

what are the chances that on the week we read from 1 Timothy that those with means are "to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life," we would experience one the biggest acts of generosity this church has ever seen! Let me tell you the story, and I hope it inspires your own generosity for God's work.

We received word this week that the 65-year-old heating unit that heats the Sanctuary would need to be replaced - urgently. The estimated cost is between \$300,000 and \$500,000 ... we'll find out soon the exact number. Leadership from the church met to consider how we might pay for such an expense. We have reserves for things like this, but this kind of expense could completely drain those reserves and leave us in a vulnerable position should something else happen. But as we discussed what to do. one of our members who knew about the situation let us know that they would donate \$300,000 towards the cost of the repair! An amazing act of generosity on the same week I'm preparing a sermon on 1 Timothy 6 that this person didn't know I was doing. Coincidence? I think not.

We are now in a position with this donation and our reserves to cover the cost of this expensive repair. I'll

keep you updated, but I wanted you to hear this story to encourage you. God is watching over this congregation. God is inspiring our members to continue his work through our ministry. We are blessed.

Many of you are generous with your time, talent, and treasure. God takes all of our contributions and transforms them into a ministry that blesses and blesses and blesses so many people from generation to generation. I went from great worry this week to great relief and gratitude. Gratitude for you, the people of God, and for our Lord who provides for us all in beautiful and unexpected ways. Thanks be to God!

Sunday's Message

SEPTEMBER 28, 2025

PASTOR TRAVIS NORTON 1 TIMOTHY 6:6 – 19

I'D LIKE TO read you a list: Nikon D7500 DX-Format Camera, Fishpond Nomad Canyon Net, Fishpond Summit 2.0 Fly Fishing Sling Pack, Orvis Clearwater Wading boots (size 11), Orvis Clearwater Chest Waders. Cobra Golf Air-X 2 Men's Combo Iron and Hybrid Set, Bosch 5 in. Dual-Mode Random Orbit Sander, Milwaukee 2962-20 M8 Fuel ½" Mid-torque Impact Wrench with Friction Ring. Any idea what these things have in common? These are all on my Amazon Wish List, and Christmas is only three months away ... I'm just sayin'. If Amazon sold them, I'd add a 2025 Toyota Sienna and a house on Wood Avenue to the list. I don't know about you, but I want things. I think about the things I want, and I add them to this list. Then I visit the list from time to time and compare it to my bank account, wondering if I can pull the trigger on any of them.

I imagine you have a list, too. Maybe one that doesn't include tools and fishing gear, but it could include vacations and travel, or tickets to concerts and events. The thing about our lists is that they are tied to our vision of a good life. My list looks like playing golf, fishing, woodworking and photography. And I have to ask myself, "Is that the good life?" I know better than that because I'm a Christian, and God has given me a competing vision of the good life. But behind our lists of wants of material things dangles this deceit that if we get these things we will be happier, our lives will be better. There is a tension in our life between these two visions. As we mature in the faith, we recognize the hollowness of the material life. As I look back on my list, I think of the things that are no longer on that list because I bought them already. My house is full of things that used to be on

that list; my garage especially contains former occupants. They didn't make my life better; they didn't make me more fulfilled or satisfied or content. And as we progress in life, we recognize that those things as much as we appreciate them do not deliver on the promise of a good life. They are just things that come with burdens of their own, that take up space and require care. We learn not to trust in material gain for meaning or satisfaction.

This is the lesson that Paul is urging Timothy to teach to his congregation in Ephesus. Ephesus was a wealthy city and Timothy's congregation needed instruction on the proper place of wealth for the Christian. Some of the issues included people walking into worship, making a show of their wealth in their clothing and jewelry. Imagine how disruptive that would be if you looked around and saw who had a lot of money and who didn't. But the deeper issue Paul warns Timothy about is how dangerous to a good life the pursuit of wealth is. He writes, "But those who want to be rich fall into temptation and trapped by many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, and in their eagerness to be rich some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pains." Here he's not only talking to the wealthy but also to those who want to be wealthy, those who are eager to make more money. And which of us doesn't want riches? Our whole culture tells us early on to make decisions that will lead to wealth. We all know people who give themselves fully to that pursuit and some find wealth, and some don't. But if that is their life's purpose they end up lonely and empty and often angry that the money didn't give them what they were really looking for. Paul describes it as a sort of captivity, a set of chains on your life that keep you from being free and enjoying the life God wants for you. When you believe in the lie that wealth will satisfy you, you can never stop chasing it because you always want more and you never believe you have enough. God has something better for us and Paul sums it up in one word, contentment. What God wants for us is contentment, which is an inner peace that is satisfied and joyful without regard to possessions or anything material. Whether you are rich or poor, God wants you to possess a contentment that is yours regardless of any external circumstance. Content if you're single, or married, content if you have the job of your dreams or just one that pays the bills. Content if you have grandkids or don't, content if you are beloved by many or just a few.

