Twenty-Five Years Later

Foundations for the Home

Several years ago, I started writing a book entitled, "Foundations for the Home." Over the years, I have gotten sidetracked from this project, but it has always been on my computer and in the back of my mind. I pray God will give me time to finish it, but even if He doesn't, I grow in my love for God and His design for marriage, and my wife every time I think about God's plan for the home. In this lesson, I want to discuss the introduction of this project, and why I began to write the book in the first place. Nearly 1000 years before Jesus was born, David asked this question: "If the foundations are destroyed, what can the righteous do" (Ps. 11:3)? David's question is raised because the wicked were attacking the righteous people and reshaping the foundation God intends for society. While David does not specifically mention the home, destruction of a society begins in the home. We live in a time when the foundations of our society are crumbling beneath us. There are terrorist attacks on our nation, gang violence, children killing other children in our schools, suicide, increasingly high divorce rate, cohabitation as an accepted living arrangement, homosexuality as an accepted alternative lifestyle, gender confusion, murder disguised as abortion, drug and alcohol abuse, child abuse and spouse abuse, pornography, and the rising popularity of gambling. These are all evidence of the deterioration of a moral society; and statistics reveal that many young people become involved with gangs, drugs, and gambling because of the lack of adult supervision in the home. The divided family is one of the leading causes for depression and suicide among America's youth. Combine the above facts with the statistics that the divorce rate is about 50% of all marriages (US has third most divorces in the world), and the fact that on average children from broken homes do not do as well academically or socially; and the direction of our country is obvious. We are a nation that is becoming more violent, having more addictions, more depression, and more unnecessary deaths. We are a nation that is becoming less educated, more insecure, with poorer social skills.

In 1974 Batsell Barrett Baxter wrote, "America needs more than slight surface repair." He insists, "We need to rebuild the entire foundation our families are built upon" (America, It's Not Too Late p.7). If this was true in 1974, how much truer is it today! Since the foundations of our world are crumbling beneath us, what can the righteous do? David's answer: the righteous must keep on being righteous (vv. 4-7). Join us Sunday for more on this study!

The Carpenter's Apprentice

The movie came out in 2013 and I probably would not have watched it except a very special little girl in my life loved it! Friday as I held another special little girl and watched the snow falling, I looked down into her very tired baby blue eyes and whispered the only line I can remember from the movie, "Do you want to build a snowman?" Her big green pacifier stopped bobbing and a sweet little smile emerged around its edges as heavy eyelids fluttered shut. A couple hours later, I was rolling the middle section of their snowman as they slept and Austin came out of the house and said, "Dad! You should have told us you were building snowmen; we could have helped! The team is on the way." The house was full, it has been for weeks and the snow had brought everyone back together one more time to hunt, play and spend time together. For me, it was better than Christmas and the truth was, I kind of wanted/needed to roll a few snowballs on my own for a little bit. I was not looking forward to everyone leaving. As I finished the body of my snowman and lifted it into place, the "team" started filtering out of the house bundled in warm snow gear, ready to work on the best snowman ever. I watched them and thought of Austin's statement and it reminded me of the church. We are family and so many times we have shared each other's burdens. Paul wrote to the church on Rome, "Be devoted to one another in brotherly love; give preference to one another in honor; not lagging behind in diligence, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord; rejoicing in hope, persevering in tribulation, devoted to prayer, contributing to the needs of the saints, practicing hospitality" (Romans 12:10-13). My "team" as Austin referred to them, showed up to help. It wasn't that I couldn't handle building the best snowman ever on my own. It wasn't that the boys and their wives thought I needed the help to finish the task. They were just happy to help and they all pitched in from retrieving charcoal for the eyes, sticks for arms and hydrangea blooms for buttons on his coat to rolling and lifting the heavy sections of the perfect snowman, they all played a part, different parts in completing the task. In the end, they made it more fun. They made it easier. They made it memorable and I look forward to the next time and doing it again. I can think of a number of times when the church came together to help complete a task, but I can also remember plenty times when I thought, "Man! I wish I'd known; we could have helped!" The Hebrew writer wrote, "consider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds" (Hebrews 10:24). We often have no problem letting our needs be known to God (Philippians 4:6), but very often we forget He left the church as an answer to our prayer.
