Don't miss "Christ" this Christmas

The privilege of loving someone includes the pain of missing them when they are gone.

That is evident for many during this holiday season. The traditions and rituals we shared with our departed loved ones don't feel the same. We can still decorate, bake, exchange gifts, and listen to our favorite Christmas songs, but the feelings they produce are just different.

If that is your experience this year, I encourage you to make it a point *not to miss* the one who is the true reason for the season like many did and do. The story of Christ's birth is full of characters who effectively missed his entrance into the world. One prominent group of them, Israel's religious elite, is mentioned in Matthew's account of Herod's treachery.

When King Herod heard this, he was disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him. When he had called together all the people's chief priests and teachers of the law, he asked them where the Messiah was to be born. "In Bethlehem in Judea," they replied, "for this is what the prophet has written: 'But you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers

of Judah; for out of you will come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel." (Matthew 2:3-6)

It is not shocking that the chief priests and scribes knew exactly where Christ was to be born. These were the theologians, the brightest minds, the guardians of spiritual truth, Israel's religious aristocracy, who knew Scripture backwards and forwards. They understood prophecy well enough to quote Micah 5:2, which foretold God's Messiah being born in Bethlehem. Yet, they missed the one who had just arrived.

Their folly is highlighted by the reality that the Jewish people had been looking for their Redeemer ever since Moses first said a great prophet like him would come. (Deuteronomy 18:15) Now that they lived under Roman occupation, their longing for him was foremost on their minds. He was their one, great hope to alleviate all their suffering. Yet, they missed his coming.

Moreover, they never even bothered to walk the few miles south to Bethlehem to find out for themselves if this child Herod was so worried about was the Deliverer they anticipated. We understand why many of them would reject Jesus later on, since he challenged their interpretations of the Law and called them out for the way they treated those under their care. But even while he was still a baby, their indifference caused them to miss the one who could fill the emptiness in their hearts.

At least Herod feared Jesus' authority. The innkeeper who turned away Mary and Joseph could claim ignorance. The shepherds were oblivious until an angel appeared to them. But the religious leaders had all the facts and still missed the Savior who had been born.

It's OK to miss your loved ones this year. It's understandable to not enjoy the same sentiments you once did. It's normal as we age that we come to see Christmas as being more eventful for children.

But it's not good to overlook the true wonder of this time of year, which is that God reached down to us in our misery and provided hope for all eternity by sending his son into the world. You can be apathetic about Christmas traditions, but don't be indifferent to the one who came to save God's people from their sins.
