in Redeemer's "Little Pantry" and collection bin in the Crossroads. Now that it is summer the LFP has some new challenges:

- First, children who are in need of food are not in school where they receive free breakfast and lunch. There is a greater need for kid-friendly lunch and breakfast foods.
- Second, the temperature outside is HOT. Fortunately, the food in the LFP is rarely there for more than 24 hours. Canned food can withstand the heat. So until further notice, we will not put out any food in plastic containers, except water and peanut butter.



- 1. DONATE FOOD single serve, non-perishable, nutritious, ready-to-eat items are needed--no glass. No plastic fruit cups.
- 2. DAILY MAINTENANCE Since the pantry holds a limited amount of items, and is used daily, it needs to be stocked and tidied up a few times a week. Would you be willing to stop by once a week to check that it is stocked? No donation is necessary to do this; we will have donations in reserve to stock the pantry. Quilting Group

We hope you enjoyed seeing all of our creative quilts in April and May when they were blessed. As you can see, we've been busy! Obviously, we love our mission.

The Quilting Group meets on the first and third Wednesdays of each month from 9:00-11:30 am in Fellowship Hall. We are a small group of five ladies on a mission to share our love of sewing. We continue to support Partner for Surgery in Guatemala along with Project Linus (which we started supporting in 2024). Our quilts are various sizes based upon Project Linus guidelines: minimum sizes: 36" x 36" for baby blankets, 42" x 60" for children's blankets, and 45" x 72" for teen blankets, in addition to fleece blankets.

Project Linus supports local Fairfax County organizations such as Ronald McDonald House, Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (TAPS), kids who have lost a military service parent, local emergency situations and national emergency situations when a call for assistance is received, and INOVA Hospital, to name a few.

Partner for Surgery, Guatemala provides medical and surgical care in rural Guatemala, helping impoverished Guatemalan children and families living in remote locations. Our quilts are hand delivered by Frank Petersen. Additionally, we provide handmade tote bags and bears for the children.

Additionally, this year, we "teamed" up with the Prayer Shawl Group to make fleece blankets for Project Linus. The Quilting Group purchased the fleece, rotary skip blade and prepped the fleece for the crocheters to put an edge on. Additionally, any leftover fleece from the blankets was made into scarves to support the Prayer Shawl's scarf drive later this year. The Quilting Group will deliver both quilts and blankets made by Prayer Shawl to the Project Linus drop off location.

Our group is always looking for assistance, and we welcome new sewers into our small group. If you are unable to attend in person, we can provide you with supplies to design a quilt or even a bundled set (quilt top, batting, backing fabric, and yarn) to make at your leisure at home. Other ways to help include monetary donations; fabric, thread, and other sewing/quilting items are welcome. When donating money, please designate it for the "Quilting Group." Monetary donations will go toward the purchase of much-needed batting, fabric, thread, and any other supplies as needed.