Let me ask you, do you have this prized possession? Do you have contentment? Where does it come from? It comes from God, a proper understanding of the world and a faith that relies on God above all things. Paul writes, "For we brought nothing into the world so that we can take nothing out of it, but if we have food and clothing, we will be content with these". (Side note – Paul recognizes that all people need the basics, and we should work to ensure that everyone has food and clothing, shelter and safety). He ends his words saying that we are to set our hopes not on riches but on God "who richly provides everything for our enjoyment". God wants us to enjoy this life. This wisdom isn't meant to take something from us, but to give us something that we all want. We want a good life, a life of meaning and purpose, and enjoyment. That life comes from God and pursuing the things of God. Paul wants these things for Timothy and gives him a path to pursue. He puts it in athletic terms, fighting the good fight. If you are a gym goer or a runner or play any kind of sport you have a sense of the effort Paul is talking about. I go to the gym a couple times a week, but I don't have the body I want - not yet. I'm pursuing it though, pursuing health, pursuing strength, and I see progress each month and year. In the same way Paul says to his protégé

Timothy to pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. These are the replacements for seeking after wealth or wish lists that can't deliver on a good life.

Righteousness and Godliness - living in relationship with God, thinking about everything you do in terms of what God wants. Faith - trusting in God and God's way that has been shown to us in Jesus. Loving your enemies, forgiving those who sin against you, giving to those in need, serving others and putting them ahead of yourself. This is the way of faith. Love - letting everything you do be motivated by care and compassion. Endurance - keep going even when it gets hard; don't seek the easy way out but persevere in good times and hard times. I see this endurance in many of you who have lost loved ones, and coming to church without them is emotional and hard, but you endure and you bless us with your presence. And gentleness, think about how you hold a baby with great care so that you don't hurt them in any way. I see some of you bringing elderly grandparents and friends to church, and I'm inspired by the gentleness with which you support them. This is the way of the Christian, to be gentle with others, thinking about their vulnerabilities and needs and adjusting your behavior to protect them.

When I go to the gym, I have a series of exercises that I do to target different muscles. Squat and deadlift for my legs, bench press for my chest, rows for my back, curls and extensions for my arms, planks and rollouts for my abs which I absolutely despise doing. But when I do them, over time I get stronger and balanced and healthier. Paul wants us to do the exercises of righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance and gentleness so that over time we get better at this life, not just for us but for all those around us because part of the key to thriving in this life is becoming more like Jesus in that we turn away from ourselves and toward the care of others.

Which one will you work on this week? Which one will you practice? Paul writes to Timothy that when his wealthy members are free, when they trust in God to provide a good life for them, then he can instruct them, "to do good, to be rich in good works, gener-

ous and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future so that they may take hold of the life that really is life."

There are plenty of people in the world pursuing wealth for their own ends or just to get more. What the world needs are wealthy Christians who have learned contentment and trust in God and are free to do good and be generous. I've seen the good that they can do to build up the church, to care for the vulnerable, to make a real difference in the lives of others. Generosity is powerful and it's contagious, but we can only be generous if we are free from pursuing wealth for its own sake. Jesus has set us free so we can trust in God to provide for us. I know the world seems scary right now and heavy and dark. I was a history major in college, and I'll tell you that the world hasn't changed very much since the beginning of time. The world has always been scary and dark, threatened by those who seek power and wealth for themselves over the welfare of others. There have always been wars and rumors of wars, a great disparity between the rich and poor. People have always been anxious about their children and grandchildren not having a good life, not having faith. Greed has always worked to keep the world from sharing with those in need. But God in Jesus is also at work against these dark powers. God has placed a people in this world who know a different way and can show life that really is life. You are those people; you are the strategy God is using to remake this world and get it back on track.

Pursue godliness with contentment through the Christian practices of faith, gentleness, love, and endurance and all the rest. Not only will you see more enjoyment and peace in your own life, but you will bring that same healing to those around you. Above all put your trust in God, he will provide everything you need. Maybe not all the things on your Amazon wish list but certainly everything that makes for the life that really is life. That's the life we pursue. Amen.

