How Can We Make Our Relationships Better?

There is something that makes all relationships better. There is one special ingredient—one golden thread that binds every person within that relationship. It is this: to put away all selfishness. This is not a new concept in marriages. In the book, "What Every Family Needs" by Carl Brecheen and Paul Faulkner, we find this statement: "Selfishness is the greatest single enemy of a happy marriage . . . (and) is the root of all other sins") (page 5). This applies to all relationships: husband-wife, parent-child, employer-employee, neighbor to neighbor, etc. The Bible says: "Do nothing from selfishness or conceit . . . " (Phil. 2:3). If I read that right, then the Bible is telling us that there is nothing good that can be done when it is done out of selfishness. The opposite of selfishness is: generosity, benevolence, selflessness. When I have my way all the time . . . then I'm being selfish. When I put what I want or I put what I have a right to above the wishes and desire of my spouse, friends, family, neighbors—then I'm being selfish. Selflessness says: "Others come first." How can we overcome selfishness in our lives? God's answer to overcoming selfishness is for us to understand what conversion to Christianity is all about. You see, conversion means to voluntarily give up our rights and our freedoms and even give up the throne within our minds—to Christ, I die to self (Romans 6). That means I die to selfishness. It means I put all others first. Actually, this is the heart of the golden rule given to us by Jesus, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" (Matt. 7:12). God's answer to selfishness is to put others first.

Mike's Message

God's Promises

[I changed my sermon for last Sunday because of the amount of rain that had fallen in four days. This article reflects that sermon. You can read last week's bulletin article to prepare for the sermon on Sunday April 13]. Tipton county experienced more flooding in four days than I have ever seen. I was told someone measured 22 inches of water in their rain gage. This was devastating and almost shut down the entire midsouth. This flooding was made worse by the number of tornadoes that touched down and the destruction and loss of property and lives they caused. As bad as this was, it was nothing compared to what Noah and his family experienced (Genesis 7:4-12). The "fountains of the great deep burst open, and the floodgates from the sky were opened. The rain fell upon the earth for forty days and forty nights" (Gen. 7:11-12). It rained on us for four days, and that not continually, and it has pretty much shut down everything. In this lesson I want to review three promises God has made. I do not mean to minimize the devastation and hurt that came from the tornadoes and flooding, but the first promise I want to notice is the promise God gave Noah and his sons. He promised that the earth will never again be destroyed by water (Gen. 9:8-17). God made this promise to Noah and every living creature. He even extended this promise to the earth (Gen. 9:11-13). God even put a rainbow in the clouds as a sign of remembrance of this covenant (9:12-17). But why did God flood the world? It was because "the wickedness of man was great on the earth, and every intent and the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually" (Gen. 6:5-7). How does the world compare today? Are we as wicked as those people were? God was sorry that He had made man and vowed to destroy all He had created, "but Noah found favor in the eyes of God" (Gen. 6:8) because he was "a righteous man, blameless in his time; Noah walked with God" (Gen. 6:9). Noah made the earth worth saving. We are like Noah. Jesus said to His disciples, "You are the salt of the earth" (Matt. 6:13). Salt was used for flavoring, salaries, and preservatives. Comparing His disciples to salt, Jesus was saying, you make the earth worth saving. But God made another promise. He promised to destroy the earth with fire because of the wickedness of man (2 Peter 3:10-12). God is patient with this promise because of the righteousness of a few. But, make no mistake, He will keep His promise (2 Peter 3:3-9).

The third promise is that God will create a new heavens and earth for all who remain righteous (2 Peter 3:13-18). Will you live, or be destroyed?

Carpenter's Apprentice

With "tax season" almost over, paying taxes or getting a refund is on the minds of many. While paying taxes is a sign you are making money, there are not many who actually enjoy giving a substantial chunk of their income to the government. The dislike for tax collectors has been around since the first taxes were introduced! In the first century, tax collectors often found themselves included whenever sinners were talked about and often seemed to be in a class by themselves as even Jesus acknowledged their loathsomeness using the phrase, "tax collectors and sinners" (Luke 7:34). Given the generally negative sentiment towards taxes, it is really not a surprise to find out the Pharisees chose taxation as one of the topics in which to try and trip Jesus up. In Matthew 22:15-21, the writer describes the scene when trying to entrap Jesus, the Pharisees asked him if it were lawful, or permissible, to pay tax to Caesar. Jesus' response clearly demonstrated the depth of His wisdom, and knowledge. He asked to see the money and queried his aggravators, "Whose picture is on the coin?" When they said Caesars, Jesus responded matter of factly, well then "give unto Caesar what is Caesar's." His statement left his detractors amazed at his response for they still had nothing to accuse him with. But that is not all he said. Jesus followed, "give unto Caesar what is Caesar's" with, "and give unto God what is God's." In the very same sentence, He answered their question; he gave them a huge directive making their question look petty and dumb. After all, what is God's if it is not everything?" This begs the unasked question, "What are you giving to God" and maybe a second question, "Do you complain as much giving to God as you do giving to Caesar?" His response really sets up his answer for another leading question later in the chapter, "What is the greatest command in the law" (Matthew 22:36)? We are all very familiar with Jesus' response, "YOU SHALL LOVE THE LORD YOUR GOD WITH ALL YOUR HEART, AND WITH ALL YOUR SOUL, AND WITH ALL YOUR MIND.' ³⁸ This is the great and foremost commandment. ³⁹ The second is like it, 'YOU SHALL LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR AS YOURSELF" (Matthew 22:37-39). Jesus ends Matthew 22 by asking them a question in which they knew the correct answer would firmly establish Himself as the son of God; something they just didn't want to believe. In their attempts to trap Jesus in Matthew 22, Jesus basically pointed out they were not giving God nearly what he deserved. He pointed out, despite their knowledge and intelligence, they just didn't understand much of what they were talking about, but no matter, if they would just put God first in their lives and their neighbors second, everything they weren't doing or understanding would take care of itself. The truth is, we can answer most of life's problems and issues today if we will just love God with all our heart, soul and mind and love our neighbors as ourselves, just like He said!
