## A Message from Pastor Sharon Core

## Rhythm December 2025

The hardest thing about serving as a mid-council leader in the Presbyterian Church was that I could never figure out the liturgical rhythm of the work. While we had Presbytery-wide organizational meetings during the year (6 of them!), that was not the rhythm I was longing for. I had been a parish minister far too long not to desire some deeper theological/liturgical rhythm.

The ebb and flow of the Christian year makes sense to me and helps me make sense of the larger world. And with Advent 1 on November 30, we begin a new year recognizing that this time of anticipation, waiting, and expectancy is what we need (it may not be what we want!) as we prepare for the news the shepherds receive from the angels.

It's a curious season—because aren't we really just getting ready for the baby to be born? Again? Yes and no. Yes, in that the scriptures for each Sunday in Advent pull back the curtain bit by bit to reveal the manger scene. The reality for those who received the first birth announcement is that this was something new and unexpected. They had no idea how it would unfold, what this newly-born child would mean for the world. Perhaps they were so overcome with the angelic host that they couldn't even begin to wonder what would come next. For us, we hear the story year after year and because we do know what comes next, we may become a little jaded—oh, it's a beautiful story all right, and have we lost sight of the WOW factor? Because this is about as WOW as you can get—second only perhaps to a guy being raised from the dead.

And no, in that as we revisit the manger and the angels and the shepherds, we are challenged to consider the reality and importance of the incarnation. What is the "so what" for you as you ponder "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us"? What difference does it make in your day to day living long after the candles have been lit, the nativities packed away and the lights untangled that "for unto you a child is born"? How does the rhythm of this season impact the rhythm of your daily life?

Every community has a different rhythm to this season. Our rhythm at Redeemer includes gathering each Sunday for worship. We will hear from the prophets and from Matthew. We will light candles. We will sing all the anticipatory hymns.

There will also be three other services I hope you will attend—December 3, 10, and 17—all beginning with dinner at 6:00 p.m. and service at 7:00 p.m. On the 3rd and 10th, we'll gather for vesper services. These will be quiet contemplative times. On December 17, we'll gather for Blue Christmas, a reminder that this is not the most wonderful time of the year for everyone.

Whatever the rhythm for your personal life, I look forward to sharing with you in the Redeemer Advent rhythm. May the anticipation, waiting, and expectancy be exactly what we need.

## Minutes: November 10, 2025, Meeting of Congregation Council RLC Library and via Zoom

<u>Call to order.</u> Karen Miller called the meeting to order at 7:33.

<u>Opening Devotions.</u> Pastor Core led opening devotions with a question posed via email in advance of the meeting: How is it we have come to include participation in a faith community as a way to spend our time and energy?

Pastor Core opened the discussion by explaining that she finds it important to engage in conversation with the leaders of local congregations and to get a sense of what draws them to being an active participant in a faith community. Members of Council spoke about what draws them personally to participate in church life. Pastor Core wrapped up the discussion by reminding Council that these considerations are important to keep in mind as the church begins the work of determining whom to call as the next pastor.

**Approval of Minutes.** Minutes from the meeting were previously approved by email.

<u>Adoption of Agenda.</u> The agenda, as emailed in advance of the meeting, was approved by the Council.

**Discussion and Approval Item:** Redeemer Renaissance Budgets

Linda McConnaughay presented and explained details about both the preschool and after-school budgets.

Preschool had a small deficit last year. For the proposed budget for 2026/27, headcount was not adjusted down. There is no tuition increase in the proposed budget 2026/27.

The after-school program is seeing large demand. Kids are bused from four local FCPS schools in the area. The 2024/25 school year showed a substantial surplus, and this trend is expected to continue. The proposed budget 2026/27 shows a small increase in tuition.

A deficit in the preschool program can be balanced by a surplus in the after-school program, if necessary, even if budgets are prepared separately.

There was discussion of plans to create a new financial construct that would allow for a roll-up report of both budgets for easier reference of how the Redeemer Renaissance program is doing overall. This will require substantial work, so the goal would be to start showing those figures beginning next fiscal year if the plan is pursued.

