# A Message from Pastor Sharon Core

# Tradition, Taste, and Trial November 2025

Over the years, food on the Thanksgiving table has shifted. Of course, there has always been turkey—some years baked, other years fried (and if you've not had fried turkey, you are missing out!). My grandmother made this sweet potato recipe with marshmallows inside the glob of potato and then rolled in corn flakes—they are labor intensive to make and SO good. While they haven't graced the table in a while they remain in my mind and tastebuds a vivid part of the meal. Cranberries in some form are on the menu—chutney, solid from the can, whole berry. My dad is a rice guy and so we usually have that instead of mashed potatoes (some of you may find this unbelievable!). And there is ALWAYS gravy made from the turkey giblets and drippings. Another mainstay is oyster dressing—and always a sampling of the raw oysters before they are added to the mix. Something green appears—broccoli, spinach, green beans, asparagus—and truth be told it hardly gets eaten! The *pièce de résistance* for many years was my dad's coconut cake—it is legendary and don't even think of suggesting bagged coconut! Hand grated with an icing that cooks slowly over low heat. When I met Nick, I shared a piece with him; my dad agreed to make it as the groom's cake for our wedding reception. I have attempted to make the cake and it will never be as good as the ones my dad made.

Okay, so I don't know about you—but my stomach is now growling and my mouth is watering!

Why all this talk about Thanksgiving dinner? It occurs to me that what appears on my table and your table has to do with tradition, taste, and trial. What absolutely has to be included on the menu--what are the Thanksgiving non-negotiables? What flavors do you enjoy—the accompaniments for the turkey, the side dish that rounds out the meal? And what are you willing to give a try this year--the recipe you saw online for roasted asparagus with lemon sauce or wild rice casserole? It may not be on the table every year, but this year "let's give it a try."

Tradition, taste and trial—we can also use these to think about this interim time. You may have seen the announcement in Sunday's bulletin about the work needed to inform the call process. Council is forming a Transition Team that will help coordinate and guide the congregation through conversations about tradition, taste, and trial—who have you been, who are you now, who might you be in the future?

Keep an eye out for more information on how to self-nominate. It will be my privilege to work closely with this group. Until then, what's on your Thanksgiving menu?

# Minutes: October 6, 2025, Meeting of Congregation Council RLC Library and via Zoom

<u>Council Members Present in Person:</u> Annabelle Allard; Steve Bott, Treasurer; Pastor Sharon Core, Interim Pastor; Lee Cronin; Sabine Detweiler, Vice President; Chris Hernadi, Secretary; Victoria Johnson; Megan Kratz; Lena Martikainen; Gene Morrow; Tyler Posey

<u>Call to order.</u> Karen Miller called the meeting to order at 7:32.

<u>Opening Devotions.</u> Pastor Core led opening devotions with a reading of Genesis 12:1-4 and an excerpt from *Canoeing in the Mountains* by Tod Bolsinger. The readings invited a reflection on how Abraham on the one hand and American explorers Lewis and Clark on the other chartered new territory and encountered the unknown. Pastor Core ended with prayer.

**Approval of Minutes.** Minutes from the meeting were previously approved by email.

Adoption of Agenda. The agenda, as emailed in advance of the meeting, was approved by the Council.

**Executive Committee Summary.** The Executive Committee met on October 1 and talked about the items on tonight's agenda

<u>Treasurer's Report.</u> Treasurer Steve Bott presented the 2025 Financial Summary through September 30. Due largely to a lower contribution rate, expenses exceeded receipts by \$52,000. The amount represents an increase from the August report, yet it is not unlike deficits experienced by Redeemer in years prior to the onset of COVID. After considering the current economic climate in the DC-area and Redeemer's previous experience with deficits prior to the holidays, Council agreed to wait for at least one more reporting cycle before beginning calls for increased contributions to close the gap.

On behalf of Sara Nail, Pastor Core brought to Council's attention a donation received from an individual who requested guidance on where to dedicate the funds. Council agreed to follow Sara's recommendation that the donation be dedicated to the Operating Fund. Pastor Core will follow up with Sara.

<u>Discussion and Action Item: Change to Christmas Services.</u> On behalf of the Worship and Music Committee, Sabine Detweiler presented the recommendation to offer services at 4 pm, 6pm and 8 pm on Christmas Eve and one 10 am service on Christmas Day during the Christmas 2025 season. The reduced number of services will better align with attendance patterns and help relieve the pressure of multiple services when we have just one Pastor. Sabine Detweiler made the motion to accept the committee's recommendation. Lena Martikainen seconded. After discussion, Council approved the recommendation unanimously.

