PASTOR TRAVIS NORTON EPHESIANS 1: 11 – 23

HOW MANY JOBS have you had in your lifetime? How long did it take to find the right one, the one that fit, the one you could do for a lifetime? I did a lot of temp jobs during my college years. I worked at a brick factory; I framed houses for a summer; I was a waiter at a little Italian restaurant for a bit; I did these jobs just to make money. I didn't really think of them in terms of my identity or future. But there was one job that I wondered might lead to something more. I spent a few months as a salesman for Cutco Knives. I went through the training and spent a couple hundred bucks on a set of knives to use for demonstrations. I called family and friends to set up appointments, and I even remember the corny spiel I had to sell the spatula knife. I showed the potential customer how sharp it was, sliced a tomato and then spread the mayo. Then as my clincher I would say, "If you look closely at the knife,you'll see a beautiful picture." Of course, as they leaned in, they saw a reflection of themselves, and I hoped the flattery would land me a sale. It didn't work; it mostly led to groans and rolled eyes and my packing up my knives and heading home empty-handed.

The only thing I learned at that job was that I wasn't a salesman. As much as I liked the idea and the promise of a good income, it just wasn't how I was built, not what I was made for. However, at that same time in my life I was volunteering at church leading small groups, designing youth group lessons and teaching the Bible. That came naturally to me; it always has. It gave me joy; I looked forward to volunteering at church. I felt God working through me and over time I leaned into this identity as a pastor. I saw a member of our church at the gym this weekend,

and he said that I was born to be a minister, and I feel that to be true.

We are all on a journey of discovering our identity, of figuring out who we are. There is a real joy that comes with knowing who you are and what your purpose in life is. And the good news is that God has given us an identity that infuses this life with joy, meaning and purpose. Whether we are pastors or salespeople or mothers or fathers, doctors or teachers, we share an identity that was chosen for us from before this world began.

Did you hear the words that the writer to the Ephesians sent to that church? Did you hear them for yourself? He writes that before the foundation of the world God chose us in Christ to be holy and blameless before him in love. I want you to dwell on this for a minute for yourself. You were chosen by God before the foundation of the world. Millions of years ago when God was starting to think about this universe he would create, you were on his mind. You matter to God. Let's start there. You matter to God. That is key to any sense of identity. So many people settle for less in relationships, in vocation, in direction for life because they don't know this profound truth, they don't believe they matter. What would change for you if you believed the Bible when it says before the foundation of the world you were chosen by God. It goes on to say that you were chosen to be Holy and blameless in love. That word Holy in Greek is hagios it's where we get the word saint. That's right, you were chosen before the world by God to be a saint, to be a holy one of God. Today is All Saints Sunday, and before we talk about the others who have been saints, we need to look in the mirror and see a saint staring

back. You are saints because of God's choice, because when you were baptized you were covered by Jesus, your sins forgiven. You were adopted into the family of God. Ephesians 1:5, "He destined us for adoption as his children according to his good pleasure." Now let that sink in when you think about yourself. Do you think about how much you delight God, how he chose you and adopted you into his family, how he made you holy out of His love for you? What changes when you believe that? What changes in your relationships with others, in your vocation, in the choices you make?

I remember when my son was born, and the nurse handed him to me and said, "Here you go, Dad." It was the first time I'd been called "Dad." it was a new identity that was now mine, forever, even if I was unsure how to live into it. But then every moment over the last 16 years I've leaned into that identity. When there was a diaper to be changed or a crying child to be comforted, I knew it was my job as Dad. Today it looks like teaching that now 16-year-old how to drive and be safe on the road. I get my morning shot of adrenaline as he pulls onto I-25 and we make our way to school. I'm living into this identity as Dad and will be for the rest of my life.

In the same way we have been handed the identity as saints. We who believe in Jesus as the writer says, "So that we who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory." We have a mission; we are agents of God in this world. God has made us saints and then set us loose in the world. Ephesians spells out God's will, "He has made known to us the mystery of his will...a plan for the fullness of time, to gather all things in him, things in heaven and earth." Our job as saints, as the holy ones of God is to gather this world to God. We were studying this at Bible study, and Linda shared her story as a mother and grandmother. She shared how she has worked in her family to show them God's love and encourage them in faith. And I think that's exactly right, that part of our gathering people to God starts in our families as we encourage faith and help our loved ones see the goodness of God, his love and forgiveness and invitation to serve. It extends from there as we begin

to look at everything we do in this life through the lens of our identity as saints.

I was at Waffle House this morning as I am every Sunday morning, for seven years now. And today for the first time, a waitress came up to me and asked me to pray for her son and her husband, and I reached my hand over to hers and we prayed together right there over hash browns and coffee because that's the work of saints, to gather people to the Father wherever we are in every part of our lives. Think of it like an Instagram filter. Two of my buddies got together last week for a football game and they sent our group a picture of themselves, but they had used a filter called "smolder." It made these two middle aged buddies of mine look like they belonged on the cover of GQ and made their wives take a second look at the men they'd married. I don't know if Instagram has a filter called SAINT, but I think we can all start to ask ourselves, "What does my life look like if I'm a saint? How does a saint act at work? How does a saint treat her neighbors? How does a saint spend his time and money?" You are saints, chosen by God from before time, sent by God into the world to gather people to him. We live not for ourselves or our own glory but as Ephesians says, "to the praise of his glory." And we are the recipients of the saints of old who have paved the way and shown us what a saint's life looks like.

