Welcome Camp Tekakwitha! Dear Parishioners,

I sincerely hope everyone is enjoying summer so far, and that it's been extra-ordinary for you and your loved ones! Coincidentally, while this Sunday may be earmarked as the 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time, the gospel is far from "ordinary" – it's the parable of the Good Samaritan, one of the most inspiring and thought-provoking teachings of Jesus.

In the gospel, Jesus responds to a lawyer who asks, "Who is my neighbor?" with a story that challenges us to see everyone as our neighbor, especially those who are suffering or in need. A priest and Levite walk past an injured Jew, but a Samaritan chooses compassion, even though Jews and Samaritans were enemies at the time. Jesus ends the story with a clear instruction: "Go and do likewise." This message is at the heart of what it means to live as a follower of Christ.

It's interesting that Jesus chooses a Samaritan as the hero of the parable. In the Gospel just one chapter earlier, a Samaritan village turned Him away. Still, Jesus doesn't hold a grudge. He doesn't see the Samaritan people as enemies. Instead, He uses one of them as an example of love and mercy.

The priest and Levite, who should have known the law best, ignore the man in need. They may have been concerned about purity rules or their own safety. But Jesus shows that God's law isn't about avoiding people – it's about helping them. The Samaritan, though rejected by others, lives out God's call to love.

The Samaritan doesn't ask who the injured man is. He doesn't stop to question whether the man deserves help. He simply chooses to care for him. Jesus teaches us that love doesn't carry grudges or make excuses. Loving others means seeing their needs and responding to them with kindness.

Today's gospel challenges us to be like the Samaritan. We simply can't ignore the pain and needs of those around us. God's will is crystal clear -- we are meant to care for others, no matter who they are. And when we act with mercy, we become the people God calls us to be.

This week, let's ask Jesus to:

- Open our hearts to see those who need our care,
- Teach us to love without hesitation or judgment,
- · Help us to live his word through simple acts of kindness and mercy, and
- Guide us to become a neighbor to everyone we meet.

#### What Makes Catholic Families Different? Part 1

I recently read a book called *Discovering God Together*, which is available from Sophia Press. It is about not only nurturing your own spiritual journey and the all-important duty of passing the faith on to those you love. I would like to share some of the things I learned while reading this book.

At the beginning of any journey, you need good directions, or a GPS, so you'll know where you're going. If you begin a trip planning to make your way up as you go, you might not ever arrive at your intended destination. Even if you have a set of old directions that used to be correct, whose to say that the route hasn't changed? You need the most current directions to help you get from A to B.

The same might be said for your spiritual journey with your kids. If you want to arrive at your destination, the point where your kids are ready to launch out into the world as faithful, Catholic young adults, you can't just wing it. And the directions your parents or grandparents used might not get you there. It's a different world with a completely new landscape and more roads than ever for you and your kids to get lost on. To get where you're going, you will have to begin your journey with a clear sense of the route ahead, and you will need to be more intentional than ever about making sure, you stay on the right roads.

To start, you have to ask yourself, "Is it enough for me to raise basically faithful kids? In other words, do you want to help your kids arrive safely at the address marked "Faithful Catholic Adulthood."

Assuming that you're more particular about helping your kids get to the address marked "Faithful Catholic Adulthood," you will have to give them an example of Catholic family life that's worth repeating in adulthood. This involves two things.

Parents have to give their kids a family life that they experience as truly better, not necessarily perfect, but more honest, intimate, generous, and joyful than most of their non -Catholic friends experience of family.

Your children have to know in their hearts that it is your love for Jesus Christ and your Catholic faith that are responsible for that more honest, intimate, joyful, and generous experience of family life. Why is this so important? For most people, but especially for kids, faith development is all about relationship. If your kids don't experience their uniquely Catholic faith making a positive, tangible difference



in their everyday lives, their faith won't survive to adulthood, especially not in today's world with so many other lifestyles from which to choose.

### Bringing Hope through the Spiritual Works of Mercy: #4 : Pray for the Living and the Dead

Archimedes, one of the greatest scientific minds of the ancient world, once said, "Give me a lever long enough and a fulcrum on which to place it, and I shall move the world." Roughly 2,000 years later, a young woman who would someday be named a saint by the Catholic Church, drew on this quote to make the following observation about the power of prayer: "Our fulcrum is God; our

lever, prayer – prayer which burns with love. With that we can lift the world!" Her name is St. Therese of Lisieux.

It may sometimes seem to us like prayer is a small thing, but our faith is full of stories about hopeless causes that were transformed by God working through prayer. I hope you have had the gift of experiencing this in your own life too.

St. Therese devoted her whole life to prayer as a cloistered, Carmelite nun. Like us, she probably offered many prayers, trusting that God would work, but not seeing the results, but early in her life, she experienced one dramatic answer to prayer that bolstered her faith to persevere in praying for others. An infamous and unrepentant criminal was awaiting execution in Paris. Therese read that he had refused the opportunity to make a confession, and she was concerned for his soul. She prayed that he would have a change of heart before he died.

Later, when Therese read the story of the man's execution in the newspaper, she looked for some sign that her prayers had been answered and was overjoyed to read that as he knelt before the executioner, his last act was to reach out to grab and kiss the cross of the priest who accompanied him. Therese gave thanks that in his last moments he turned to Jesus. She saw in this action the answer to her prayers and claimed the man as her first spiritual child, the first person whose heart was drawn to the saving love of Jesus through her prayers.



The power of prayer is not reserved to nuns. We too have access to the heart of God through our prayers for others, living and dead. Who are you called to pray for today?

Let us remain in the heart of Jesus, and pray for one another!

#### Craft Books for Education



St Raphael parishioners Gabe. Camden and Sadie, 3 high school students enrolled in the Global Academv Program at Oshkosh West, are working on Capstone their project in order to

achieve their certificates of Global Competence. To receive this certificate, a community service project addressing one of the United Nations' 17 goals for sustainable development that has both a global and local impact needs to be completed. Because of this, Gabe, Camden and Sadie chose to support education worldwide as that is something they are deeply passionate about.

To do this, they will be taking orders and donations for a craft that they are making with the proceeds being split between *Classroom Donations International*, a nonprofit organization that helps provide supplies and grants to schools in need around the world, and the *Winnebago Area Literacy Council* to provide local refugee children with school supplies and to aid in their learning of how to read.

The craft itself is that old books are hand folded to be inscribed with any word, name or numbers that are desired by the person who orders. Instead of a set price for the books, a goodwill donation will be accepted. The **recommended donation** is \$40 for 4 or less characters, \$50 for 5-6 characters and \$60 for 7 or more characters. However, any amount that anyone is inclined to give will be greatly appreciated. There will be a table set up after Mass on July 19 and 20 to learn more.