Rob Wenk pointed out that since Linda took over the combined programs four years ago it has been more customeroriented resulting in healthy financials for Redeemer Renaissance overall. He praised Linda for this achievement. Sarah Getter made a motion to approve the budget; Sabine Detweiler seconded the motion. There was no further discussion and the motion passed unanimously.

## <u>Discussion Item: Redeemer Renaissance Board Meeting Summary.</u>

Sarah Getter reported that the Redeemer Renaissance Board meeting took place on October 27. As in the previous discussion (above) led by Linda, the Board focused on the issues raised in connection with the budget.

The next Redeemer Renaissance Board meeting will take place in January. At that time, necessary changes to the Charter will be discussed.

**Executive Committee Summary.** The Executive Committee met on November 5 and talked about the items on tonight's agenda, in particular the budget and transition team work.

<u>Treasurer's Report.</u> Treasurer Steve Bott presented the 2025 Financial Summary through October 31. As in previous months, the financials show that expenses exceeded receipts. Including the October numbers, the shortfall amounts to \$95,000. Steve compared the financials for the last 10 years and found that between 24% and 30% of the year's contributions had been made in last two months of the year. Therefore, it is not unreasonable to believe that this year's November and December contributions will make up for the current deficit.

Council agreed that Steve, in conjunction with the Stewardship Ministry, will prepare a message for the announcements on Sunday, November 23 asking for contributions considering the current shortfall. In December, Stewardship Ministry may send a letter to all members with the request to prayerfully consider contributing to close the gap before year-end.

## <u>Discussion and Approval Item: Budget Process-Synod Contribution.</u>

Karen Miller reported that every year, Redeemer makes a contribution to the Synod to support the Synod's work and ministries. Over the years, the contributions have increased slightly every year. Last year, the contribution amounted to \$74,000, a \$2000 increase over the previous year.

Council discussed what contribution amount would be appropriate. An increase of 2.7 % would amount to a contribution of \$76,000. It was agreed that it would be helpful to have a better idea of how the Synod uses the money it receives. Karen will look into obtaining more information for future decisions.

Tyler Posey made a motion to budget a synod contribution of \$76,000. Annabelle Allard seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

## <u>Discussion Item: Budget Process – Committee Budget and 2026 Pledge Requests.</u>

Rob Wenk and Steve Bott are currently working on compiling the budget for the coming fiscal year. Council will have the opportunity to review and discuss the budget in the January Council meeting.

Council discussed Redeemer's culture in connection with pledge requests and what can be done to encourage members to submit pledges. In the past, Stewardship Ministry has requested that members submit pledge forms in January for the year ahead, but few members responded and there was little follow-up to encourage greater participation.

It appears that other church communities are more rigorous in pursuing the submission of pledges. Council agreed that it would be helpful to have more clarity on contributions over the course of the year for budgeting purposes, especially with the current shortfall in contributions and because Redeemer will have the additional commitment of mortgage payments in connection with the construction project starting early 2026. The timing of pledge requests was also raised. It would make sense to send out pledge requests in the fall, so the information is available for the budget.

Tyler Posey will take the discussion – more pledge commitments, change in timing - to the Stewardship Ministry.

## <u>Discussion Item: Transition Team Nomination form and Outreach to Potential Participants.</u>

Karen Miller gave Council an update on transition team nominations. The Transition Team Nomination form was published. Communication and a link to the form were included in the weekly announcements/bulletin, and printed forms are available in the Crossroads.

Karen Miller and Sabine Detweiler will do a short Temple talk at the services this coming Sunday to raise awareness.

## <u>Discussion and Approval Item: Bishop Hirsch Visit February 15 – Donation to Bishop Discretionary Fund.</u>

Karen Miller informed Council that Bishop Hirsch will visit Redeemer and preach at the services on February 15, 2026. Bishop Hirsch does not expect payment for his involvement. Congregations that would like to provide a gift to the Bishop Discretionary fund are welcome to do so.

Karen Miller made a motion to donate \$250 to the Bishop Discretionary Fund. Tyler Posey seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

## <u>Discussion Item: Constitutional Updates.</u>

Karen Miller reported on upcoming updates to Redeemer's Constitution. In August 2025, an ELCA Churchwide Assembly took place in which changes to the model constitution for congregations were made. Redeemer is required to incorporate these changes into its Constitution. They will be presented to the congregation in the next congregational meeting in February 2026.