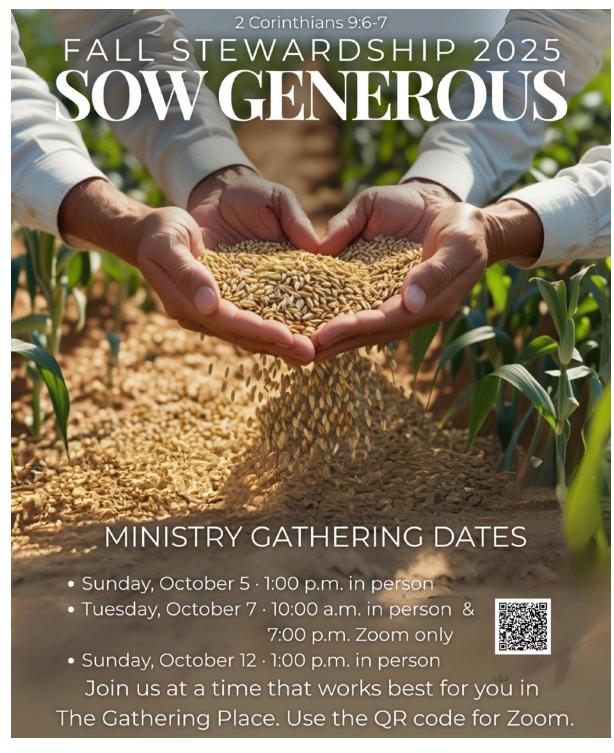

I'M NOT RECEIVING EMAILS FROM FIRST LUTHERAN!

I helped someone last Wednesday morning with this very issue. Her friend receives weekly emails from First Lutheran, but she doesn't. Why? The fact is those who subscribe to our emails should receive a minimum of two each week.

On Sunday mornings, you should receive an email from **flc@flccs.net** with the subject FLC Online Worship followed by the date. This email gives a summary of what our scriptures and sermon will focus on today. There are also announcements of upcoming events.

On Wednesday mornings you should receive an email from **flc@ flccs.net** with the subject First Weekly Newsletter followed by the date. This email highlights three upcoming events and includes the pastor's

First Thoughts video which gives us a preview of what the pastor

will be talking about on the following Sunday. If you are not signed up to receive FLC Online Worship or First Weekly Newsletter, you can sign up here: https://mailchimp/

here: https://mailchimp/flccs/signup.

You might get other emails from First Lutheran.

If you sign up to attend an event (OWLS, theatre, etc.) you will receive a confirmation email from our church management system. This email comes from **submission@ ministryforms.net.**

If you sign up to serve during a worship service, prepare Communion, host the Care and Share Mobile Market, serve at a memorial service, etc., you will receive reminder emails six and two days before you are scheduled to serve. These emails come from noreply@elexiochms.com.

If you are not receiving any of the above emails, they could be going to your junk or spam folder. The easiest way to discern if this is what is happening would be to go to your junk/spam folder and search for the email addresses listed above. If you find emails from First Lutheran in your junk/spam folder, you need to unblock them and/or tell your system to never block the sender. Each email service provider uses different terminology. I can usually walk you through it over the phone and am happy to help. Adding the following into your contacts can help too:

- Matthew 16:24

talking about self-emptying and how our transformation is for the sake of others without touching on Jesus's call to self-denial. The above Scripture is very familiar, but have we taken the time to sit with the Holy Spirit to discern what it means for us, personally?

Of course, I can't begin to tell you God's specific invitations for you in this area, but I can make some general observations. First, though, I want to clarify that self-denial does not mean self-negation, as if who we each are as human persons doesn't matter. I think much damage has been done through the message

that Jesus expects us to never think of our own needs. Healthy

self-care is actually a crucial component in overall spiritual, emotional, and physical well-being, which in turn frees us to love and serve others well. That said, we must always do the necessary internal work to make sure our self-care has not morphed into self-in-

dulgence.
So, if self-denial is not self-negation,

what is it? While it certainly includes things like fasting (whether food, technology, or something similar), giving away possessions, and not satisfying certain desires, at its core, I believe it is becoming aware of where we are privileging our opinions, beliefs, comfort, desires, and status over and against the other, and then choosing to let go of those things to make space for and benefit the other. It is humbly recognizing where I crowd out someone else to satisfy my own comforts and preferences and then choosing to do the opposite. We can fast for 40 days and give away all our possessions, but if we never become aware of how we privilege our own lives over those of others, we remain untransformed, turning our fasting into an empty – and ultimately, self-serving - exercise.

As you sit with God to sense invitations to self-denial for you, consider if any of these practices resonate: allow another to lead and receive praise; let go of managing your image (i.e., don't buy the latest fashion trend); allow someone else to teach or correct you; take the farthest parking place so as to open space for someone else; set aside any need to be in charge; forego a few meals and donate that money.

These are just a few ways to begin to put practical feet to self-denial. Please let me know the ways God invites you to grow in it! Let's walk in healthy self-denial together.

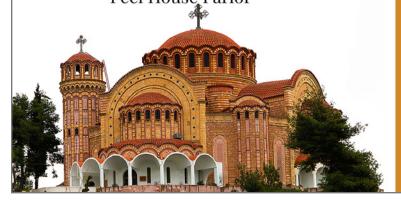