Today we remember the saints who gave their lives for the faith and through their sacrifice inspired our devotion. We don't ask the saints to pray for us like our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters, but we do look to them as examples of how to live this Christian life. I asked Chat GPT AI about saints. I asked it what saint it thought would inspire me. The AI pointed me to St. Gregory of Nazianzus. St. Gregory wanted to live a quiet life of contemplation but was made a priest against his will and always pushed toward more leadership in the church. He wrestled his whole life with that tension of cultivating a life of devotion and making sacrifices to serve the church. He's an example of a saint who wasn't perfect but persevered in service. As I learned more about his life, I found myself encouraged in my own vocation and call to serve the church. There are more than 10,000 people

recognized officially as saints by the church, and each of them can help us refine our own following of Jesus. But today we also look a little closer and remember those holy ones in our own life who have died and gone to be with the Lord. We ring bells (light candles) thinking of the ways our loved ones pointed us to Jesus. I think of Paul Wyant who died this year walking with me to the car to help me carry in pine branches so we could all make wreaths for the season. I think of Carlin Kielcheski who spent his life as an artist in the military helping to tell the truth about war and remind service men of the beauty of humanity. I think of Rose Eggum singing in the choir, and Pastor Peter Swan leading youth groups, and Erv Rokke leading the Academy and college to help students thrive in their pursuits. These and the saints we will name today did their part as God's holy ones to gather people together to see a God of love.

Who are the saints in your life? What did they teach you about God? How did they work to gather you up to your Father in heaven? I think of the chaplain at St. Mark's hospital in Salt Lake City who died a number of years ago. He was my supervising chaplain when I did my three months of chaplaincy. I was 25 years old, and he taught me how to listen to people as a pastor. In my life he is a saint, and I remember him today. He taught me how to love people through listening and in that way be part of God's work to gather people up to the Lord. Who are the saints in your life? Mothers and fathers who instilled faith in you, teachers and spiritual leaders who showed you more of God. We remember them all today and give thanks for the great cloud of witnesses of the saints who have gone before us. And we include ourselves in that number, we are saints, too, chosen by God. That doesn't mean we are perfect, but it is who we are. And we are sent into the world to tell the good news that God is gathering all people to himself. And we trust that we are being gathered, too, and that one day the work will be complete, and we will stand will all the saints together around the throne of God. That is our hope, our direction, and our work.

May God bless you holy ones of God. May God bless all His saints in Jesus' name. Amen.

"CLEAN AND SAFE" MINISTRY

BACK IN AUGUST, First Lutheran joined other churches in supporting a new ministry Clean and Safe with the Colorado Springs Downtown Partnership. Andrea Artley and Jane Juris are two of our initial volunteers in this program.

Clean and Safe asks our volunteers to sign up for one day each month to walk along designated blocks of Tejon St for 3.5 hours with an experienced city Ambassador. The program uses security officers, Ambassadors and social workers to walk alongside our church volunteers. The church volunteers are there to be a warm-way finder providing direction to tourists and be a warm contact to the unsheltered.

The goal is to build relationships. Andrea has said of this experience, "I am learning a lot from the experiences that I have had walking in our community. There have been some poignant moments of connection and mostly just brief moments of seeing and connection." Everyone wants to be seen. Andrea shares that this volunteer opportunity isn't for everyone. Three and a half hours of walking is a lot, and it takes time and practice in being comfortable to reach out and listen to an unsheltered person. years in the non – denominational Evangelical world, I still consider myself somewhat of a Lutheran newbie. I read a book on Lutheranism recently that stirred some questions for me, and I'd love to get some feedback from my fellow Emmaus travelers. Would you mind taking some time to consider my questions below and then emailing me with your thoughts (Lori@flccs.net)? Or, we could go for a coffee and have a chat. I surely would appreciate it!

In the book, the author essentially states that because we as Lutherans trust that God does all the work in the process of our salvation, experience of God is not only unnecessary but might be best viewed with

suspicion. I understand it's a broadbrush assessment, but I would like to know what you think about it. Do those ideas reflect your own thoughts and beliefs about experiencing God? If they don't, what do you

think about religious experience?

Please let me say that
I understand

- who gets to decide what counts as "experience" of God? And let me also say that there are no right or wrong answers, or specific ones that I want to hear. I'm just hoping to gain some understanding about how you feel about it. Here's why...

I still carry within me a default mode where "experiencing God" is considered the norm. I myself have had beautiful experiences of God, but I've also seen much manipulation and shame around it – manipulation trying to force people into some kind of experience and shame placed on those haven't had an experience. Because of all this, I want to be really careful and thoughtful about how we approach the topic here on the Emmaus Way. We've touched on it in the past (Emmaus in July 3, 2024 Ekklesia), and I may want to touch on it again, because, as my spiritual director told me, "Experience [of God] isn't necessary, but it can help." More than anything, though, I want to say things here that are lifegiving, not confusing.

So, will you consider letting me know your thoughts on religious experience? Have you had experiences of God? Have you wanted to but not had experience? Do you believe it's unnecessary? Are you open to its possibility? Would you like to learn more about it, or is it too "woo-woo" for you? Other thoughts? Any and all responses are valid. Let's keep walking together.
