Pastor Sharon Core**

**Journey
February 2026**

By the time you read this (on or around February 1), Nick and I will be in Wellington, NZ (the date may be the same—jump forward 18 hours—so maybe the next day!). We have friends who live in Wellington—they'll be there until September and so, when you have friends in a place you've always wanted to visit, you plan a visit! However, we did not plan for snow and at the time I am typing this (January 21), we are changing a Sunday flight out of Dulles to a Saturday flight out of Dulles! Future Sharon of February 1 (or thereabouts) will be marveling at our journey thus far.

I am sure I will have many stories to tell about our journey down under. There will be more pictures than any one person should endure! I look forward to sharing some of them with you. And I look forward to continuing with you along the interim journey. The God we meet and follow as we make the Lenten journey is the one who gives us strength and direction for all the other journeys we make.

**Minutes: January 12, 2026, Meeting of Congregation Council
RLC Conference Room and via Zoom**

Call to order. Karen Miller called the meeting to order at 7:35

Opening Devotions. Pastor Core led opening devotions with a reflection of “Togetherness”, which was her Star Word from the Epiphany service, along with a reading of a portion of Peter’s sermon after Pentecost from Acts. Pastor Core ended with prayer.

Approval of Minutes. Minutes from the meeting were previously approved by email.

Adoption of Agenda. The agenda, as emailed in advance of the meeting, was approved by the Council.

Executive Committee Summary. The Executive Committee met on January 7 and talked about the items on tonight’s agenda.

General Updates from Pastor Core. Pastor Core highlighted her discussions with individual members and the efforts of the Stewardship Committee. She also affirmed her availability and accessibility to visit and provide pastoral care to those who are ill or unable to attend services. She encourages everyone to approach her with such needs as they are comfortable.

Treasurer’s Report. Treasurer Steve Bott presented the 2025 Financial Summary through December 31, which was made available via email prior to the meeting. Redeemer ended the year with a surplus of \$10,000, thanks to generous contributions that came in the month of December. Giving for the year was significantly down from previous years, however, and we leaned heavily on increased facility usage to offset under-budget contributions.

Discussion Item: Pledge Plans for 2026. Pastor Core shared that Sunday, January 18, will be dedicated as the day when congregants share their intentions for church offering. She invited discussion on how pledges could be collected during the services.

Discussion Item: Nominating Committee for Council and Endowment. Sarah Getter and Lena Martikainen are stepping down from Council in January, and their replacements, along with the candidacies of the renewing Council members, will need to be approved by the Congregation at the Annual Meeting. Karen Miller noted that Nate Paukovits and Ellen Kennedy will join the nominating committee to identify candidates. Karen asked Council to get back to her with suggestions for candidates for the two open positions.

The Endowment Committee has several possible candidates for the one open position. The position will also need to be approved by the Congregation at the Annual Meeting.

Discussion Item: Annual Meeting. The Annual meeting is scheduled for February 22. Agenda items will include a presentation of ministry reports, discussion and approval of the budget and constitution amendments, election of candidates for the open and renewing positions on Council and on the Endowment Committee, and an update on progress and path forward for the construction project. Bios of the candidates for the open positions on Council and Endowment and of the candidates for the renewing Council positions will be available prior to the meeting.

Approval Item: Constitutional Amendment. Tyler Posey and Sarah Getter led the discussion of the proposed edits and updates to Redeemer's constitution. Some are needed to align Redeemer's constitution with the Churchwide Model Constitution, while others are proposed to better align with Redeemer's functional reality. The revised draft was emailed to council members prior to the meeting. Tyler and Sarah acknowledged Judy Kuhagen for her contributions to the revision process.

After discussion, Karen made the motion for Council to approve the revisions to the constitution and submit them as presented for Congregational approval at the Annual Meeting. Lena Martikainen seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously by Council.

Discussion Item: Transition Team Update. Karen Miller reported that the Transition Team has been meeting regularly and are currently working on a survey with the intention of releasing it to the Congregation by the end of the month. Tuesdays will be designated as "Transition Tuesday" to provide a systematic way to target communication and provide transparency as the Team makes progress towards crafting a Site Profile for the call for a new pastor.