<u>Discussion Item: Transition Workshop.</u> As a follow-up to last month's meeting, Pastor Core provided suggestions for the kind of work a Transition Team would do and offered three main questions that such a committee should consider during the call process:

- Who are we at Redeemer?
- Who do we think God is calling us to be?
- What kind of Ministry do we want to invite a new Pastor to lead?

Pastor Core added that posing these questions would be an opportunity to evaluate Redeemer's Mission Statement, its Welcome Statement, and the ways in which the history and activities of the ministries, and the relationships between them, might shape the future.

In discussion, the Council considered the history of the Mission Statement, the formulation and adoption of the Welcome Statement, and the importance of cataloguing specific activities that Redeemer has done, still does, and hopes to do as a way to answer the questions Pastor Core proposes.

Council agreed to proceed with the formation of a Transition Committee prior to forming the Call Committee, following the steps and timeline below:

- On or around October 13, Pastor Core will provide Council with a draft description of a Transition Committee's makeup and tasks
- On or around October 13, interested Council Members will provide Karen Miller with a list of questions that they would ask of Congregation members who express interest in serving on a Transition Committee
- On or around October 20, using the feedback above an online form will be created to be made available to the Congregation to solicit candidates to serve on a Transition Committee.

<u>Discussion Item: Pastor Core Schedule and Supply Scheduling.</u> While Pastor Core is on scheduled leave, Pastor Amy Feira will preside services on Sunday, October 12, and Pastor John Teitman will preside in late January through early February.

<u>Discussion Item: New Members.</u> Karen Miller briefed Council on the process followed by Pastor Sandy Kessinger to induct new members. Karen agreed to make a record of these procedures and consider ways to accomplish the necessary tasks during Pastor Core's interim year.

<u>Discussion Item: Redeemer Renaissance Board Meeting.</u> Sarah Getter reported that she is working with Redeemer Renaissance to determine the date of their annual Board Meeting and the details on their proposed 2026 budget.

<u>Upcoming Events: Rise Against Hunger and Synod Youth Retreat.</u> Karen Miller reported that Rise Against Hunger is still raising funds to meet their goal to host the event at Redeemer this November.

The Synod Youth Retreat will take place in November for students in 8th-grade through High School. Four Redeemer youth members have already expressed interest in attending. Grace Howie has agreed to provide adult leadership.

Planning for both the Middle School Youth Mission Trip and the High School Youth Mission are underway and will be promoted this Sunday October 12.

#### **Ministry Reports: Various**

- Annabelle Allard on behalf of the Youth Ministry reported that Youth Leadership Sunday is scheduled for October 26
- Tyler Posey on behalf of the Stewardship Ministry reported that the committee will hold meetings off the usual quarterly cycle to discuss additional ministry items.
- Karen Miller reported on behalf of the Social Outreach Ministry that the committee is hosting a luncheon on October 19 for members and anyone else interested in participating in activities of the ministry.

**New Business: Blessing of Animals.** Pastor Core reported that the Blessing of the Animals will be held outdoors on October 19 at 1:30 pm.

<u>New Business: Installation of Bishop Hirsch on November 9.</u> Pastor Core announced that she was asked by the DC Metro Synod to serve on the Planning Committee for the installation of Bishop Hersch, which will be held at the National Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC. Pastor Core reported that the Synod asked Congregations to repurpose and deliver the flowers used at their own services that morning for the installation ceremony, and she requested that Redeemer consider contributing.

#### **Construction Project Updates from October**

The recent construction activity in the education wing includes new pipes, ducts, electrical, and HVAC equipment installed in the ceilings. Soundproofing material has been added between the classrooms. New closets have been built in the back hallway. The old cement blocks in the hallways and classrooms have been covered over for an improved appearance. Plumbing has been added for two new sinks and counters to be installed. A new office was created for the Redeemer Renaissance Preschool and After School programs by splitting an existing large office into two sections.

Currently, every two weeks there is a meeting with the general contractor and the architect to review the construction progress. As a result of the last meeting of the month, there is a billing to the church for the work completed and the materials purchased to date. Those payments are made from your previous donations to the capital campaign. Once those funds are exhausted, we will start to draw down funds from our Mission Investment Fund loan. Your gifts now to the capital campaign will delay the need to use borrowed funds and will reduce our interest costs.

