Mike's Message

Godly Parenting Ephesians 6:1-3

In this text, Paul addresses children's responsibility to their parents, saying, "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. Honor your father and mother (which is the first commandment with a promise), that it may be well with you, and that you may live long on the earth" (6:1-3).

The word "children" has no specific reference to age. This word is often used to describe all believers as God's "children" (see Rom. 8:16). However, in Paul's instruction to the church at Ephesus, he is obviously addressing those in the training stage (see 6:3, 4). This training stage is best presented as the period of life when the parents are responsible for them: to feed them, clothe them, and educate them. There is no set age for maturity. Some children provide for themselves as young as fourteen. Others are still living at home, being cared for by parents, far into adulthood.

Two significant words are provided in the first two verses of this passage that instruct children in their responsibility to their parents. The words are "obey" and "honor." Obey is a derivative of the Greek word for hear. It is used in this verse to instruct the child to do what he hears from his parents. Indeed, this instruction is for children of Christian parents. However, the principle will apply to children of non-Christian parents unless the parents instruct them to do something that violates God's will. God's will must take precedence in all things. So, children in the training stage must do what they are told to do. This is a "commandment" quoted from Moses through the pen of this inspired writer (Eph. 6:2, cf. Ex. 20:12).

The word honor may indicate more about why the children should obey their parents. Children should obey their parents because they respect and love them. The word also shows that the child does what he knows would please the parents, whether there is verbal instruction or not. Therefore, when the child is young, he obeys because of the instruction from his parents, but as he grows, he obeys because he respects God and his parents.

Paul mentions two other reasons for obeying the parents: "that it may be well with you," and "that you may live long on the earth" (6:3). This is the promise God gave the children of Israel so they would obey him and prosper in the Promised Land. They disobeyed, and that "entire generation" died in the wilderness (Numb. 32:13). The same promise is given to children who obey godly parents. They can also assume the same consequences if they disobey. "Children, obey your parents"!



Carpenter's Apprentice

Without a doubt, this has been, and is, the most anticipated week of my life. Bear came early and continues to improve. He gets stronger and cuter every day! His original due date was September 11. My fourth grandchild, a girl, was due September 9, but she is apparently still primping and getting ready for her grand entrance. Frankly, I am beside myself with excitement. The Bible tells us in many ways what heaven will be like. It is a place where God resides, and within it there is a place prepared for us (John 14:1-3). John attempts to describe its beauty and living in the presence of God in Revelation 21, but Paul reminded the church at Corinth of the word of Isaiah: "Things which eye has not seen and ear has not heard, and which have not entered the heart of man, all that God has prepared for those who love Him" (I Cor. 2:9). This means, despite the beautiful inspired descriptions and the promise of heaven, it will be a place far greater than our imagination can take us and the incredible awesomeness of being in the presence of God for eternity is ultimately unfathomable and will only be realized when we get there. In spite of this knowledge, I know I have never been as excited about heaven as I have been about this week. I reread Paul's words to the Philippians, "For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain. But if I am to live on in the flesh, this will mean fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which to choose. But I am hard-pressed from both directions, having the desire to depart and be with Christ, for that is very much better;" (Phil. 1:21-23). I think Paul understood what I have a hard time putting into words. His love for the brethren of the church is obvious. Loving and being excited about what God has blessed us with is not wrong, but we must guard against loving our blessings so much, we forget about God and the ultimate end of our journey.