Council will take this opportunity to address several other (optional) constitutional changes, where the language of the Constitution has not been clear on certain processes or timing.

Karen will solicit team membership to discuss and incorporate the required and proposed changes. An updated draft of the Constitution will be sent to the congregation for review ahead of the February congregational meeting.

## **Discussion Item: Youth Representative for 2026**

A Youth Representative to serve on Council is needed for next year when Victoria Johnson's term comes to an end. Karen Miller will reach out to Kim Wenk for suggestions.

## <u>Discussion Item: Rise Against Hunger Summary.</u>

The Rise Against Hunger meal packaging event at Redeemer on Saturday, November 8 was a great success. 213,000 meals were packaged.

Thank you to Roberta, Rob and Kim Wenk as well as Mike and Kate Forrer, who worked tirelessly before, during and after the event to make it all run smoothly.

## <u>Discussion Item: Supply Scheduling during Pastor Core's Scheduled Leave.</u>

Karen Miller reported that during Pastor Core's vacation (January 25 – February 13, 2026) Pastor John Teitman and Pastor Amy Feira will be available as supply pastors and that all dates are covered.

## Ministry Reports: Various

- •Personnel Committee: Pastor Core reported on behalf of the Personnel Committee that the committee met to review the job descriptions for several members of staff. The job descriptions were adjusted to align with the reality of the staff's workload and the work they actually perform. The new job descriptions will be discussed with the relevant members of the staff and in one case in connection with their performance review.
- •Youth Activities Planning: Youth Representative Victoria Johnson briefed Council on youth activities. Victoria and Grace Howie represented Redeemer at the Youth Synod meeting that recently took place. Other upcoming youth activities include the Youth Synod Retreat in November and Youth Earth Day in April 2026. Victoria discussed how the church might recruit more kids to serve on the Youth Leadership team. She will talk to kids who participate in the High School "Bagels & Bible" Class on Sunday mornings.

**New Business:** None

<u>Prior E-mail Discussion and Approval Item: Endowment Grant for Rise Against Hunger.</u> On October 19, Karen Miller emailed the Council the motion made by Gene Morrow of the Endowment Committee to approve a \$2,000 grant to Rise Against Hunger, supporting this year's food packaging event on November 8, 2025.

The motion was approved unanimously by Council via email.

## **Construction Project Updates from November**

The recent construction activity in the education wing includes: interior painting, exterior painting, rooftop HVAC unit start-up, closet lights added, new ceiling tiles installed, replacement door frames installed, AC unit window glass replaced, conference room dry wall hung, and new desks for the office staff ordered. We are on schedule for county inspections in early December, which are needed for an occupancy permit and turnover.

When construction finishes in the education wing, the office wing will then be closed and the pastor and the staff will be moved into the renovated classrooms as their temporary work locations. Once the office wing construction is finished, the staff will then move back into their renovated offices. This second phase of construction will also include the renovation of the bathrooms and hallways by the office entrance. Signs will be posted to direct people through the location changes.

In the renovated and improved rooms in the education wing, we will have new cabinet and drawer storage spaces. If your ministry team needs additional storage at the church, please send an email to <a href="mailto:church@redeemermclean.org">church@redeemermclean.org</a> and describe what kind of space your ministry is looking for. We will evaluate all the requests that are received and will try to allocate the new space in the fairest way possible. While some space will be available late December, other spaces will become available in the spring.

Redeemer's Capital Campaign for our building renovation and construction of a columbarium and improved playground areas has received 49% (\$1.56M) of the pledges needed towards our goal of \$3.2M. Plus, an additional 7% (\$232K) has been given directly and outside of the pledge process. Making a gift toward the campaign is a great opportunity to honor someone important to you and your family or to just give thanks for all the blessings in your life. Of course, all financial gifts are gratefully received and appreciated, with or without a pledge.

As you think about how you can support Redeemer's renovation and improvement plans, please consider one of the tax-advantaged giving options. The giving of appreciated stocks or mutual funds will help minimize your capital gain taxes. Also, the giving of an IRA's required minimum distributions (RMDs) can also lower your taxable income.