Discussion Item: Nominating Team for Call Committee. Karen Miller reiterated that the Call Committee will require eight members, which could include members of the Transition Team, who must be approved by the Congregation. In order to provide enough time and space for the Transition Committee to complete their work, it was suggested that the Call Committee candidates be approved in a special meeting following the Annual Meeting. The work and progress of the Transition Committee will be communicated regularly to the Congregation in the interim.

Discussion Item: Update on Youth Activities. Annabelle Allard reported that this year's Youth Sunday events drew an increase in participation from last year. Victoria Johnson reported that the youth leadership team met to plan for service activities this month.

Discussion Item: Lenten Dinners. Council is scheduled to host the Lenten dinner on February 18, Ash Wednesday. A Sign-up genius will be distributed prior to the dinner to organize the potluck.

Construction Project Updates from January

The abatement process in the office wing has been completed and certified by the inspector. The demolition will continue with the removal of the old wood paneling and boiler pipes in the offices. Doors and door frames between the offices will be taken out, which contributed to the sound problem between the offices. The electrician will remove some of the electrical wiring extensions that were installed over the years that do not meet code requirements. The original concrete floor in the hallway (which used to be an exterior sidewalk) will be leveled in order to allow the installation of new floor tiles.

With the construction that is underway in the old office wing, access on Sundays to the Music Suites and Kitchen will be through either the Fellowship Hall or the Gym. Starting at 9:45 AM when the Confirmation Class is in session in the Fellowship Hall, access will need to be through the Gym. Also, the old bathrooms in the office hallway are now closed but the bathrooms across from the Gym are available or the accessible bathroom off of the Crossroads lobby is also available. Signs will be posted to help direct you.

A reminder that the visitor's entrance on Mondays to Fridays is now Door #15 on the Chain Bridge Road side of the building. If you have been issued a door fob, it will still work at Door #10 on the Westmoreland Street side of the building. However, as additional construction work is done on that entrance area, there may be times you will be redirected to Door #15. Visitors and Members should not use Door #1, the Preschool main entrance on the Chain Bridge side, during daytime hours Monday through Friday due to our safety and security procedures for the Preschool.

Currently, every two weeks there is a meeting with the General Contractor and the Architect to review the construction progress. As a result of the last meeting of the month, there is a billing to the church for the work completed and the materials purchased to date. Those payments are made from your previous donations to the capital campaign. Your gifts now to the capital campaign will delay the need to use borrowed funds and reduce our interest costs.

Better Hearing Tips in Redeemer's Sanctuary

1. Sit directly in front of a speaker. There are four speakers in the sanctuary (two on each side). The speakers are tall, thin, tan-colored, and mounted to the wall. It is advised for better hearing to sit at the end of the pew, closest to the wall, and facing a speaker as the sound comes directly from them.

2. Avoid sitting where the sound is less clear. If you are in a pew where the closest speaker is behind you (not pointed directly at you) the sound will be traveling away from you, and you will not hear as well. Also, if a wall column partially blocks your view of the speaker, then it is partially blocking the sound from that speaker.

3. Use one of our sound amplifiers. The sound system operator can provide you with a battery-operated device that amplifies the sound coming from the sound system. They come with a plug that goes directly into your ear. We have several extra ear plugs, and you can keep one with you and re-attach it yourself to the device each week, if you prefer.

4. Sit in one of the first few pews. In addition to the recommendations above, some people find they hear better the closer they are to the front. It may be especially helpful to sit directly in front of the pulpit for the sermon. At the same time, please keep in mind the recommendation described in Item #1 above and be as close as possible to one of the speakers that is facing towards you.

The sound system operators do their best to keep the sound volume as high as possible without it becoming too loud and discomforting for other people in attendance. Thank you for your understanding and we hope these recommendations are helpful to you.

Through the generosity of this congregation, we were able to meet our expenses with about \$10,000 left over. About 21% of all giving for the entire year came in the month of December.