It was discovered during the removal of our old boiler system that some of the 70-year-old pipes to the radiators in the classrooms and offices had become very thin over the years. We were fortunate that none of these had sprung a leak recently in the walls or in the ceiling. Now that they are being removed, that risk no longer exists. It is reassuring to know that our new HVAC system will put us in a much better position for the future.

Now that we are close to getting County approvals for the Natural Play Area renovations and the building of the Columbarium, we have sent out RFPs (Requests for Proposals) to the general contractors who bid on the interior building renovations, plus some additional firms. With those responses, we will have a better idea on the current costs and timelines for completion. Once we review their proposals, we will discuss the details with the contractors and consider any of their recommendations and options.

# Message from our Prayer Partnership Pastor Zhanibek Batenov at Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Mary in Ulyanovsk, Russia

Dear sister in Christ, Pastor Sharon Core! Dear Redeemer congregation! Dear sisters and brothers in Christ!

We warmly salute you and are delighted to share our news with you.

I'll start with what takes place regularly in our congregation and how we serve God and people. Twice a week, on Sunday morning and Thursday evening, we conduct the Divine Liturgy. Bible study is held on Tuesday evenings. In recent months 10-15 people have attended these events on Tuesdays and Thursdays and 25-30 people have attended the Sunday service. On Wednesdays we prepare food and feed the poor, recently around 20 people attended these lunches. Additionally, on Thursdays before and on Sundays after the services we hold classes on the Christian teachings. We have eight people preparing for confirmation and one for baptism.

Here are some of the special events for our community. In October we confirmed another sister in Christ. Our congregation choir also now rehearses regularly on Mondays and Fridays. Our choir is small, but it has grown a bit, now it has 12 vocalists.

On October 4th and 5th we celebrated the Harvest Thanksgiving. In addition to this celebration we held a charity fair and a choir marathon. Various choral groups participated in the choir marathon: two chamber choirs, three children's choirs from a school of arts, a music college choir, three university choirs from the Faculty of Arts, a Roman Catholic choir and our choir from the congregation of St. Mary. These charity events raised money for a local city hospice.

We are especially pleased that the congregation choir accompanied the festive Divine Service on October 5th and now accompanies every Divine Service with Communion which is conducted once a month.

Dear sisters and brothers, we're heartily congratulating you on the upcoming holidays, Reformation Day and All Saints' Day! We wish the Redeemer congregation abundant blessings from God and pray that you will find a new, kind and permanent pastor!

What is Good Grub and God? It is a night out in a local restaurant for adults for a good meal, fellowship, and a discussion on some aspect of our faith.


Come solo or bring a friend, co-worker, or partner, but come enjoy getting to spend time together.

#### **Sacred Ground**

Sharing content from the Sacred Ground curriculum - Session 1

NOT SOMEWHERE ELSE, BUT HERE – excerpt from an essay by Rev. Dr. Rebecca Ann Parker

"This is my country. Love calls me beyond denial and disassociation. It is not enough to think of racism as a problem of "human relations," to be cured by me and others like me treating everyone fairly, with respect and without prejudice. Racism is more: It is a problem of segregated knowledge, mystification of facts, anesthetization of feeling, exploitation of people, and violence against the communion/community of our humanity. My commitment to racial justice is both on behalf of the other—my neighbor, whose well-being I desire—and for myself, to whom the gift of life has been given but not yet fully claimed. I struggle neither as a benevolent act of social concern nor as a repentant act of shame and guilt, but as an act of desire for life, of passion for life, of insistence on life—fueled by both love for life and anger in face of the violence that divides human flesh."

Prayers for being called beyond denial and disassociation -

Dear God, I know I was not meant to go it alone because you created the church to be a supportive family for your children. And I know the church is made up of people like me so it isn't perfect! Help me to play my part in the church, so I can learn from the teaching, be encouraged by the fellowship, be renewed in the Eucharist, and find strength for living each day through prayer.

Dear God, You understand that sometimes I do things I never intended to do. My sorrow doesn't make it all right and neither can I use my weakness as an excuse. Help me to begin anew, to experience your forgiveness and to walk again in Jesus' way.

Dear God, Help me to live the way Jesus called me to live. May my actions speak louder than my words of your love and of new life in Jesus. At the same time, help me rise above my own stumbling speech and give me the words to express what I believe. Let me be a witness to the truth.

Dear God, All too often I have looked at people in a very superficial way. Help me begin to see them with your eyes, knowing that every person is created in your image, as your child. If Jesus died for that person, how can I despise him? Give me a new love that reaches out to everyone because Jesus died for all.
