Beautiful Beatitudes

Matthew 5:3 "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

This refers not to material or intellectual poverty, but to a spiritual state of humility and self-awareness before God. It highlights recognizing one's complete dependence on God's grace and mercy, rather than relying on one's own righteousness or abilities.

In essence, being "poor in spirit" is the starting point for a genuine relationship with God. It is the doorway to receiving His forgiveness, experiencing inner peace, and aligning lives with His will.

Matthew 5:4 "Blessed are those who mourn. for they shall be comforted."

This verse speaks to a deep spiritual truth about God's response to sorrow and brokenness. The verse means that those who experience sorrow, grief, or remorse for their sins and for the brokenness of the world will ultimately find comfort and peace from God. This beatitude encourages believers to embrace the natural human experience of sorrow and to seek God in the midst of it. trusting in His promise of comfort, forgiveness, and eternal hope.



For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them" (Mt. 18:20, NIV).

Jesus once said that when two or more people are gathered in His name, something remarkable happens: His presence is with them. Now what if that number increases to two-or-three thousand people? Want to go higher?! What about the 356,552 people who attended the North Dakota State Fair last week? Was Jesus there (and if so, did he need a wristband for the rides)?

You see, it's easier to assert that Jesus's presence is with us when we're neatly tucked into our favorite rows and pews at church. However, it's more difficult to define how Jesus's "transcendence" — the divine experience of God in this physical world — applies when we're among the carnival rides, the funnel cake stands, the livestock exhibits, and among the roar of engines and the crunch of iron at the demolition derby.

But something almost imperceptible happened last week at the state fair. In the midst of a week that garnered national attention — from the B-52 flyover that sent a Delta commercial pilot jockeying to take evasive action to country star Luke Bryan being beamed with a stress ball while performing onstage — something less conspicuous happened during the nine-day run. *Can you take a guess?*





Throughout the event, Christian volunteers took turns wandering the fairgrounds as purveyors of nothing more than prayer and as representatives equipped with nothing more than a smile (and well, of course, the Holy Spirit). Their only concession was "intercession" — among the stands of corn dogs, funnel cakes, and other fried food, they offered something spiritually sweet — to let others know that God cares about his peoples' needs.

To be honest, I think the idea of intercessory prayer is frightening to most people, and in particular, to some Christians. Why? The concept of this is rather spontaneous and it relies on the guidance of the Holy Spirit. For example, I have attended community functions in the past where Christian "vendors of the Gospel" have forcefully tried to negotiate and to manipulate non-believers into making an impromptu confession of faith. For some of these Christians, had they been well-trained in knot-tying and had enough length of braided rope, they would have hogtied the reluctant unbelievers and carried them to church to await Pastor's next sermon. But coercive techniques are not the nature of intercession, instead, it is born of a passion for truth and of a genuine concern for others — and that's the "scare factor" for most Christians. We have to be completely convinced that God desires us to be so passionate for our faith that we're willing to greet strangers with the phrase, "How can I pray for you?" The fearful part is that many of us have a Jonah-like reaction to the realization that SOME of these strangers might actually reply back. (Jonah fled God — only to be swallowed by a whale — because he knew the "outsiders," the Ninevites would positively respond to God's invitation to prayer and repentance).

Since the permissive revolution (the "anything goes" attitude) that has permeated society since the '60s and '70s, it seems that a majority of Americans have gradually modified Jesus's words ... "when two or more are gathered, don't say anything religiously or culturally offensive ... after all, God is everywhere ... as a quiet, introspective onlooker." The reality, however, is that — more than likely — all of the 356,552 visitors to the state fair had at least one prayer-worthy concern on their hearts and minds. If we don't reach out to them, we'll never know their concerns.

It's one of the decisive factors as to why some churches are growing ... and others are merely "maintaining" (a church analytical term that refers to merely sustaining the "status quo").





Do we truly believe that there is a God who cares about ALL people to the extent that he wants us — as believers rooted in our faith — to feel comfortable enough to ask a stranger if he or she needs prayer? Do we trust that the Holy Spirit will guide us into situations in which our words and our presence can indeed introduce Christ into the mix of our conversations? Do we feel passionate enough to prioritize God above everything else? It's a tough, reflective question.

We all want a break from the doldrum of our ordinary lives — hence the appeal of an annual event like the North Dakota State Fair. In the crowd of people and in the charged atmosphere of carnival food, loud music, and excited voices, we discover a sensation that is so much larger than ourselves — we're part of a bigger picture on earth.

Perhaps this illustration will be helpful: a well-known Christian in Minot was among the volunteers at the fair who spotted a man in the crowd that caught his attention. This individual was wincing in pain. When he paused to rest, the Christian casually greeted him, and asked, "Is there anything I can pray about for you?" Initially, the man grunted and said, "Nope, there's nothing that I need." But as he started to walk away, the man put his hand on his knee — visibly in pain. He called back out, "You know what, actually there IS something. I've been having knee trouble for a while, and it's starting to affect everything in my life ... and I just don't know what to do." The Christian replied, "Well, let's start with a prayer ..." to which the man was more than agreeable.

You see, intercessory prayer is as its name implies: it's a prayer between two or more people to invite Jesus into their midst. While we can never predict God's final response to such a prayer, one undeniable event already has taken place — Jesus IS there. So, let's take him everywhere.

We don't have to mingle among a crowd of 356,552 for something remarkable to happen ... it begins with some simple math: 1 + 1 = 2 ... and one-by-one God will grant us those moments where we can say: "How can I pray for you?"

After all, we know how it felt when someone asked us those "spiritually sweet" words — at some point in our own lives — "Can I pray for you?"
