# Mike's Message

## Love For God

Recently I got a card from a seven-year-old boy that caused me to pause and think. The statement on the card was, "I don't understand how to love God." My immediate response was, "How can I explain this to a seven-year-old?" Then I realized that this may be a more common question than we might think. I began to think about what love is, how we show love, and why we love. I still wonder if I can explain this so a seven-year-old can comprehend it, but I am going to try, and in so doing, I hope this will benefit the rest of us. What is love? While psychologists are not in complete agreement on what love is, I think most of them agree that love is some type of an emotion, a feeling. It may be more complex than laughing, crying, or even outbursts of anger, but it is non-the-less an emotion we feel. We may not always be able to know why we feel it, but we know it is inside of us. There is also a social sense to love in that it is a selfless behavior. It is something you do or say to give someone else pleasure without expecting anything in return. For example, if you love your mom, you might bring her flowers you picked from the yard, or draw a picture of the two of you together. If you love your dad, you may just sit in his lap and eat popcorn, or follow him around to try and be a helper. You may even say sweet things to them. It all comes from a love you have for your parents. You may not really know why you do or say these things, but it is love. This leads to the second question, "How do we express love for God?" In some ways, we express our love for God in the same way we express our love for our parents. You may not realize it, but you bring flowers to your mom because you know it pleases her. We show love by doing what makes someone else feel good. Jesus said, "If you love Me, you will keep My commandments" (John 14:15). We show our love for God by doing what pleases Him. Jesus expressed His love for His Father by doing what He wanted Him to do. He said, "so that the world may know that I love the Father, I do exactly as the Father commanded Me" (John 14:31). So, in the same way that we do what pleases mom and dad because we love them, we do what pleases God because we love Him. The last question is, "Why do we express love for God?" John writes, "In this is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins" (1 John 4:10). We express our love for God because He has expressed His love for us. It is similar to the love our parents have shown us. They feed us when we are hungry, they care for us when we are sick, they protect us from danger. All because they love us. So, we love God for the same reasons. He first loved us! --Mike Rogers
