#### Dear Parishioners,

Happy Birthday, America! I hope that you all have had a wonderful time celebrating our nation's independence this 4th of July Weekend. It fills me with a deep sense of gratitude for our country seeing all of the red, white, and blue during these days and throughout the year. The colors of the United States flag show us something: red represents valor and bravery; white represents purity and the pursuit of a just society; and blue represents vigilance and perseverance.



Of course, the Church makes use of colors throughout her seasons as well. We have been in Ordinary Time for three Sundays now, but we have not yet seen the color GREEN, the typical color for the longest season of the year. Instead, we celebrated Trinity Sunday and Corpus Christi with the most solemn color: white. Last weekend we venerated the Princes of the Apostles, Saints Peter and Paul with the color of the martyrs: red. Finally, this weekend, the priest will don the green vestment.

Do not sleep on the color green! It represents spiritual growth and new life. In some liturgical traditions, green is even the color of the Holy Spirit who is the giver of life. During Ordinary Time, let this color spur you on to growth in your spiritual life. We can be certain that, "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few." As a laborer in Christ's vineyard, consider how you might cultivate growth in the faith lives of those around you. Then, we might glorify God in the tremendous spiritual fruit he is bearing!

#### Heavenly Hero for July: St. Kateri Tekakwitha

Born: 1656 in New York State Died: 1680 Feast Day: July 14 Patronage: Those who have lost their parents, people in exile and Native Americans Saintly Story:

St. Kateri Tekawitha was the first Native American saint. She was born in what is now New York and grew up in a Mohawk village. Growing up, Tekakwitha was the girl who

didn't quite fit in. The same smallpox that had taken the lives of her parents and brother when she was four years old had left her face badly scarred and sallow. It also badly damaged her eyes. People mocked her because she could not see and often bumped into things. Her name, Tekawitha, means "she who bumps into things."

After learning about Jesus she wanted to become a Christian and live a life of prayer and kindness. When Kateri refused the marriage proposal of a young warrior to his face in front of his family, people made fun of her, calling her names and giving her all the hardest work. Not long after this, she escaped her village, traveling with the help of two Huron warriors nearly two hundred miles to a village of Christian Mohawks. There, at last, she fit in.

When she died of an illness four years later, her last words were, "Jesus, Mary, I love you." Fifteen minutes after her death, her face was transformed—no longer scarred, but radiant, an outward sign to all who knew and loved her that she had finally found a true home in heaven.

**Talking Point with Children**: Even when people made fun of her, Kateri stayed true to our faith. She teaches us that even when others don't understand us, that Jesus loves us and we will always have a place as part of his family, the Church.

Action Step for Children: Kateri had a great love for nature. This week, take a walk and as you spend time outside, thank God for his beautiful creation!

#### Bringing Hope through the Spiritual Works of Mercy: #3 : Counsel the Doubtful

Having doubts is a normal part of being human, and that includes having doubts about our faith. Jesus' first disciples, who shared life with him day in and day out for three years and knew him better than almost anyone, had doubts. It's understandable that those of us who are 2,000 years removed from Jesus' life on earth might also struggle with doubt. The hope is that we don't allow doubt to

close us off, but remain open to talking about our struggles with faith. It's then that others can come alongside us to bring good counsel and help us grow in the gift of faith.

Counseling the doubtful shares similarities with last week's spiritual work of mercy, instructing the ignorant. It requires humility, a willingness to listen well and to dialogue, and an attentiveness to the Holy Spirit, who promises to give us the gift of counsel so that we will know what to say (and how to say it) when someone shares their doubts with us.

One of the most important things to remember is that expressing doubts is not a cause for fear. It is an invitation to conversation. Someone who doubts cares enough about the faith to question and often wants to learn the truths that will help them believe. It is also important to remember that intellectual expressions of doubt often have deeper roots. A person might express a doubt about the Church's teaching about homosexuality, for example, but underneath that question or frustration might lie the deeper question: Does God still love me? Will he reject me if I am honest about myself? This is another reason why it is always important to listen well and ask the Holy Spirit to reveal what is really at the heart of the matter.

May our Lady of Good Counsel pray for us!

#### **Getting Married?**

Congratulations! We would like to help prepare you for the Sacrament of Matrimony. Please call the parish office at least six months prior to your desired wedding date to begin preparation. Marriage preparation prepares you and your future spouse to live a sacramental marriage that is free, faithful, permanent, and fruitful. The grace of God gives strength to live out the sacrament.

#### Already married but not married in the Church?

You may call to meet with one of our priests to discuss the possibility of entering into the Sacrament of Matrimony in addition to your civil marriage. This would be a new step in your relationship, asking the grace of God to be at work, and binding you and your spouse to vows before God.

#### **Previously married?**

If you have been married and divorced, you may want to discuss the possibility of an annulment. An annulment process looks at whether the prior marriage had conditions missing for it to be a sacramental marriage. The annulment process is concerned mainly with the personal and spiritual aspects of marriage. It does not "erase" the civil contract, and it does not render children illegitimate. It merely states that after thorough investigation, the Church has decided that a marriage, as the Church understands marriage, was not valid. Deacon John Ingala and Fr. Tom from our parish are trained to assist people in this process. Please call the parish office to set up a time to discuss this with one of them. If an annulment is granted, the person is then free to enter into a sacramental marriage.

Infants accept the faith through the faith of their parents. Our parish offers group sessions to prepare parents for the baptism ceremony and for leading their children in a life of faith. Sessions are held twice per month, all year round. It may be

One **Catholic godparent** is needed, who must be a **Confirmed, practicing Catholic** at least 16 years of age. If there are two godparents, there should be **one male and one female.** There should not be more than two godparents. A non-Catholic Christian may serve as a Christian witness in addition to the Catholic godparent.
