Let Go Of The Past

The passenger tapped the cab driver on the shoulder to ask him something. The driver screamed, lost control of the car, nearly hit a bus, went up on the sidewalk, and stopped inches from a department store window. For a second everything went quiet in the cab, then the driver said, "Look mister, don't ever do that again. You scared me half to death!" The passenger apologized and said he didn't realize that a little tap could scare him so much. The driver replied "You're right. I'm sorry. Really, it's not your fault. Today is my first day as a cab driver. I've been driving a hearse for 25 years." The cabbie allowed his past experiences to cause him to take his eye off of the road and his goal of getting his passenger to his destination. Sometimes we allow our past to affect our present and future goals and destinations also. The apostle Paul told the Philippian brethren: "Not that I have already attained, or am already perfected; but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has also laid hold of me. Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended; but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead. I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:12-14). When we find our past affecting our lives in a negative way, we need to learn how to forget those things. We especially need to forget those things which keep us from focusing on our goal of heaven. When we have people in our lives who are causing us to take our eyes off of our goal of heaven, we need to forget them. When our guilt from former sins, which have been forgiven, causes us to take our eyes off of our goal of heaven, we need to forget them. When temptations to sin lead us astray from our goal of heaven, we need to forget them. We need not to allow anything in our past to take our focus off of heaven. "If then you were raised with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ is, sitting at the right hand of God. Set your mind on things above, not on things on the earth. For you died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is our life appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory" (Colossians 3: 1-4).

Mike's Message

Train Up a Child

The wise King Solomon wrote, "Train up a child in the way he should go, even when he is old, he will not depart from it" (Prov. 22:6). To train a child includes instruction, correction and discipline. Solomon speaks to children saying, "Take hold of instruction; do not let go. Guard her, for she is your life" (Prov. 4:13). Solomon adds, a child "will die for lack of instruction, and in the greatness of his folly he will go astray" (Prov. 5:23). He explains correction and discipline: "Foolishness is bound up in the heart of a child; The rod of discipline will remove it far from him" (Prov. 22:15). He adds, "Do not hold back discipline from the child, although you strike him with the rod, he will not die" (Prov. 23:13). The very role of parents requires them to do the best for their children. To do what is best for our children sometimes demands a measure of detachment. Sometimes we may seem unsympathetic to their hurts - "I told you not to touch the stove." Sometimes we may even have to hide our compassion - "Life is not always fair." We do this to develop responsibility in our children. Statistics show that parents who do not discipline their children, often see their children grow up lacking in responsibility. Solomon confirms that a child without discipline will "bring shame to his mother" (Prov. 29:15). Johnanthan Sacks confirms that a child "will stumble and fall, but only by so doing does a child learn to walk" (To Heal a Fractured World; The Ethics of Responsibility, p. 41).

"In the way he should go" has had multiple explanations. Basically, within the context of the book of Proverbs it reflects the ways of wisdom. Wisdom, in this book often personifies God. Therefore, we understand the verse to say, "Instruct your child in the ways of God." The ways of God can only be known through reading His word.

Deuteronomy 6:1-9 instructs parents and grandparents to teach their children to "fear the Lord your God." This teaching is to be done continually, where ever you are. Parents often ask when do I start instruction. Studies have been done that show at around 18 weeks, your unborn baby can hear the mother's heartbeat. At 27 to 29 weeks, they can hear the mother's voice, and other sounds outside the womb. Start reading the Bible to your child while he is still in the womb, and continue reading until they leave the HOME.

Parents often question when correction should begin. Correction usually becomes effective around 8 months. As soon as an infant begins to explore, you should start teaching what NO means. This is the beginning of correction.

The Carpenter's Apprentice

Romans chapter one begins with a rather long salutation wherein Paul, while introducing himself and explaining his purpose in life, uses the phrase in verse 5, "the obedience of faith." Interestingly the same turn of phrase, "obedience of faith," appears in the last sentence of his letter to the churches in Rome as well. The reader however may not make this connection unless he reads the entire letter at once or happens to take particular notice of either one of the phrases and does a little research on it! The latter is what happened to me. As I write though, I can't help but recall, never once did I put down a letter from Jedidiah while he was in basic training until I'd read every last word, often going back through it to make sure I missed nothing and understood everything. I wonder if the churches read Paul's letters a little at a time, or all the way through at once. Regardless, the phrase "obedience of faith" captured my thoughts and arrested my attention as I read the salutation last night. There are a number of religious people who seem to hang up on "saved by grace" almost implying works, or actions are not necessary, only belief. I suppose their position could be understandable as we read Jesus' words to the Pharisees and Sadducees whose emphasis had turned more to the letter of the law than to the spirit of the law, often honoring God with their lips, but not their hearts (Matthew 15:8). The concept of grace only may even be plausible if we read only Ephesians 2:8-9, "For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, so that no one may boast." However, such a belief in grace only indicates a total misunderstanding of faith and requires the disregarding of several other scriptures like Ephesians 2:10, Romans 6:1-5, James 2:14-26 and even 1 John 1:5-9. All of these scriptures clearly demonstrate those who believe – do something; from the works we were created for, to walking in light and Paul lays it out simply with the phrase "obedience of faith." If you believe, you will act. If you believe the parachute will open, you jump out of the plane. If you believe the boat will float, you push off from shore. If you believe you can walk on water, you have no problem getting out of the boat in the middle of the lake. The drag racer believes his car is the fastest so he puts his title on the line. No one with a doubt would do any of those things and vet there are many who profess a faith in God who simply don't do what he says. They do not obey, prompting him to ask, "Why do you call Me, 'Lord, Lord,' and do not do what I say" (Luke 6:46)? Maybe we all need to ask ourselves, "Do my actions demonstrate what I claim to believe?" -ieff
