Local Outreach – Brad Evins

The Local Outreach Ministry works to provide opportunities for connection and fellowship within the congregation and to connect with and support those outside of the church through encouraging words and compassionate actions. By sharing the love of the Lord, we hope to open doors which will lead to spiritual growth in all those we encounter and encourage. The Monday Night for the Master program helps us meet those needs. Every Monday at 6:00, we share a meal together. Following the meal, we write cards to our visitors and to members and loved ones who need encouragement. We also make phone calls and set up visits to reach out to those contacts. As needs present themselves, we tailor MNFM activities to serve in other ways. You might find us building and delivering gift baskets or bags to those in need, or engaging with the community through programs like Backpacks for Kids, or at area events like the Chocolate Tour on the Covington square, which allow us to make a positive name for the church in the community and share love and kindness with hundreds of people in our area. This year, one of the primary goals for this ministry is to expand the visitation that we do. We would love to build a group who would be willing to conduct short, encouraging visits with our members during the week.

These activities allow us to embody the theme “Make Me a Servant” - and there are so many ways you can serve with us: provide contact information for individuals who need encouragement or support; join us on a Monday evening to assist on a cooking team, write cards, or make phone calls; take home a contact sheet and reach out on your own any time of the week; help us build a group to conduct weekly visits; join us in preparing for and working at events as announced throughout the year; or, if you know of outreach opportunities or have ideas you would like to see us try, present those ideas to Brad. One of the strongest benefits of being a part of this service effort is the bonds that are built within the group. Many of us have been a part of MNFM for twenty years or more! Come and see why people come out every Monday and why our relationships are so tight in this work.

Carpenter’s Apprentice

The walk up did not go exactly as planned, mostly because I had never planned for it. Sassy loved to retrieve, and I thought that was the goal: to bring the bird back. We were supposed to be walking side by side, and when the bird was thrown and the thrower hollered, “There goes one!” I was to tell her to sit, shoulder and shoot a blank at the already dead bird, then wait for the judge to tell me to send her to retrieve the bird. What happened? Sassy caught the bird on the first bounce. She caught the movement of the bird boy as he stepped up to make his best throw and left my side before he let go of the bird. She never heard me say sit, no, or heel, because as they say, ignorance is bliss. I never said a word. I am not even sure I fired the blank shell. I just stood there in my ignorance, smiling proudly as my retriever executed what I thought was a perfect retrieve. The judge called me over and replaced some of my ignorance with disappointment as he explained again what had been expected and that I had failed the test. But I was not through with my ignorance - not by a long shot. Mr. Jimmy came over and said, “No worries. You have a fine retriever, and we can fix that!” Discouragement began to go away as Mr. Jimmy took me around the trucks away from the crowd and demonstrated what needed to happen. Now you must understand, Sassy was not an old dog, but she had been around for a while and was pretty set in her ways. Mr. Jimmy knew this and was ready for her push back, but I was not. My ignorance took control as I confessed, “If that is what it takes to have a good retriever, I guess I won’t have one.” Looking back, I am reminded of the Proverb, “Train up a child in the way he should go ...” (Proverbs 22:6), but I change the end to “and it won’t be so hard to show them when they get older.” I am not changing the Scripture; I am just combining a proverb with a Proverb. You have heard, “You can’t teach an old dog a new trick.” Well, you can teach new tricks and change old habits, but it is much harder. I never taught Sassy to stay until I said “go” and remained ignorant until the day I pulled her limp, seemingly lifeless body from the icy waters after an unsuccessful retrieve. That was the moment I learned the importance of “man’s best friend” learning obedience to his master. Correction is a part of education and “no” is possibly more valuable than “yes.” In fact, “Whom the LORD loves He re-proves, even as a father corrects the son in whom he delights” (Proverbs 3:12). Let’s not lose sight of the goal and what it takes to get there. (Ecclesiastes 12:13; 2 Timothy 3:16; 2 Peter 1:2-4).
