ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Children must meet the following age requirements by September 1:
 - o 2 years old to enroll in the 2-year-old class.
 - o 3 years old to enroll in the 3-year-old class.
 - o 4 years old to enroll in the VPK program or 4-year-old class.
- 2. Must be able to drink from a cup (all ages).
- 3. Must be toilet trained (3- and 4-year-olds).
- 4. Submit the Florida School Entry Health and Immunization Form from your child's physician
- 5. Submit completed Enrollment Packet Paperwork.
- 6. Provide a copy of the child's birth certificate at initial registration (required for 2- and 3-year-olds).
- 7. A VPK voucher is required for enrollment in the VPK program.

WHEN LIFE HAPPENS... DON'T BE A DISTRACTED ADULT





Distraction Prevention Tips:

- Never leave your child alone in a car and call 911 if you see any child locked in a car!
- Make a habit of checking the front and back seat of the car before you walk away.
- Be especially mindful during hectic or busy times, schedule or route changes, and periods of emotional stress or chaos.
- Create reminders by putting something in the back seat that you will need at work, school or home such as a briefcase, purse, cell phone or your left shoe.

- Keep a stuffed animal in the baby's car seat and place it on the front seat as a reminder when the baby is in the back seat.
- Set a calendar reminder on your electronic device to make sure you dropped your child off at child care.
- Make it a routine to always notify your child's child care provider in advance if your child is going to be late or absent; ask them to contact you if your child hasn't arrived as scheduled.

During the 2018 legislative session, a new law was passed that requires child care facilities, family day care homes and large family child care homes to provide parents, during the months of April and September each year, with information regarding the potential for distracted adults to fail to drop off a child at the facility/home and instead leave them in the adult's vehicle upon arrival at the adult's destination.



Facts About Heatstroke:




It only takes a car **10 minutes** to heat up 20 degrees and become deadly.

arent's Role

parent's role in quality child care is vital:

- Inquire about the qualifications and experience of child care staff, as well as staff turnover.
- Know the facility's policies and procedures.
- · Communicate directly with caregivers.
- · Visit and observe the facility.
- Participate in special activities, meetings, and conferences.
- Talk to your child about their daily experiences in child care.
- Arrange alternate care for your child when they are sick.
- Familiarize yourself with the child care standards used to license the child care facility.

uality Child Care

uality child care offers healthy, social, and ducational experiences under qualified supervision a safe, nurturing, and stimulating environment. nildren in these settings participate in daily, ge-appropriate activities that help develop essential ills, build independence and instill self-respect. Then evaluating the quality of a child care setting, ou should consider the facility's quality indicators lated to activities, caregivers, and environment.

- Caregivers accept family cultural and ethnic differences.


uality Environments

KNOW YOUR CHILD CARE FACILITY

Know Your Child Care Facility - General Requirements

very licensed child care facility must meet the inimum state child care licensing standards ursuant to s. 402.305, F.S., and ch. 65C-22, F.A.C., hich include, but are not limited to, the following:

- · Valid license posted for parents to see.
- · All staff appropriately screened.
- Maintain appropriate transportation practices (if transportation is provided).
- Provide parents with written disciplinary and expulsion practices used by the facility.
- Provide access to the facility during normal hours of operation.
- · Maintain minimum staff-to-child ratios.

lealth Related Requirements

mergency procedures that include:

- Posting Florida Abuse Hotline number along with other emergency numbers.
- Staff trained in first aid and pediatric cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) on the premises at all times.
- · Fully stocked first aid kit.
- A working fire extinguisher and documented monthly fire drills with children and staff.
- Medication and hazardous materials are inaccessible and out of children's reach.

Training Requirements

- 40-hour introductory child care training.
- 10-hour in-service training annually.
- 0.5 continuing education unit of approved training or 5 clock hours of training in early literacy and language development.
- · Director Credential for all facility directors.

Food and Nutrition

Post a meal and snack menu that provides daily nutritional needs of the children (if meals are provided).


Record Keeping

Maintain accurate records that include:

- · Children's health exam/immunization record.
- Medication records.
- · Enrollment information.
- Personnel records.
- Daily attendance.
- · Accidents and incidents.
- Parental permission for field trips and administration of medications.

Physical Environment

- Maintain sufficient usable indoor floor space for playing, working, and napping.
- Provide space that is clean and free of litter and other hazards.
- Provide sufficient outdoor play area.
- Maintain sufficient lighting and inside temperatures.
- Equipped with age and developmentally appropriate toys.
- Provide appropriate bathroom facilities and other furnishings.
- Provide isolation area for children who become ill.
- Practice proper hand washing, toileting, and diapering activities.

Influenza ("the flu") is caused by a virus which infects the nose, throat, and lungs. According to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the flu is more dangerous than the common cold for children. Unlike the common cold, the flu can cause severe illness and life threatening complications in many people. Children under 5 who have the flu commonly need medical care. Severe flu complications are most common in children younger than 2 years old. Flu season can begin as early as October and last as late as May.

How can I tell if my child has a cold, or the flu?

Most people with the flu feel tired and have fever, headache, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, and sore muscles. Some people, especially children, may also have stomach problems and diarrhea. Because the flu and colds have similar symptoms, it can be difficult to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone. In general, the flu is worse than the common cold, and symptoms such as fever, body aches, extreme tiredness, and dry cough are more common and intense. People with colds are more likely to have a runny or stuffy nose. Colds generally do not result in serious health problems, such as pneumonia, bacterial infections, or hospitalizations.


flu vaccine is the best way to protect against the Because the flu virus changes year to year, mual vaccination against the flu is recommended. The CDC recommends that all children from the les of 6 months up to their 19th birthday receive flu vaccine every fall or winter (children receiving vaccine for the first time require two doses). The value of the first time require two doses and protect your child by receiving a flu coine yourself.




What can I do to prevent the spread of germs?


The main way that the flu spreads is in respiratory droplets from coughing and sneezing. This can happen when droplets from a cough or sneeze of an infected person are propelled through the air and infect someone nearby. Though much less frequent, the flu may also spread through indirect contact with contaminated hands and articles soiled with nose and throat secretions.

To prevent the spread of germs:





- · Limit contact with people who show signs of illness.
- Keep hands away from the face. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.



When should my child stay home from child care?

A person may be contagious and able to spread the virus from 1 day before showing symptoms to up to 5 days after getting sick. The time frame could be longer in children and in people who don't fight disease well (people with weakened immune systems). When sick, your child should stay at home to rest and to avoid giving the flu to other children and should not return to child care or other group settings until his or her temperature has been normal and has been sign and symptom free for a period of 24 hours.



During the 2009 legislative session, a new law was passed that requires child care facilities, family day care homes and large family child care homes provide parents with information detailing the causes, symptoms, and transmission of the influenza virus (the flu) every year during August and September.
